12th June 2020 This week's newsletter focuses on the Herculanean effort which is taking place to reintroduce more students back to school whilst continuing to improve our home learning provision, taking into account your recent feedback. I am sure parents too have had a lot to contend with; supporting home learning, preparing your child for a return to school, and continuing with the spectrum of challenges we could scarcely have imagined as we entered 2020.

Weekly Newsletter for Parents & Students We have now redesigned and reorganised school to maintain social distancing and reduce risk. I must thank parents for their support in completing our survey about sending their child back in years 10 and 12. At present there are about 85% of students returning to school for face-to-face provision and we understand the reasons why some cannot. Next week I will update you on our first week. You will see later in this newsletter how our teachers have been further enhancing their provision for students working remotely. International research from schools who entered 'lockdown' ahead of us shows that it is around now that students can begin to disengage with remote learning. Throughout this period Bosworth students have engaged at a far higher rate than students nationally. This will be so much to their advantage as they will not see the gaps in learning which will inevitably occur where students have not engaged fully. As we enter this time period we are noticing some students starting to 'drop off' with the number of work pieces completed recently. At school we have a record of students with many pieces of incomplete work. We intend to follow this up by inviting those furthest behind into school to meet with their Head of Year and will also work with these students in catch-up sessions from September. I greatly appreciate you all continuing to do all that you can to support your child engaging through these final four weeks of term - this guide sets out topics studied in each subject by year group, and directs you to some useful learning resources; http://www.bosworthacademy.org.uk/parentsupportdocumentremotelearning/

University plans for the next academic year

Year 13 students must decide by the middle of next week whether or not to accept university offers for the new academic year. It's a big decision - even more so this year, with many lectures due to take place online and socialising very difficult. Universities are currently considering how they will operate from September, and many of them have already decided to alter their normal schedule.

Plans include: Cambridge University online for the entire year, Manchester, Reading and Queen's Belfast will have online lectures for the autumn term, and Aberdeen is delaying the start of next term by two weeks. We have encouraged students to contact individual universities or check their websites to find out what they have decided.

Deadlines to decide whether to accept offers have been pushed back to 18 June. Students make two choices - a firm first-choice university and an insurance, or back-up one, and then decline any other offers. If they meet they offer conditions of the first choice, they are in - otherwise the back-up alternative comes into play. Even then, students are not committed to going if they choose not to. Places at specific universities can be cancelled online, and if students decide not to go to university at all, they must phone the ones holding a place to ask for their application to be withdrawn.

The government says university students in England will still have to pay full tuition fees even if their courses are taught online in the autumn.

Ebooks available for students

Sadly our wonderful library, The Compass is unavailable in person to most children during present times. However, we have over 1300 ebooks that are temporarily

available, as part of our library collection. All students had been emailed about it on 29th May, with a detailed explanation on how to access them; they will need to log into our school website and open Accessit (our library catalogue). They can do an advanced search for ebooks, in the media field.

These books can be read online or downloaded. Students should now have 2 new apps on their iPads, BorrowBox & OverDrive - they will be able to download the ebooks into OverDrive, if they wish.

Home Learning and Parent Voice

We have been on a real journey these past few months regarding our home-learning provision - I personally have gone from being a technophobe to a Screencast O Matic addict for example! Our vision during this crisis was to try and transition as seamlessly as possible from mostly in-school to entirely on-line learning and your overwhelmingly positive feedback suggests we have largely managed to do this successfully. Of the 432 parents who replied to the questionnaire - 71% of you thought we were setting the right amount of work, 81% thought the level of challenge was appropriate (12% too difficult), and an overwhelming 93% were happy with the support we have provided your children. The fact that all our key stage 3 and 4 students have been provided with school iPads is extremely beneficial and has ensured that our students are well prepared for these challenging times.

Your main suggestions for how we could improve were that we should give more feedback for years 7 - 9 students, less wordy instructions and do more interactive lessons. We fed this back to teachers on the training day just before half term and gave them some training time to pair up with colleagues who are more confident in these areas. Our main home-learning platforms have been Show My Homework, Google Classrooms, BBC learning, Oak National Academy, Screencast O matic, Seneca, Tassomai and Hegarty maths; but we are increasingly trying to develop our interactive provision as well making use of Google Meet.

We have been thrilled with the work many students have produced so far and we have displayed this on the virtual gallery, the art instagram site and on the school walls as well! So keep it coming in! If you have any more suggestions on how we could improve our on-line provision please let me know.

Year 10 and 12 'Face-to-face' Support Update

All year 10 and 12 parents should now have received two letters about the details of our wider opening for some 'face-to-face' provision for year groups approaching their final year before examinations. If you have not confirmed whether you are attending you MUST complete this **google form** urgently and by 1pm 13/06/20 (though it will be too late to now arrange essential bus transport if required for Monday).

Year 12 students MUST check the timetable link shared with them by email and only attend the A level sessions they are timetabled for. Their arrival time should be no sooner than 8.45am for a prompt 9.00am start in the classroom stated on the timetable.

Year 10 students and parents MUST check their letter carefully which states which **day** they must attend school. If students turn up on the incorrect day we will need to contact parents to come and take



them home. We have to keep our students in the small groups allocated (bubbles). Year 10 arrival time should be no sooner than 9.45am for a prompt 10.00am and students will be directed on arrival by staff.

If you are dropping off by car then this must be via the 'bus entrance', our top gate, not via the driveway in front of reception. Have a look at this great simulation video from Mr. White of arrival to school: https://drive.google.com/file/d/1MvAlxVcXNMFXF1iQIDNn6dMpcTbGcV /view

Please note parents must not visit reception unless an appointment has been made in advance.



Full details have been included in our Widening Participation Plan - Information Booklet which has been shared and can be found using this link or on our website.

It is vitally important for safety reasons that students follow the code

of conduct (which does not need handing in) and adhere to our high expectations of behaviour as well as social distancing and hygiene measures. Please remember to bring a **charged iPad**, equipment and a packed lunch if you have not requested a hot meal for lunch.

We expect all of our students will want to fully engage and excel in this opportunity provided to return to school after spending so many weeks working at distance. All of our staff are really looking forward to seeing more of our students return to school and hope that they are equally excited about this opportunity.

Laureates Students Soar Past One Hundred Million Words

Our Key Stage Three students are continuing to be avid readers during lockdown. We are able to monitor the amount of reading done by our students through our accelerated reading programme. Any book a student reads and completes an accelerated reader quiz for is logged as to how many words the student has read and their recall of the story through the quiz questions.

Year Seven have so far this year read an amazing 80 million words. Leading the way in Year Seven is 7KHA with nearly 19 million words read. In the reading quizzes the top group was 7RGO who managed to get nearly 80% of quiz questions right.

Our Year Eight students have also been busy reading with a total of nearly 55 million words read in Year Eight. Top readers in Year Eight were Mr Moore and Miss O'Malley's group who have read nearly 9 million words. With over 80% of questions answered correctly Miss Ridley's group were the leaders in the reading quizzes.

We all know how important reading is, but especially during this time when there are some many things we are unable to do, reading a good book can transport you off to another time or place. As well as helping you to escape to another world it

might be that you help your group to win the reading challenge.

Please parents, continue to encourage your child to read!

Teachers Experiment with Virtual Classrooms





How to keep our students motivated and engaged during lockdown? This is The Question!

Recently, a number of staff have been experimenting with virtual, interactive classrooms like the ones you can see here. You may (just about!) recognise some of our staff who have created 'Bitmoji' avatars of themselves (ask your children to explain). Teachers have recorded themselves giving students motivating messages and delivering lessons, and these are linked to the slides. All the items in the rooms also link to useful lesson/ revision information.

Take a look at the one above. If you were to click on the teacher (Ms Coulson), you can hear her welcome you to the lesson. Click on the TV and there is a film of her teaching distance time graphs in physics. The B, S, G posters link to differentiated lesson worksheets; the medal takes you to a film of Usain Bolt running in the 2012 Olympics. Even the goldfish bowl takes you somewhere interesting...to some relaxing music to help you feel calm while you are learning!

The classroom above has Ms Masih and me in our Dickens virtual classroom where students can click on the contents of the room to find out more about the great writer, about the Victorians, and about 'Oliver Twist' which we have been studying in year 7. You will see we also have pinned up on the wall the top Accelerated Reader Quiz takers at the minute.

In case you can't guess, the year 9 classrooms below belong to Ms Berkley and Ms Patel. Ms Berkley's slide includes all the resources needed for the current English unit on 'Blood Brothers', with posters linking to punctuation problems which students are having. Guess the lesson for Mrs Patel? It's on water purification, and students actually went on a 'virtual trip' to Severn Trent to learn about this.

So, there's a little insight into some of the current learning experiences of our students. Teachers have had a lot of fun putting these classrooms/lessons together, and we hope our students will enjoy them.

Barnado's Survey


