15th October 2021 Weekly Newsletter for parents & Students Well done to all of our students and staff for all of their great achievements this half term. Due to the ongoing impact of Covid it has been a much more challenging term than ever expected. Parents reporting positive covid cases continues to decrease significantly across all year groups, therefore attendance is reaching more normal levels. Yesterday I reviewed our risk mitigation measures with Leicestershire Public Health leaders. The additional measures we have put in place such as face masks in lessons and additional hygiene and cleaning will remain for the week after half term. The reason to continue this is that historically schools have seen increases in positive cases in the days after holidays, and having discussed this wider with staff at UKHSA, it is best that our existing measures be maintained for 1 week after half term. We will then review the situation once more. As ever, thank you for your support in encouraging all students to follow these measures. I will be writing to parents on Friday to share this.



On Thursday evening we celebrated success with many of our year 7 children and their parents. An important part of our culture is to recognise and celebrate success. Hosting our first ever, Colours Awards Evening, many students achieved awards and certificates for exhibiting various global competencies, our 6Cs. Students receiving awards had excelled in Collaboration, Communication, Citizenship, Creativity, Character

and Critical Thinking this halfterm. There was an opportunity for parents to capture this proud

moment on camera with our fantastically arranged balloon arch and light show, (even the staff got involved!). Look out for other Colours Awards later in the year with some other year groups.





We've continued to recognise Black History Month with our students through

assemblies and activities in tutor groups. Two more of our students showed admirable leadership qualities this week, Esther B and Matt W, both in year 13. They delivered a powerful message to years 7 to 11 about violence against women and what can

be done about it, and all of our roles in changing attitudes towards the way in which women are treated in public. They also promoted how we can all stay safe.



Actions to take if your child tests positive for COVID-19

If someone in your household has a positive lateral flow device (LFD) test taken at home:

- they should self-isolate straightaway and <u>report their</u> test result (to the NHS and to school)
- they should book a confirmatory PCR test as soon as possible, either <u>online</u>, through the NHS COVID-19 app, or by calling 119 and continue to self-isolate whilst awaiting results of the PCR test
- any unvaccinated adults in their household should self isolate whilst awaiting their PCR result, unless they are exempt

(Exempt means; you are fully vaccinated, you are below the age of 18 years and 6 months, you are currently part of an approved COVID-19 vaccine trial, or you are not able to get vaccinated for medical reasons)

Year 10 Book Group X-MAT Visit to Author Event



Celebrating National Poetry Day 2021

Did you know, 'Metrophobia' is the term for the fear of poetry? At Bosworth Academy, we are very keen that our students don't develop this fear! Thursday 7th October was National Poetry Day, so this week we have been making a special effort to promote the love of verse.

Introducing The Verse Novel

We have branched out this year, and have been introducing our students to the 'verse novel', a form of writing that has gained popularity in recent years. In year 9 we are now teaching 'Punching the Air' by award-winning author Ibi Zoboi and prison reform activist Yusef Salaam, one

of the 'Exonerated Five' in the famous Central Park Jogger case of 1989. This is a powerful young adult novel in verse about a boy who is wrongfully put in prison - fascinating reading.

We would like to recommend some more fantastic verse novels for our students. Do encourage your children to read these - all are suitable for KS3-5.

'Booked' by Kwame Alexander

Twelve-year-old Nick is a star on the football pitch, but at home he's stuck with his linguistic professor father's "dictionary" that he has to read every day, and he

hates it... until his prowess with words starts to win over the girl of his dreams. Booked is an incredible novel. Written in verse, it's instantly readable, will grip a

reluctant reader from page one and will improve every reader's vocabulary without them even realising it. The story has something for everyone, from school and family drama to fast-paced, rhythmic football matches. It's a joy to read.

'The Black Flamingo' by Dean Atta

Fiercely told, this is an uplifting coming-of-age story told in verse, from one of the UK's leading poets, Dean Atta. Dean Atta's poems deal with themes of race, gender, identity and growing up. His latest book, 'The Black Flamingo', is a verse novel for young people about identity and the power of drag.

Michael is a mixed-race gay teen growing up in London. All his life, he's navigated what it means to be Greek-Cypriot

and Jamaican—but never quite feeling Greek or Black enough. As he gets older, Michael's coming out is only the start of learning who he is and where he fits in. When he discovers the Drag Society, he finally finds where he belongs—and the Black Flamingo is born.

'Run Rebel' by Manjeet Mann (who will be visiting Bosworth in the Spring!)

This is a compelling verse novel in which Amber is trapped – by her abusive father's

rules, by his expectations,

by her own fears. She only feels alive when running, but even that is forbidden. Inspired by school lessons about revolution, Amber slowly finds the strength to free not only herself, but also her downtrodden mother and her trapped sister from their domestic prison.

'Run Rebel' by Manjeet Mann is a powerful verse novel charting a female rebellion against cultural rules and abusive family patriarchy

This debut novel was inspired by Manjeet Mann's work creating Run the World, an organisation that empowers women and girls from marginalised backgrounds through sport and storytelling. We look forward to welcoming Manjet to our Academy in the new year.



This week we had a performance poet, Rob Reeves, work with our Year 9s on spoken word poetry. Students really enjoyed the opportunity to craft and perform their poetry using the mic.

The dangers of vaping

You will be aware that Bosworth Academy is a smoke free site and this includes vaping as well as cigarettes. Students who bring vaping equipment on site will be given a strong sanction. Nationally, vaping has become increasingly popular among teenagers and we are seeing evidence of this at Bosworth too, despite it being illegal for teens to purchase them.

E-cigarettes contain a lot of nicotine, which is very addictive. Getting addicted to nicotine can make it harder for teenagers to focus and concentrate. E-cigarettes also contain chemicals that could cause cancer, and there are many reports of serious lung problems connected to vaping. Additionally, vaping can make teenagers more likely to start smoking regular cigarettes.

If you're worried your child might be vaping, start with a general conversation. Try asking if other kids at their school vape, and what they think about it. By finding out what they already know, you can start helping them understand the risks. This usually works better than just telling them that vaping is wrong. If your child is addicted to vaping, make sure to get care from an addiction specialist.
