On Monday we received the much awaited
'Advance Information' from examination boards
for our year 11, 12 and 13 students sitting public
exams this summer. Advance Information is new for 2022.
Some changes have been made to what is assessed in
summer exams this year, in recognition of the disruption to
students' education caused by the pandemic. The aim of Advance
Information is to help guide and prioritise your child's revision. It gives some
information on the focus of the content of exams in summer 2022 for most
subjects. You can find the relevant advance information for your child's exams directly
via the JCQ website. Our subject leaders and teachers will be providing support and
guidance to students over the next few weeks to best prepare students. Please read Miss
Baxter's article for further and more specific information.

On Thursday over 40 students in year 13 celebrated their brilliant trial examination achievements in a 'Headteacher's Brunch'. Hot chocolate, pain au chocolat and croissants were enjoyed whilst certificates were awarded to our fantastic sixth formers. As students prepare for summer examinations we will be launching

the new half-term with a 'Maximising Potential' workshop. Details will be shared with students soon.

Students have continued to diligently follow our risk mitigation additional measures, wearing face masks in lessons and communal areas. Though Covid cases were high at the start of the week we have already seen a significant decrease in students and staff having to isolate. This mitigation has supported us in ensuring education in school has been able to continue, which was crucially important. With a half-term break we are hopeful that cases will continue to fall ready for students' return. Students will not be required to wear face masks in school when they

return from half-term though we will closely monitor the situation. Any student wishing to continue to wear a face mask this term may continue to do so.

This week's assembly focused on 'Why is Shrove Tuesday and Ash Wednesday important to Christians?' Mrs Starr shared what lent was, encouraged us to think deeply and reflect, and explained how this year **Shrove Tuesday** (or Pancake Day to many) is on Tuesday 1st March.

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Advance Information - Exams 2022

On Monday 7th February exams boards released some advance information about the content for some exams for this summer. It is new for 2022 and is to recognise the disruption to education caused by the pandemic, especially for those sitting examinations this year. It has not been provided for GCSE English Literature, History and Geography where flexibility in what is taught has already been introduced.

This advance information is to guide revision, exam boards do not suggest that teachers omit certain topics or content, as so much of what students learn in one topic enhances knowledge in other areas. Therefore, exam boards have each released guidance about where to target revision. Each subject was released in a different format, even across the same exam board; and this could make it difficult for students to decipher. As a school we are taking a common approach across all subjects to break down this information for students.

Each student in year 11 and 13 will receive a PLC (personal learning checklist) which addresses this new advance information and makes it clear to students what to focus on for their revision. Students will receive these towards the end of February after staff have attended seminars provided by the exam board and are able to collate this into a 'student friendly' guide. Year 12 students who are studying for AS will each receive guidance from their teachers.

What should I do now?

Students should continue to revise for subjects following the guidance of their teachers. Trial examinations are beginning on the 28th February and this will be a great focus for students to both hone their revision skills and get feedback on any skills or topics they are yet to master.



Y7 - 'Bookbuzz' Reading Challenge

As a new summer stretches out before her, Clara cannot help questioning the things she thought she knew about the adults and the world around her. And when magnetic,

Welcome to England, where the


Protectorate enforces the Public Good. Here, there are rules for everything - what to eat, what to wear, what to do, what

The Aircraft Challenge - Yr8 STEM Day, Computer Science

What a fantastic day, full to the brim of engaging activities and learning. The day began with an excellent presentation on Engineering by Matt from the Smallpeice Team, where he explained to the students what it takes to be an engineer, what a career in engineering looks like and where we can find everyday examples of engineering.

Section 1 of the workshop saw the students get into their teams and join together their creativity and team-work skills to build a tower, with only the use of paper and scissors. The aim of the task was to create the tallest tower possible that was able to hold a small weight on top without collapsing. The tallest tower to successfully hold the weight and win the task measured in at an impressive 53cm!!



Section 2 of the workshop incorporated more team-work and creativity as the teams were asked to create gliders made of straws. The task was to successfully design three gliders using as little material as possible, with straws as the main body component. The winning glider was the glider that flew the furthest distance.

After a short break, the workshop resumed, the challenge for Section 3 was to build their own aeroplane. This time, the teams were set a budget that they had to stick to when crafting the aeroplane. All resources that the team used were at a "cost" and they had to budget carefully to make the sturdiest aeroplane possible, with working motors and propellers that could fly the distance without falling apart.

Every team got off to a flying start, planning and designing the aeroplane that they wanted to build as a group before the Team Leader assigned each member of the team a role based on their skills and knowledge. Roles included, engineers, circuit makers and electronics, resource managers, presentation manager and finance managers. Every team worked extremely hard to produce a functional aeroplane by the end of the day.



At the end of the session, the teams got together to present their presentation on their aircraft. The teams then put their hard work to the test as a representative from each team stood up to send the plane flying.

Overall, a fantastic day!
