On Thursday our year 12 students had an 'Interview Experience' with employers. This took place in our hall and was conducted remotely.





Revising for Exams

From next week look out for the **Personal Learning Checklists** (PLCs) for each subject at GCSE. These have been adapted by teams to take into account the advanced information provided by exam boards. You can find these by going to the website - click on students - click on revision. Alternatively, click onto the link on the pop up banner.

Top tips for using these PLCs:

To aid your revision

- Click on a subject
- Download the PLC for each of your subjects
- RAG rate (red, amber green) for the topics you need to revise
- If you need further help revising certain topics then DO ASK your teachers
- Create a revision plan to cover all the topics between now and the exam season <u>Revision planner</u>
- Remember you do need to revise all topics but spend longer on those that you rate as amber and red.




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Mindful March

This Week's Reading Recommendations

Y7 'Bookbuzz' Reading Challenge

When Arthur, Ren and Cecily enter an abandoned house to rescue a trapped dog, they unknowingly step through a portal into both the future and a galactic 'in reality' adventure game called Wonderscape. But what now? To get home, they need to find one of the game's creators, Milo Hertz, who has a special time-key that will open the gateway back to 2021. That means



navigating the Wonderscape, solving the game's puzzles and completing the challenges. But there are bigger problems: firstly, Milo's been missing for three years. And secondly, they only have 57 hours to find him before a game reset turns them into slime...

Wonderscape is an expertly crafted, breakneck speed adventure with a videogame-like structure: codes to crack, loot to collect and different levels – or 'realms' – to explore. Combine this with the mystery of Milo's disappearance, the time-sensitive nature of the heroes' quest, and the discovery of some much darker goings-on within the Wonderscape, for a page-turning, fun and highly imaginative read.

As they progress through the game, Arthur, Ren and Cecily must each face their greatest fears but, equally, each discover their unique strengths and build what will surely be a longlasting friendship.

Y8 'Reading Rampage 2022' Reading Challenge

Dylan feels weighed down by the pressure of secondary school and is almost relieved when he is expelled for punching a classmate. He and mum go to stay with Grandad in a small Welsh fishing village, where there is nothing to do and everyone seems to know all about him. When Dylan



reluctantly agrees to go out on his grandfather's boat, he is surprised by how much he enjoys it.

Over time, Dylan finds comfort in the beauty and tranquillity of nature and begins to find his way again. He is particularly entranced by the arrival of whooper swans from Iceland for the winter, so is devastated when their feeding ground is threatened, but feels helpless to save the birds he has grown to love.

This moving novel sensitively explores some of the pressures faced by teenagers and their potential impact on mental health. The relationship which develops between Dylan and his grandfather is touching and the descriptions of the natural world are exquisite. Expertly edited to minimise barriers to comprehension, this story is printed on tinted paper using a dyslexia-friendly font, ensuring it is extremely accessible to a range of readers.

Y9 Reading Challenge

Two sisters, who have only just learned of each other's existence, become friends when their father dies. Camino Rios lives for the summers when her father visits her in the Dominican Republic. But this time, on the day when his plane is supposed to land, Camino arrives at the airport to see crowds of crying people...



In New York City, Yahaira Rios is called to the principal's office, where her mother is waiting to tell her that her father, her hero, has died in a plane crash.

Separated by distance - and Papi's secrets - the two girls are forced to face a new reality in which their father is dead and their lives are forever altered.

And then, when it seems like they've lost everything of their father, they learn of each other.

In a dual narrative novel in verse that brims with both grief and love, award-winning and bestselling author Elizabeth Acevedo writes about the devastation of loss, the difficulty of forgiveness, and the bittersweet bonds that shape our lives.

Y10 Reading Challenge

'I'm just so sick of blending in...' It's 1977, and the USA is tearing itself apart. And so is Tammy Larson. Seventeen and scared, Tammy has a secret that her strict community and conservative family must never find out; one that she's only ever shared in unposted letters to her hero, Harvey Milk. She's gay.



Hundreds of miles away, Tammy's new

pen pal is dealing with a few secrets of her own. Sharon Hawkins lives in foggy San Francisco, an exciting city full of protests and punk music. But as the letters pile up in her desk drawer, Sharon begins to realise that her world might not be that different to Tammy's after all... Set to a soundtrack of Bowie, Blondie and a whole lot of Patti Smith, the girls' worlds converge in ways they could never have imagined. With a fierce sense of rebellion and a feminist attitude to boot, Tammy and Sharon soon discover what it means to be their true selves, and one thing's for sure: they're both sick of blending in. The perfect empowering and life-affirming read for fans of Caitlin Moran, Becky Albertalli and Meredith Russo.

Safe Parking Reminders

Once again I would like to remind parents and sixth form drivers of the need to park on our site and considerately. This week, the Police beat team attended a call in Desford of vehicles blocking a residential street. It seems some sixth form students or parents collecting students have been parking in streets near the school. The police arranged for a recovery agent to remove one car that was parked unsafely.

The police have stated:

Whether it be dangerous, illegal, causing an obstruction or just purely inconsiderate, parking is something that we are regularly called to for our assistance.

As a rule, Police don't get involved with civil matters such as parking; however, they will assist in the first instance by offering words of advice or, in some cases, having the vehicle removed. Issues include;

- Vehicles that are parked on a junction or bend, impeding other drivers or pedestrians' view of oncoming traffic.
- Vehicles that are parked on the pavement and cause an obstruction by not
- allowing safe space for pedestrians to pass. We use a pushchair or wheelchair as a rule of thumb to gauge whether there is sufficient space.
- Vehicles that are "double parked" and/or restricting access for emergency vehicles or restricting other vehicles being able to leave their property.

Can parents of Sixth Form students who come to school in a car please discuss this matter. All students should also have registered their vehicle details with Lesley Brookes.
