Student Assemblies

Here at Bosworth Academy, we are encouraged to find our own voice and to share our enthusiasm surrounding important topics and events. As students, we are guided to not only reach our true potential academically but also embellish and build upon our characteristics as people which will propel us in future endeavours.

A major way in which life skills have been developed is through studentchosen, created, and subsequently run assemblies. Across this academic year, students have led nearly half of all the assemblies delivered across all year groups, each based on a topic of passion and enthusiasm from the students. This allows us to transfer pride of our cultures for assemblies on important events in our calendars such as diwali, Chinese New year, or advent, or promote inclusivity and diversity in our school when discussing Black history month or LGTB+ history month. We have also had fantastic assemblies delivered on illnesses and the journeys associated with those to raise awareness of not only what people are going through in our community, but also to develop an understanding of the wider world. These are often presented in teams with some even allowing multiple-year groups to come together and work on these projects, really building into a community spirit in our school. By having students enthusiastically deliver these assemblies to our own peers we not only teach and learn about crucial topics but also build upon our communication, character, citizenship, collaboration, creativity, and critical thinking in order to convey our message in the most effective manner-building upon these 6 Cs here at Bosworth is a focus to make us leave this school as well-rounded individuals.

This week, in accordance with International Women's Day, (which was on Tuesday the 8th of March) a year 13 tutor group delivered three individual assemblies for each key stage. Creating separate assemblies enabled us to raise awareness appropriate for each year group and send the correct message for everyone. Our tutor group on the whole worked together to accumulate ideas and then branched out into teams to produce the individual assemblies. Both key-stage three and four received virtual assemblies delivered by two of our tutor group teams due to ongoing trial exams in the hall. By creating these videos we ensured nobody would miss out on the important message of breaking the bias and barriers between genders. Key Stage 5's assemblies went ahead as normal, with each day a team of the year 13 students independently delivering the assembly to our sixth form cohort. The presentations included the key messages of international women's day as we raise awareness of prejudices that lay in our society, but also provided the resources so students could research the subject further themselves. We touched upon issues such as the gender pay inequalities, the workplace hierarchy being male-dominated at the top, and inspirational women who we should recognise as the role models they are. All the messages which we promoted all played into this year's International women's day theme of 'break the bias' as we all work together to form an equal society not only in our school but in the wider community also. In the end we really pushed across that even though international women's day is only celebrated one day a year, we should embody its message all 365 days as we push towards a more inclusive society.

Ukraine Invasion





Y7 'Bookbuzz' Reading Challenge

An ignored middle child is torn between capturing an enemy and protecting her friend.


Eleven-year-old Maggie lives in Fennis Wick, enclosed and protected from the outside world by a boundary, beyond which the Quiet War rages and the dirty, dangerous wanderers roam.

Her brother Jed is an eldest, revered and special. A hero. Her younger

brother is Trig - everyone loves Trig. But Maggie's just a middler; invisible and left behind. Then, one hot September day, she meets Una, a hungry wanderer girl in need of help, and everything Maggie has ever known gets turned on its head.

Narrated expertly and often hilariously by Maggie, we experience the trials and frustrations of being the forgotten middle child, the child with no voice, even in her own family.

Y8 'Reading Rampage 2022' Reading Challenge Thirteen-year-old Lara takes on the world-destroying Evernight when she comes to realise she is a witch The Evernight has been unleashed...



As far back as she can remember, orphan Larabelle Fox has scraped together a living by treasure-hunting in the sewers. In a city where emotionless white witches march through the streets and fear of Hag magic is rife, Lara keeps her head down.

But when she stumbles upon a mysterious little box in the sewers, Lara finds herself catapulted into a world of wild magic - facing adventure, mortal

danger and a man who casts no shadow.

Y9 Reading Challenge

A teenager goes in search of a family mystery when she is evacuated from Europe to England during World War 2. October, 1946. The Red Cross escorts a group of child refugees from Europe to England. Among them is Brigitta - a serious, silent figure with worn clothes and a small



cardboard suitcase containing a single grey glove. Arriving in London, Brigitta breaks from the group and runs... Brigitta's mission: to reach Summerland Hall and find the one person who can solve a wartime mystery. But Summerland holds secrets and shadows of its own... and perhaps the key to a new life and new beginnings.

An extraordinarily rich tale of love,

prejudice, truth and forgiveness, inspired by real events.

Y10 Reading Challenge

Two friends and basketball team mates are forced to confront the endemic racism of their town when one of them is beaten and hospitalized by a policeman.

A bag of chips. That's all sixteen-year -old Rashad is looking for. What he finds instead is a fist-happy cop, Paul, who mistakes Rashad for a shoplifter, mistakes Rashad's pleadings that he's stolen nothing for belligerence,



mistakes Rashad's every flinch at every punch the cop throws as further resistance and refusal to STAY STILL as ordered. But how can you stay still when someone is pounding your face into the pavement?

There were witnesses: Quinn - a varsity basketball player and Rashad's classmate who has been raised by Paul since his own father died in Afghanistan - and a video camera. Soon the beating is all over the news and Paul is getting threatened with accusations of prejudice and racial brutality. Quinn refuses to believe that the man who has basically been his saviour could possibly be guilty. But then Rashad is absent. And absent again. And again. And the basketball team - half of whom are Rashad's best friends - start to take sides. As does the school. And the town.

Simmering tensions threaten to explode as Rashad and Quinn are forced to face decisions and consequences they had never considered before.
