## **March Trial Exam Results**

In March, year 11 students sat their final set of trial exams. These will help both students and teachers understand what each student understands and what areas they must focus on further. Students have received papers back to see where they were successful and to determine areas to improve on. Also on this evening, you will be able to pick up copies of the Personal Learning Checklists that show what students need to revise for each subject taking into account the Advanced Information provided by exam boards.

They may know their raw marks/percentages but will not know yet their final grades.

To help students experience what it will be like in the summer (when they receive their actual GCSE results) we are inviting you to our Trial Exam Results Evening on Tuesday 5th April. We feel this is an important event which helps prepare students for what is to come but with the benefit of there still being time to improve further.

For years 12 and 13, they too will receive their trial exam results on Tuesday 5th April during the school day. This will go ahead at 2pm and support will be available on the day for all Sixth Form students in terms of advice and next steps. These will then be uploaded to WEDUC to enable parents to access these

- Master Classes that take place each Tuesday after school
- Easter Revision during the first week of the Easter holidays

# Considering a Career in Horse Racing?

Sometimes, when I tell people I'm a seventeen year old horse racing journalist, they look at me like I told them I enjoy the misuse of Class A drugs and badger-baiting. On one occasion, someone even asked my parents why they would let me be a horse racing fan.

It is true that there are negative connotations surrounding horse racing. Many people believe that all racing fans are retired, ruddy-faced old men wearing a flat cap, with a cigar in one hand, a glass of whisky in the other and a wad of cash in their inside pocket. Once upon a time, that was probably the truth, but now it couldn't be further from reality. Racing is a sport that is enjoyed by both genders and, unlike a multitude of other sports, men and women compete on a level playing field. The recent success of Rachael Blackmore and Hollie Doyle (google them!) cannot fail to inspire young girls.

Horse racing is so welcoming to any person regardless of your gender, age, sexuality, race, religion etc. There are opportunities for everyone not just the job of a jockey or a trainer as many people believe. This sport can take you around the entire world. There are a multitude of jobs available to work directly with the horses day-to-day as well as professions like racing secretaries, veterinary welfare officers, handicappers, stipendiary stewards, farriers, caterers, the list goes on and on. With many students thinking about their next steps after Bosworth Academy, Careers In Racing's A-Z of Careers List is an extremely valuable resource to highlight the jobs available https://www.careersinracing.com/careers-training/ az-of-careers/.

The horse racing industry has two training providers to give anyone the perfect grounding for whatever career they would like to pursue within the sport. The British Racing School is based in Newmarket, the birthplace of the modern racehorse. Their 'Foundation Course' is open to young people between the ages of 16 and 22 and they don't need to have ever been within two metres of a horse to apply. They simply need to be enthusiastic and hard working to be successful on the course. In addition, the National Horseracing College in Doncaster has no upper age limit. They offer similar courses with options to either work on the ground with the horses or be trained to ride them at the yard. After this, there are opportunities to progress to hold a jockey's licence or advance through the levels of horse care. A commonly held, incorrect belief is that jockeys have to be short - they don't. It is all about regulating their weight.

My life is enriched by being involved in this sport. Interacting with the horse racing community has vastly improved my ability to explain my opinions with confidence, taught me to stand up for myself in the face of conflicting views as well as learn from my mistakes and lapses in judgement. It has nurtured a passion for horses that I'm sure will last me the rest of my life. They are, hands down, the best part of this sport. There is nothing more wonderful than a thoroughbred racehorse in full flight, galloping along the turf and soaring over fences.

I have sat on the edge of my seat, transfixed by the action before me; seen racehorses up close; met some incredible people and had some wonderful experiences thanks to racing, all the while surrounded by warm, welcoming, like-minded people. I'm extremely proud to be part of this sport and I hope many more young people consider a career in this thrilling and diverse sport.

### Well Done to our Year 7 Reading Academy students and coaches!




secret she can't let anyone discover - her mum is a hoarder.

#### Y7 'Bookbuzz' Reading Challenge


A 15-year-old pop star and her biggest fan accidentally swap bodies and discover that whatever the circumstances, everyone has things they both love and hate about their lives.




Then Sam meets a girl whose laugh is a burst of stardust. But betrayed people have the hardest fists, and Sam has a secret that is about to catch up with him.
