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#### **Health Guidance**

You will be aware from the media that there are a number of children nationally who have been diagnosed with suspected or confirmed Group A Streptococcus (Strep A) infections which can include illnesses such as scarlet fever, sore throats and impetigo.



At this point there have not been any confirmed cases at Bosworth Academy.

There is no need for you to be alarmed as these illnesses are common in childhood; there is usually an increase in cases over winter and with a more significant wave every 3-4 years. The last such wave was in 2017. Nevertheless, it is important that you are informed of what you should be looking out for, so you can seek appropriate medical intervention if needed.

Although scarlet fever is usually a mild illness, it should be treated with antibiotics to minimise the risk of complications and reduce the spread to others.

The symptoms of scarlet fever include a sore throat, headache, fever, nausea and vomiting. This is followed by a fine red rash which typically first appears on the chest and stomach, rapidly spreading to other parts of the body. On more darkly-pigmented skin, the scarlet rash may be harder to spot but it should feel like sandpaper. The face can be flushed red but pale around the mouth.

If you think you, or your child, has a Strep A infection (which includes scarlet fever, throat infections and impetigo):

- see your GP or contact NHS 111 as soon as possible.
- make sure that you/your child takes the full course of any antibiotics prescribed by the doctor.
- stay at home, away from nursery, school or work for at least 24 hours after starting the antibiotic treatment, to avoid spreading the infection. If you or your child has a high fever, severe muscle aches, pain in one area of the body and unexplained vomiting or diarrhoea seek medical help immediately as this could be a sign that your child may have the more invasive form of the infection.

In school we have reintroduced enhanced cleaning

of classrooms and touch surfaces and recirculated the 'catch it, bin it, kill it' guidance for our students.

#### Complications

Children who have had chickenpox recently are more likely to develop more serious infection during an outbreak of scarlet fever and so parents should remain













vigilant for symptoms such as a persistent high fever, cellulitis (skin infection) and arthritis (joint pain and swelling). If you are concerned for any reason please seek medical assistance immediately. If your child has an underlying condition which affects their immune system, you should contact your GP or hospital doctor to discuss whether any additional measures are needed. Yours sincerely.

#### **Real LiFE Exhibitions**

This week our Real LiFE Curriculum students in Year 7 and Year 8 hosted their Autumn term student exhibitions to parents, staff and other invited guests.



The Year 7 exhibition was based on the "Who am I?" mission that has covered issues such as personal identity, culture and values, and how the full range of subjects in secondary school can be used to help them develop the agency they will need to make a positive difference to the world around them.

7ECK, 7LMA and 7MEM showcased a range of work that was of an exceptionally high standard and were excellent hosts. It



was a joy to see the students taking so much pride in their work!

Our pioneering Real LiFE Curriculum group, 8GWR, started their "Everyone Matters" exhibition



with the performance of a thought provoking assembly that will also be delivered next week to students in Year 7 and Year 8. The mission had challenged our

students to examine the topic of migration through the lens of each subject area. For example, in maths the students were taught how to analyse migration data in order to help separate fact from fiction - a crucial skill that will enable our students to think critically rather than simply accepting information that they may be exposed to online and in the tabloid media. 8GWR also showcased the range of work that had helped them to put the

assembly together and invited the guests to discuss how this mission had influenced their own



personal perspectives.

In the new year our Real LiFE Curriculum students turn their attention to the spring term missions. 7ECK, 7LMA and 7MEM will be challenged to persuade others to take climate action through, among other things, designing and building a mobile app, while our 8GWR will take part in the 10X Challenge whereby they will work in small groups who will each be given an initial budget of £10 to design and launch a business idea with the challenge of making it grow as much as possible throughout the mission (ethically and sustainably of course!).

#### **Childcare Support**

The Childcare Choices campaign aims to raise awareness and understanding of the support available from the government with the costs of childcare.



Parents and carers can go to <a href="https://www.childcarechoices.gov.uk/">https://www.childcarechoices.gov.uk/</a> where you can easily find the right offers of childcare support available.

With the school Christmas holidays approaching and looking ahead to half term in February, it is more important than ever that parents and carers are able to access the financial support they qualify for. You could be entitled to:

- up to £2,000 a year of Tax-Free Childcare per child (or £4,000 if disabled) for children up to 11, or 17 if they're disabled.
- help with up to 85% of their childcare costs for children up to 16 with Universal Credit.
- 30 hours of free childcare for 3 and 4 year olds if they're a working family in England.





#### **Road Safety Awareness**

Leicestershire Police and Fire Service were invited to deliver a road safety event on Tuesday to our Year 12 students in order to raise awareness of the fatal four and promote safe driving.



The police and fire service are called out to road fatalities around once a week and their aim is to educate young people about the key messages of

staying safe on the road. The fatal four were demonstrated through a powerful and shocking presentation. Not wearing a seatbelt, drinking alcohol or using drugs and driving, speeding and using a mobile phone while driving are major contributing factors to fatal accidents. Police and fire service members shared personal accounts and moving stories of families affected by loss and injury.

Students then had the opportunity to take part in a number of road safety activities, including a chance to ask the team



questions, sit in a police car, look at and discuss equipment, including a speed camera, and use a virtual reality headset to experience being in a car during hazardous driving.

Year 12 commented on how useful the information was and made them think about the consequences of driving unsafely. They came away with a clear message on how to respect the road. The speakers were engaging and the real stories were hard-hitting but the sharing of how road accidents had affected individuals and their families was thought-provoking and impactful. The fire service found that often young people new to driving feel they are invincible and many of the incidents they are called to involve young drivers. They hope their road safety package helps students learn to keep safe, learn their limits and that through this education programme there will be fewer fatalities in the future.

Our CALM acronym has been shared with the students to focus them on moving around the building safely and sensibly. In order to help ensure this we have asked the students not to move around the building with their phone, airpods or earphones visible.

We have also reinforced our expectations for break and lunch by explaining to students the reasons behind the expectations. This is designed to encourage students to take responsibility for their actions and the environment around them.

# The Compass

#### **KS3 Reading**

We use the Accelerated Reader (AR) programme to monitor our students' reading in Key Stage Three at Bosworth Academy.



Students will do a Star Reading test, online multiple choice reading test, four times in a school year. This will tell us what approximate reading age they have and what reading level AR books they should be reading to make the most progress and

improve their reading. Books within The Compass Library are marked with coloured dots/stars on the bottom of the spine to show what AR level they are. The individual AR levels and their corresponding labels can be found <a href="here">here</a>. If students are reading their own books, they can check whether the book has AR level by checking on their AR account (where they would normally take a quiz) or by searching on this website <a href="https://www.arbookfind.co.uk/">https://www.arbookfind.co.uk/</a>.

Students should be reading a minimum of 20 minutes a day to make the most progress. After they've finished each AR book, they need to log into their Renaissance Place account and click on the Accelerated Reader icon to take the quiz. Book quizzes are their evidence that they've done their reading. All the data from the book quizzes is collected and we use it to monitor the students' engagement with reading, how many quizzes they've taken and how many words they've read. We have a number of competitions and rewards linked to this.

For AR monitoring purposes, the school year is split into 4 'marking' periods (11-14 weeks each). We do a Star Reading test at the start of each



marking period and students are set reading targets which they should achieve by the end of the marking period - reward points are awarded if this is achieved. There is an extra reward, 100% badge, which students achieve if they've managed to get their AR target and were also 100% correct each time they've guizzed.



Here are our 100% badge holders for the first AR marking period of the year (1 September - 20 November): Louis C 7GHI, Austin G and Hannah T 8TNM, Harvey B, Rio C and Imogen S 8NHU, Alfie C 8GWR and George T 8PGO.



#### **Key Stage Four**


A 17-year-old girl with anterograde amnesia goes on a trip to the Arctic to find the boy she remembers kissing on a beach.
