Pete shared his story of how his drive to be an elite athlete, no matter what the sport, has seen him progress from trials at Nottingham Forest in his teens to now being <u>Wayne</u> <u>Rooney's Assistant Coach</u> at DC United.

His journey during that time has seen him be a PE teacher, complete triathlons at amateur level for Team GB and be a football coach to future England star, <u>Jude Bellingham</u>, when they were both at Birmingham City.

Pete discussed his motivations for training harder than the next person and how he visualises someone competing against him to ensure his winning mentality powers him to succeed.



Mr Grest, who met Pete when they did teacher training together at Loughborough University, identified to the students that this competitive mindset, coupled with the 6Cs, will allow them to maximise their potential as well as recovering from any setbacks.

World AIDS Day

Earlier this month on Thursday 1 December it was World AIDS Day and the occasion was remembered with Post 16 student, Gia B, writing and performing a poem as part of their Extended Project Qualification (EPQ).

"My EPQ is based around the AIDS epidemic and it questions whether the prejudice of the 1980s contributed to the 40 million deaths worldwide. It focuses on the stigma around the disease and how it still affects the LGBTQ+ community to this day, as well as the medical prejudice and ignorance of the public to those suffering because of their prejudice against marginalised communities," said Gia who



read the poem as drag performer Sylva Lining. "The inspiration around the poem and the project as a whole was the series "It's a Sin" on Channel 4. It follows the lives of a group of young gay men during the crisis and how it really changed their lives. Watching it really made me realise just how influential the pandemic was and still is, and it's something I am very passionate about! "I already had an interest in looking at the history of AIDS so when the opportunity to write about it came about it was a no-brainer. My poem covers the protests of the ACT UP! movement and the emotions that I'd imagine the people living with the virus felt.

Prejudice isn't something that can be solved overnight, and with prejudice against the LGBTQ+ community, it can be so normalised and many don't notice its effect on LGBT people (including the small comments that just reminds us that we're not 'the norm').

"I believe that education is probably the best way

to overcome prejudice of any kind! Learning about how people of marginalised identities have been oppressed in the past allows us to move past it and avoid doing the same things again in the future, so learning and accepting our part in any oppression that we perpetuate is key to learning how to avoid doing it again."

Author and actor, Ade Edmondson, has got some great tips on how to keep reading over Christmas.


Book Recommendations
