20th January 2023 Earlier in the week I am certain you will have heard the announcement about strike action by the National Education Union (NEU). Strikes are discontinuous and scheduled for 1 February, 1 March, and

Weekly Newsletter for Parents & Students 15/16 March 2023. Rounds of talks between Unions and the government are taking place on Thursday (as I write this), and Friday. It is important to know that our teachers who are in the NEU are not in dispute with Bosworth Academy or our LiFE Multi-Academy Trust, but with the government. The formal trade dispute is about 'the Secretary of State for Education failing to provide sufficient funds to employers to pay a fully funded increase in teacher's pay at a rate greater than inflation.' I would also add that schools are facing real challenges over teacher recruitment and retention which of course has a long term impact on the quality of education for our children, and must be addressed by the government.

Members of our teaching staff will make their own decision about strike action and I do understand why they would feel compelled to take this action. With nearly half of our teachers NEU members I know that this strike action will lead to at least a partial closure of our school on 1st February. I am awaiting further details of the numbers of staff involved before I can confirm with parents whether their year group will be in school that day or provided with work via our Google Classroom. I hope this can be confirmed by Thursday next week. I understand that some parents and carers will feel angry or anxious at this news, and I understand it will cause

you difficulties. Ahead of confirmation of our plans next week I would suggest that you make arrangements for childcare if this is required for your son/daughter in the possible event of their year group being at home on that day. I will endeavour to provide you with more information as soon as I can next week.

On a different note I'm delighted to share that our ex-student and Alumni, Emily Scarratt, will be visiting school on Tuesday 31st **January.** Emily is one of the world's greatest ever rugby players. Her many achievements included scoring 16 points in the 2014 Rugby World Cup final to help England beat Canada to the World title. Emily will participate in a Q&A session followed by leading a Tag Rugby session on our 3G pitch. Later in this newsletter you can find out how your child can be involved in rugby.

On Thursday 26th January we are hosting our Colours Evening for Sixth Form students. The evening begins at 5pm and we will be recognising students who have achieved in one or more of our global competencies, the 6Cs. If your son/daughter is being recognised then look out for a letter/email of invitation in the post.

Chinese New Year

Chinese New Year, also called Lunar New Year, is an annual 15-day festival in China and Chinese communities around the world that begins with the new moon that occurs sometime between January 21 and February 20 according to Western calendar and ends at the following full moon.



The origins of the Chinese New Year are steeped in legend. One legend is that thousands of years ago a monster named Nian - in English it translates to year - would attack villagers at the beginning of each new year. However, the monster was afraid of loud noises, bright lights, and the colour red, so those things were used to chase the beast away every new year. Celebrations to usher out the old year and bring forth the luck and prosperity of the new one, therefore, often include firecrackers, fireworks, and red clothes and decorations. Young people are given money in colourful red envelopes by their family. In addition, Chinese New Year is a time to feast and to visit family members. Many traditions of the season also honour relatives who have died.

Among other Chinese New Year traditions is the thorough cleaning of one's home to rid the resident of any lingering bad luck from the past year. Some people even prepare and enjoy special foods on certain days during the celebrations. The last event held during the Chinese New Year is called the Lantern Festival, during which people hang glowing lanterns in temples or carry them during a night-time parade. Since the dragon is a Chinese symbol of good fortune, a dragon dance highlights festival celebrations in many areas. This procession involves a long, colourful dragon being carried

through the streets by numerous dancers. Here at Bosworth Academy we have celebrated by having a Chinese New Year door decorating

competition by covering our tutor doors with rabbits, dragons and other festive things to celebrate the coming of the new year and the luck and prosperity it brings. We hope you like some of the wonderful doors all our year groups have made.

Spring Real LiFE Missions

This week has seen the launch of our Spring Term Real LiFE Curriculum missions.

In Year 7, students in 7ECK, 7LMA and 7MEM will be exploring the topic of Climate Change through the lens of each subject to find out what we can do to help our environment thrive for generations to come.

One of the main features of this mission is our link with the Apps for Good 'Innovate for Climate Change' course which challenges our students to apply their knowledge of Climate Change and use it to design and build a mobile app that persuades others to take positive Climate Action. Through this link with Apps for Good, our students will be able to 'pitch' their ideas to experts from the Green Tech industry via a Google Meet towards the end of February.

All of our other subject areas will be contributing to

this mission by setting milestone activities that will help our students to understand how we can solve the problem of climate change, with a collaboration between Maths and Science relating to how we can best use our green space on the Bosworth Academy site to soak up more carbon from the atmosphere; learning about Eco houses in Modern Foreign Languages, and understanding how Art and Design subjects can be used to create sustainable products.

All of the learning from the full range of subjects will be drawn upon in English lessons towards the end of this mission, where our students will be taught to present their learning in a way that persuades others to take Climate Action.

For our Year 8 Real LiFE Curriculum pioneers, 8GWR, the main focus of their Spring Term mission is



the 10X Challenge. In this national competition, students work in small teams and given an initial budget of £10. They will develop a business plan and put it into action to generate a profit from their initial budget.

Through the Real LiFE Curriculum model we are able to harness the power of other subjects and build on this mission in a way that other schools are unable to. First of all we have added the additional rules to our students that their business ideas must be ethical and sustainable - after all the whole point of the Real LiFE Curriculum is to build student agency which is the ability of students to make a positive difference to themselves and the world around them. We are also able to link other relevant subject knowledge in, with students in Maths learning about interest rates, so the "Bank of Real LiFE" is offering each 10X team the opportunity to borrow an additional £10 to get their business idea off the ground, but they would need to pay back interest on that loan! Other subject links include learning about the life-cycle of materials used in the process of producing goods in Science, learning how to set up a business in a French speaking territory, and using our skills in Performance to create a TV advert for the business that includes a musical jingle! Typically 10X teams make a profit in the region of £100 so this is a target for our teams to aim for and hopefully beat! Any profits made from the 10X Challenge will be used by the students to make a donation to charitable causes of their choice as well as investing in resources to further support their learning.

We can't wait to see what students come up with!

Jake Wins in Mexico

Former student, Jake Dennis, made the best possible start to this year's Formula E World Championship with a dominant win in Mexico City last Saturday.

After qualifying second, Jake was able to make the move into the lead on lap 12 and didn't look back despite multiple safety car periods.

The 27-year-old was able to pull out a 7.8 second lead over eventual second placed driver, Pascal Wehrlein. Full race coverage can be viewed back here. Jake, who races for Avalanche Andretti, also got the fastest lap and now leads the



championship with 26 points, 8 ahead of Wehrlein.

The drivers will next compete on the weekend of 28 January for rounds two and three of the championship around the streets of Diriyah in Saudi Arabia where Jake will look to continue his winning start.

The month of January sees us remember the Holocaust with <u>International Holocaust Memorial</u> Day.


The international day on Friday 27 January remembers the six million Jews murdered during the Holocaust, alongside the millions of other people killed under Nazi persecution of other groups and during more recent genocides in Cambodia, Rwanda, Bosnia and Darfur. The Compass is marking this occasion with book recommendations for Key Stage Three and Four related to war and the holocaust.

Key Stage Three

A young boy who survived the Nazi concentration camps arrives in the Lake District, where hopes of a new life await.



Summer 1945. The Second World War is finally over and Yossi, Leo and Mordecai are among three hundred children who arrive in the English Lake District. Having survived the horrors of the

Nazi concentration camps, they've finally reached a place of safety and peace, where they can hopefully begin to recover.

But Yossi is haunted by thoughts of his missing father and disturbed by terrible nightmares. As he waits desperately for news from home, he fears that Mordecai and Leo - the closest thing to family he has left - will move on without him. Will life by the beautiful Lake Windermere be enough to bring hope back into all their lives? Based on the real events and lives of the Windermere Boys - a group of 300 refugee children who survived the concentration camps of WWII and were relocated to Cumbria.


A Jewish man survives the horrors of Auschwitz as the camp tattooist and falls in love with one of the women he meets there.

"I tattooed a number on her arm. She tattooed her name on my heart."

In 1942, Lale Sokolov arrived in Auschwitz-Birkenau. He was given the job of tattooing the

scratching numbers into his fellow victims' arms in indelible ink to create what would become one of the most potent symbols of the Holocaust. Waiting in line to be tattooed, terrified and shaking, was a young girl. For Lale - a dandy, a jackthe-lad, a bit of a

chancer - it was



love at first sight. And he was determined not only to survive himself, but to ensure this woman, Gita, did, too.

So begins one of the most life-affirming, courageous, unforgettable and human stories of the Holocaust: the love story of the tattooist of Auschwitz.
