Through our own expert careers advisors and our partnership with the Leicestershire Education Business Company (LEBC), we organise a series of Careers events for our students. Taking place soon will be Year 11 and 12 mock job interviews and a special event for Year 9 students about how the subjects students are studying can relate to various professions. We know there is an increasing shortage of employment skills due

to the rapid pace of innovation, and as technology continues to permeate an increasing number of roles, there is a widespread need to ensure that our young people entering the employment market are equipped with the competencies needed to tackle talent shortages. That's why at Bosworth Academy we place a strong focus on careers education and maintaining our Career Mark Gold Award accreditation. It's been Race Equality Week here at Bosworth which has seen student led assemblies for all year groups. 2023 will be the biggest Race Equality Week yet with over 4000 institutions involved. Gorse Hill Farm Wellbeing


In collaboration with Leicester City FC in the Community, a group of students recently visited Gorse Hill City Farm in Leicester as part of a wellbeing programme.

Real LiFE Apps for Good

Our Real LiFE Curriculum recently featured as an <u>Impact Journey Case Study</u> by Apps for Good whose courses are designed to equip young people with digital and essential skills.

Real LiFE Curriculum is seen by Apps for Good as being "designed to make learning more relevant and engaging



through bringing topics to life and by teaching students how to make a difference to their own lives and the world around them."

Mr Hall, Real LiFE Curriculum Leader, explained how Apps for Good assists the students in preparing for a digital world:

"The sessions are really well planned and we love the fact Apps for Good is so flexible in the way we can deliver it. We build every one of our student missions around one of the UN Sustainability Goals and so when we saw the Innovate for Climate Change course, we knew it would be a great vehicle to deliver against the climate action goal.



Our students were quickly engaged in how they could take action on climate change themselves and persuade others to act. It really suited our needs and would suit the needs of any school looking to bring their computing curriculum to life." Year 8 students Alfie C and Thomas G designed an app called 'Time to Take Action', which was a competitive game-based approach to doing small things to make a big difference. They pitched their idea to industry experts and welcomed valuable feedback before adapting their finished prototype. Students said that the Apps for Good course had massively helped them develop the communication skills for this type of engagement which was "previously outside of their comfort zone".

Homes For Ukraine

"I have made mistakes along the way and have continued to work hard - all of which have prepared me for the next level.



Key Stage Three - Fiction



A 13-year-old boy tries to make sense of what is going on with his family when his older brother comes out as being transgender and identifies himself as being female. Sam Waver's life has always been pretty quiet. A bit of a loner, he struggles to make friends, and his busy parents often make him feel invisible.

Luckily for Sam, his older brother, Jason, has always been there for him. Sam idolises Jason, who seems to have life sorted - he's kind, popular, amazing at football, and girls are falling over themselves to date him.

But then one evening Jason calls his family together to tell them that he's been struggling with a secret for a long time. A secret which quickly threatens to tear them all apart. His parents don't want to know and Sam simply doesn't understand.

Because what do you do when your brother says he's not your brother at all? That he thinks he's actually...your sister?


Key Stage Three - Non Fiction

Issues surrounding gender identity and stereotypes are looked into with questions: What's the difference between sex and gender? What does it mean to be defined by your gender? Are there only two genders?

This informative book helps kids to explore these questions and more, explaining that there are

Aimed at young people aged 10 and upwards, the book encourages readers to think for




themselves about the issues involved.


always been Amanda. When I was born, I was named Andrew.

But she's going to go through a whole lot of mess (some of it funny, some not funny at all) to get to that point. Lewis is trying to tell her this... but she can't quite hear him yet.
