I most enjoy rehearsing the scene I feature most in, as it allows me to show my interpretation of Vince and to really have fun.






















See the Sound Concert



This month we feature Academic Coach and Wellbeing Mentor for Post 16, Mrs Julie Bolton.

"I have been at Bosworth Academy for five years, in this role since August 2022 and before this worked in Early Years. From one end of the spectrum to the other, it was the best move and decision I have ever made. Every day is different and the students are

EPQ Post 16 Option

The EPQ is a standalone qualification, equivalent to half an A Level, designed to extend and develop students' abilities beyond the syllabus and prepare them for university or their future career. Students lead their own projects, plan and carry out research on a topic that they've chosen and isn't covered by their other subjects.

As part of the assessment process, pupils are required to give a short presentation. Examples of this year's work include a project on 'Does Disney create unrealistic stereotypes' and 'how does social media impact men's mental health'.









Holderness Coast Year 12 Geography Trip

Year 12 Geography students have just returned from a three day residential visit to Yorkshire.



The visit introduced them to fieldwork techniques that they will write about in this summer's exams. The data they collected will also be used for Year 13 coursework studies.



This was the first time since 2019 that the exam required them to do their own fieldwork, and for some of the students it was the first time they had been on a school visit overnight! We

stayed in Beverley Youth Hostel (a former medieval priory).

Visits to Hull (investing regeneration), Spurn Point (sand dune ecosystems) and Hornsea (coastal management) made up the three days. The department made use of new digital technologies



and app based GIS, to collect, record and analyse the data thus reflecting developments in the subject rather than paper based resources. This

made for what we hope is innovative practice that will benefit students' grades. Students were a credit to their family and school. They were engaged, supportive of each other and made the visit productive and fun! Staff were extremely impressed



with their work ethic and maturity. The weather was kind to us too and we got some lovely spring sun. We'd like to thank parents and colleagues for being supportive of this exam work, and giving students the opportunity to participate in this experience. Our next A-level visit will be in June, when we will be running a shorter visit to the Peak District to study Rivers and Rural Change.
