A review team of Headteachers and other Senior School Leaders, from as far away as Manchester and Kent, were led by an Ofsted qualified inspector to work collaboratively with us as an external measure of our progress towards our targets.

This quality assurance review relies on collaborative, but challenging dialogue, and encourages open discussions about how effective our school is. It will also suggest areas where we could be more effective. During the three days the review team evaluated our progress and outcome data, observed many lessons, and met with leaders, wider staff and students. This open and honest dialogue supports us in striving to continually improve, just as we encourage all of our students to **'be better than you thought you could be'**. I will endeavour to share with you the outcomes from this peer review after the Easter break. I'd like to thank all students and staff involved, especially for all of their efforts during the final week of term!



As ever, we have celebrated many student successes at the end of term, as is our tradition. On Thursday many of our Year 11 students who have achieved in excess of 500 Prom Points enjoyed a 'Headteacher's Brunch' celebration. Our Year 9 County Basketball Champions were also recognised in a lunch celebration. This morning, in another Brunch we recognised the immense achievements of our 'Grease' production team, which they deserved after weeks of rehearsals and three amazing performances last week.

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Stephen Lawrence Day

Stephen Lawrence Day is on Saturday 22 April and Bosworth Academy will be reflecting on the part we all play in creating a society in which



everyone can flourish. It is an opportunity for young people to have their voices heard and create a society that treats everyone with fairness and respect. Through Stephen Lawrence Day we want young people to be inspired about what

they can achieve in their own lives whether in their classroom, their community or a career. We want them to get involved in creating the kind of community they want to live in and we want them to have a strong voice in building a fairer and more inclusive society.

Stephen Lawrence was 18 and studying for A-levels with aspirations to become an architect when on Thursday 22 April 1993 he was surrounded by a group of white youths and attacked. Stephen was later pronounced dead on arrival at hospital with two five-inch-deep stab wounds to his arm and chest.

As Stephen Lawrence Day is on a Saturday this year we will be remembering him throughout the following week in tutor intervention and will have a dedicated assembly on Friday 28 April led by Stephen Lawrence Ambassadors. On the same day we encourage everyone to wear an orange item of clothing with orange being Stephen's favourite colour.

Students will be able to choose to substitute ONE piece of uniform for an orange item. The options are to swap:

1. Tie
2. Shirt (with a collar to wear a tie)
3. V-necked jumper
4. Ribbons in hair
5. Socks
6. Shoe laces

The rest of the clothing must be in line with the uniform policy. There should be no t-shirts, jeans, hooded jumpers etc.

Y12 Geography Trip

Year 12 Geography students recently had a three day residential visit to Yorkshire. The visit introduced them to fieldwork techniques that they will write about in this summer's exams. The data they collected will also be used for Year 13 coursework studies.

Maths Puzzle of the Week

Calling all Bosworth Mathematicians!

This week's Maths puzzle is here and anyone can enter. All you need to do is to write your solution and any working on a piece of paper and place it in the labelled blue boxes outside the Maths office with your name on or email a photo to hbarrowcliffe@bosworthacademy.org.uk. Below is the answer to last week's conundrum as well as this week's puzzle.

Answer: 10,091

$$\begin{array}{ccccccc} & \triangle & \circ & \nabla & \blacklozenge & & \\ + & \blacklozenge & \circ & \nabla & \blacklozenge & & \\ \hline \triangle & \square & \square & \blacklozenge & \triangle & & \end{array}$$

The first deduction we can make in this puzzle is that the red triangle must equal 1. This is because:

The maximum possible sum of two 4-digit numbers is 19,998.

$$\begin{array}{ccccccc} & 1 & \circ & \nabla & \blacklozenge & & \\ + & \blacklozenge & \circ & \nabla & \blacklozenge & & \\ \hline 1 & \square & \square & \blacklozenge & 1 & & \end{array}$$

Knowing that the red triangle is 1 tells us that the purple rhombus must be 8 or 9. This is because:

$1 + \text{purple rhombus} + \text{any 'carry' from the two circles} \geq 10$

$$\begin{array}{ccccccc} & 1 & \circ & \nabla & \blacklozenge & & \\ + & 8 & \circ & \nabla & \blacklozenge & & \\ \hline 1 & \square & \square & \blacklozenge & 1 & & \end{array}$$

However, if the purple rhombus = 9 then there would be a contradiction. The blue squares would have to equal 0 (they cannot also be 1) and then the circles would also have to equal 0 as well. Therefore the purple rhombus must equal 8.

$$\begin{array}{ccccccc} & 1 & 5 & \nabla & \blacklozenge & & \\ + & 8 & 5 & \nabla & \blacklozenge & & \\ \hline 1 & 0 & 0 & \blacklozenge & 1 & & \end{array}$$

Knowing that we can deduce that the blue squares equal 0. The green circles must therefore sum to 10, meaning they can only equal 5.

We now only have three unknown shapes and we know:
Orange trapezium + black pentagon = 11, and:
 $2 \times \text{orange trapezium} + 1 < 10$

$$\begin{array}{ccccccc} & 1 & 5 & 4 & 7 & & \\ + & 8 & 5 & 4 & 4 & & \\ \hline 1 & 0 & 0 & 9 & 1 & & \end{array}$$

The only numbers we have left are 2, 3, 4, 6, 7 and 9. So the orange trapezium can only be 2, 3 or 4.

At this stage can try all three possibilities and see that unless the orange trapezium is 4 there is a contradiction. That leads to the final answer being 10,091.

Bosworth Maths Puzzle of the Week

Jennifer finds lots of sets of positive whole numbers that add together to make 15.

She then multiplies all the numbers in each set together.

Example 1: $5 + 5 + 5 = 15$ and $5 \times 5 \times 5 = 125$

Example 2: $4 + 3 + 7 + 1 = 15$ and $4 \times 3 \times 7 \times 1 = 84$

What is the largest number she can make when multiplying?

Extension: What if she had a total of 16 or 17? How do the totals increase?

Cheltenham Festival 2023

Year 13 student Sam M writes about her experience at the recent Cheltenham Festival.

For racing fans, the four days of the Cheltenham Festival are the best of the year. Walking through the gates on Tuesday 14th March, I was almost bursting with excitement. The races promised to be some of the best I had ever witnessed and they did not disappoint.

The first race, the Supreme Novices' Hurdle (for horses who were having their first season jumping obstacles) was something of a fairy tale - Barry Connell only trains a small number of horses but won this prestigious race with Marine Nationale, ridden by young jockey Mickey O'Sullivan.

This was spectacular, but the real star of the show - Constitution Hill - ran in the fourth race, the Champion Hurdle. As one of the four pinnacle races in National Hunt racing, Constitution Hill was looking to immortalise himself as a racing 'great'. He had previously won the Supreme, but

it paled in comparison to the Champion Hurdle. He didn't leave third gear and won by nine lengths, significantly beating the Irish Champion Hurdle winner, State Man. My friends and I were gushing about how we thought that Constitution Hill's performance was the best we'd seen on a racecourse. For me, this feeling was short-lived as, in the following race, two-time Champion Hurdle winner, Honeysuckle, won her second Mares' Hurdle.

Honeysuckle is an immensely special racehorse for so many racing fans. Up until December, she had been unbeaten since she began her career in November 2018. This has meant she had obtained a very dedicated following and I felt completely honoured to be there for her last race. She gave everything for her jockey, Rachael Blackmore, and battled so bravely against Love Envoi, who is two years younger.

This was an emotional success as it meant the end of an era and Honeysuckle's trainer, Henry De Bromhead, lost his son in a tragic freak riding accident. His family have said that a rainbow appears in the sky when they have had winners since Jack's passing and, sure enough, there was a rainbow looking down at Honeysuckle as she

crossed the finish line. It makes me emotional just thinking about that day when, I will admit, I fully sobbed watching the race!

There is no denying horse racing is a dangerous sport, but the BHA are constantly making efforts to make the sport safer. One of the latest evolutions has been the change of markings on obstacles to white, from orange, based on a new study. Jockeys have told me they believe this was a positive change, but one Irish racehorse, Energumene, did take a disliking to the last fence at Cheltenham in January because of it! Similarly, the BHA has changed its rules regarding the whip, one of the most controversial parts of the sport. Officially known as a 'Procush', it is different to the whips used in other equine sports: the part that comes in contact with the horse is made of foam. The BHA have lowered the permitted number of uses and placed tighter restrictions on the style the jockeys can use. This was a divisive issue, but, overall, it has been a



positive change for the sport and equine welfare. Additionally, the Jockey Club has attempted to make attending the horse racing more accessible through removing the dress code at its racecourses. It was most definitely more relaxed, but most people chose to still dress up for the occasion. It is important that people feel comfortable visiting

racecourses and are not deterred by perceived prestige and elitism.

Horse racing has so much excitement to offer and the next big race is the Grand National at Aintree, which you can watch live on ITV at 17:15 on Saturday 15th April. Keep your eyes peeled for Corach Rambler, who won on Cheltenham Tuesday. You will struggle to miss him as he has a splash of white on his face and bright purple and yellow colours. He will be spectacular to watch over the famous Grand National fences! I'll be heading to Leicester Races on the 14th and, as I am a content creator for Careers In Racing, make sure to keep an eye on their social media pages (@CareersInRacing on [Twitter](#) and [Instagram](#)) for lots of updates and more information about how young people can get involved in horse racing!

What Autism Means to Me

Leicestershire's Autism Outreach Team is offering students the opportunity to showcase and celebrate their creative talents whilst increasing understanding and acceptance of Autism. Be inspired to create artwork by highlighting 'What Autism Means to Me'. This artwork can be created by individual students, in groups or as a whole class. It can be created by neurodiverse and neurotypical pupils individually or together. As well as ensuring the artwork is clearly marked with the name of the artist(s) and school, be sure to accompany your artwork with a personalised quote to further illustrate the artwork and its meaning.

Autism Outreach will share all contributions through a presentation which will be sent to all schools taking part. Selected artwork will be used (with the permission of the artist) on Autism Outreach information leaflets, as part of Leicestershire County Council's training presentations and to form a display at County Hall to share with other teams and services.

For Students with an EHCP

SENA are now managing over 6000 EHCPs, all of which have to be reviewed on an annual basis.

The existing arrangement, in line with the SEND

Code of Practice, is that education providers take the lead for organising the annual review, inviting relevant people to attend

and/or submit a report, chairing the review, completing the review documentation and ensuring that the review report containing any recommendations for changes to the plan is returned to SENA.

A useful summary of the annual review process, including transition reviews, preparation for adulthood and ceasing plans can be found [here](#). This includes a link to the Annual Review templates and a helpful '5 prompts' overview. Information for parents and carers can be found [here](#).

There have been an increasing number of requests from schools for SENA case managers to attend annual review meetings. Due to the growth in overall EHCP numbers (from 4222 in January 2020 to 6044 in January 2023) it is not usually possible for SENA staff to attend the annual review. Please indicate the outcome of each annual review on the cover sheet of the report by ticking the relevant box (options 'a, through to 'f') and return as per the guidance so that reviews that recommend significant changes can be prioritised.

We would like to apologise for the significant delays being experienced and the frustration that this causes to all concerned. By following the above process we will be able to focus capacity upon those children with the most urgent needs. Book Recommendations




World Autism Awareness Day

Our book recommendations this week focus on autism in celebration of World Autism Awareness Day on Sunday 2 April. We have a great selection of books across all genres and age groups in the Compass Library.

Key Stage Three



Leon a thirteen-years-old, forms a club with his classmates Tanya, and Lawrence in order to manage school bullying and family drama. Leon John Crothers is 4779 days old (thirteen years and one month, if you're mathematically challenged). He has been 'moved on'

from six different schools and most people think he has an attitude problem. Leon doesn't care for the label, in the same way that he doesn't care for Tim Burton, supermarket trolleys, train fanatics or Bounty bars.

This time, however, things may turn out differently, as help comes from where he least expects it - Dr Snot, a physician at pains to help Leon navigate 'normal' and classmates, Tanya and Lawrence, who both face their own challenges. When school bully Glen Jenkins humiliates Leon in the school

canteen and almost destroys Lawrence, Leon very reluctantly agrees to the formation of a club, The Asparagus Bunch.

How Leon manages to navigate school woes and family drama - and astonishingly ends up with not one but two friends - is nothing short of a miracle, or maybe just simply down to being different.

Autobiography of a 13-year-old autistic boy, translated by the author



when he was only thirteen, this remarkable book provides rare insight into the often baffling behaviour of autistic children.

Using a question and answer format, Naoki explains things like why

he talks loudly or repeats the same questions, what causes him to have panic attacks, and why he likes to jump. He also shows the way he thinks and feels about his world - other people, nature, time and beauty, and himself.

Abundantly proving that people with autism do possess imagination, humour and empathy, he also makes clear how badly they need our compassion, patience and understanding. David Mitchell and his wife have translated Naoki's book so that it might help others dealing with autism and generally illuminate a little-understood condition. Its gives us an exceptional chance to enter the mind of another and see the world from a strange and fascinating perspective.



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In the Loop Memories



“A number of our Year 8 girls were given the opportunity to take part in an event that encourages girls to explore exciting and challenging roles within the construction

industry. The event was run by Louise and Jo from Blaby District Council and the girls were introduced to Sophie and Carrie, from Lendlease who have leading roles on large construction projects. It was a fantastic opportunity to find out about their route

into what still remains a male dominated industry. The girls were fascinated to find out about rewarding and exciting career paths, involving multi-disciplinary skills and where no two days are the same.



The girls were then challenged to take part in a teamwork puzzle solving exercise to build a giant pyramid using just short canes and elastic bands. Hopefully this session will have provided a valuable insight into careers in construction to enable girls to challenge gender typical employment roles.”
