Welcome

Thank you to all parents for your support over the industrial action day this week. These are tough times and we realise the challenges that missing school places on children and families. On Thursday we were able to provide some good quality learning for our exam year students who have exams approaching. With an increase in the number of NEU staff on strike we were not able to widen provision to another year group in school. There is a second planned day of industrial action on **Tuesday 2nd May 2023**. Students in examination **Years 11, 12 and 13 must attend school as normal**. On **Tuesday 2nd May 2023** - students in **Years 7, 8, 9 and 10** will be **expected to learn from home**.

Resources will be available and shared on the Google Classroom. Thank you to students for engaging in this work and developing real independence. Vulnerable students and those who are entitled to free school meals will be contacted separately about the arrangements.

It was great today to recognise Stephen Lawrence Day, Hopeful Futures, which all LIFE Multi-Academy Schools engaged in. The day aims to commemorate the life and legacy of Stephen, collaborating closely with De Montfort University Stephen Lawrence Research Centre. We have a duty to ensure our students will contribute to a fairer and more equitable society. Being anti-racist, and by not accepting any form of prejudice or hostility is so important in our school and wider community. By wearing an item of orange we showed our support across the school and our student leaders led assemblies for each year group with confidence and true passion.

At the moment we are in the process of working with Roberts Travel Group to find out the home to school bus pass prices for next academic year. Due to higher costs for bus companies from driver and staff salaries, energy costs and high fuel prices we are expecting that passes will increase in price. As ever, we will subsidise the costs for children in receipt of free school meals. We fully understand that the cost of living increases are causing real hardship for many families and hope that we can work with Roberts to support where we can. Once the pricing is determined we will share this with parents/carers.

Showing others that you are an ally, that you care about their well-being and are committed to diversity, inclusion, equity and anti-racism is a good way to take action against racism and all forms of hate. As **Mahatma Ghandi** said back in 1925, **"Our ability to reach unity in diversity will be the beauty and the test of our civilization."** Nearly a hundred years later we still have many challenges to remove all prejudices. Let's all encourage our children to help cultivate our vision for a diverse and inclusive community.

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Stephen Lawrence Week

Stephen's story is both challenging and inspirational. He was a normal young person who made the most of everyday opportunities. Although his life was short, Stephen provides a positive role model of a life well lived.



Stephen Lawrence was born and grew up in south-east London. Like most young people, he juggled an active social life, school work, family commitments, and part-time employment. But he also had ambitions to use

his talent for Maths, Art, and Design to become an architect, and wanted to have a positive impact on his community.

Tragically, his dream of becoming an architect was never realised. On 22 April 1993, at the age of just 18, Stephen was murdered in an unprovoked racist attack. He didn't know his killers and his killers didn't know him.

After the initial police investigation, five suspects were arrested but not convicted. A public inquiry into the handling of Stephen's case was held in 1998, leading to the publication of the Macpherson Report, which has been called 'one of the most important moments in the modern history of criminal justice in Britain'.

It led to profound cultural changes in attitudes to racism, to the law and to police practice. It also paved the way for a greater understanding of discrimination of all forms and new equalities legislation.'

Stephen Lawrence Day is celebrated annually on 22nd April, with a variety of events happening across the country. Stephen Lawrence Day is an opportunity for everyone to come together and honour Stephen's life and legacy, stand up against discrimination in our daily lives, and work

towards a more hopeful tomorrow. Bosworth Academy has chosen to remember Stephen over the course of a



week in a variety of different activities in school. We have been running a student led assembly all week to all year groups. This assembly was designed by our Stephen Lawrence ambassadors in school and had an important message in reminding students that we can all take our part in being anti-racist. If students witness or experience any discrimination, there are procedures in place to make sure that when they report these incidents they are dealt with efficiently. It is important that students work together in reporting these incidents so we can support any students who may be involved.

We have also had a Tutor Intervention session on Friday 28th April where we have explored Stephen's story further and actually what a hate incident is. We have then discussed in KS4/KS5 if Stephen's case has changed anything in Britain from 1993 - 2023 in regards to the police failings/ racially motivated incidents. In KS3, we have written a code of conduct in our tutor groups around hate incidents and how we should all be conducting ourselves.



Finally on Friday 28th April, we wore an item of Orange which was Stephen's favourite colour. We do this to remember Stephen, remember his legacy and see that we are the change that we want to see in this world. We do this to make sure that the next 30 years are different from the last.

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Real Life Genius Hour

Over the last two years, lots of our Real LiFE Curriculum students have achieved amazing things through the personal enrichment goals that they are able to set themselves during CREW time.



A recent example of this was with a group of students in 8GWR who are currently working with engineers at Caterpillar to create a physical version of a reaction game that they developed during CREW. We have also seen many other fabulous examples of our students using the personal goals in CREW to be leaders of their own personal development, such as taking their first steps to learn new languages, researching areas of interest to create and delivering 'master class' presentations and developing their entries for national educational competitions. The wonderful progress these students have been making mirrors the findings of research that informed the development of the Real LiFE Curriculum, in that good goal setters develop better problem solving skills and higher levels of student agency.

To build on this success and to encourage our students to be as ambitious as possible with their personal goals, our CREW leaders now dedicate one CREW lesson per week which is now called "Genius Hour". Schools around the world have been using this concept for a number of years really successfully and we know that we are in a position to do the same at Bosworth. To help coach our students through the goal setting process our CREW leaders share a Personalised Learning Menu which is full of ideas and guidance and they monitor the goals that our students set through the weekly goal setting assignments on Google Classroom. Currently the Real LiFE Curriculum is being delivered to students in 7ECK, 7LMA, 7MEM and 8GWR, but we are already starting to utilise some of its key teaching and learning strategies with classes across the school as we continue to deliver our aim of building student agency to prepare our students to thrive both now and in the future!

Uniform Expectations

This year we have worked really hard to improve our uniform standards, it is really nice to see our students looking so smart. A minority of students have continued to wear a hoodie or tracksuit top which must not be worn in school. We are not prepared to continually ask students to follow our uniform code. Front of School Access

At the front of the school we have a number of disabled bays for those with blue badges to park their vehicle.

The school buses leave the site at approximately 3.20PM and by 3.25PM the bus park area will be clear for you to pick up your child at this time.

The Compass Library will be open for students to complete homework or reading whilst they wait.

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Sports Day 2023

We are excited to inform you about the annual Bosworth Academy Sports Day. It is always an important event in the Summer Term calendar, which is an inclusive event offering a variety of activities to suit students of all abilities and interests. We believe



it is an opportunity for all students to have a personal best aspirational attitude, demonstrate important social skills as well as show courage. All of these values are part of the 6C framework that we buy into at Bosworth both in and out of the classroom.

As in previous years we will be holding the **Sports Day at Saffron Lane Athletics Stadium** during school time on **Monday 10 July**. All students will represent their tutor group in a variety of events, such as traditional athletics events, as well as non traditional events, such as tug of war, welly wanging and other challenges. Awards will be presented for, not only the most successful tutor group in the events, but also to individuals who demonstrate many of the 6Cs (character, collaboration, creativity, citizenship, communication, critical thinking). 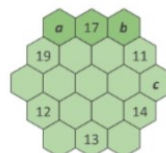

Maths Puzzle of the Week

Calling all Bosworth Mathematicians!

This week's Maths puzzle is here and anyone can enter. All you need to do is to write your solution and any working on a piece of paper and place it in the labelled blue boxes outside the Maths office with your name on or email a photo to hbarrowcliffe@bosworthacademy.org.uk. Below is the answer to last week's conundrum as well as this week's puzzle.



The Outer Ring

To start, we know that hexagons *a* and *b* must sum to 21 as each row totals 38. As we are only using the numbers 1-19 and several numbers have already been used, there are only three possible combinations:

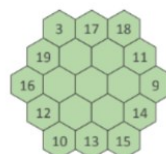
3 and 18	5 and 16	6 and 15
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One way of working out which combination is correct is to check which of those six numbers could be *b*. Considering that *b* and *c* must sum to 27:

- We can instantly rule out 3, 5 and 6 as they are too small.
- *b* cannot equal 15, as then *c* would have to be 12 (which has already been used).
- *b* cannot equal 16 as then *c* would have to be 13 (already used).

That means we now know *b* = 18 and *a* = 3. From there it is straightforward to fill out the rest of the puzzle.

Remaining numbers: 1, 2, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8.



The Inner Ring

One way to start the inner ring is to notice that hexagons *e* and *f* must sum to 14. This means they must be 8 and 6. However, *e* cannot be 8 as it would be too large for the row it shares with *d*.

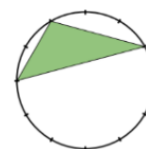
That means we now know *e* = 6 and *f* = 8. From there it is straightforward to fill out the rest of the puzzle. We can then see that the number in the red hexagon must be 2.



Bosworth Maths Puzzle of the Week

Karin uses three points of a clock face to make different triangles.

She does not count the triangles as different if they are a rotation or a reflection of each other. The three triangles below are all the same.



How many different triangles can she make?

Extension: How many different quadrilaterals can she make?

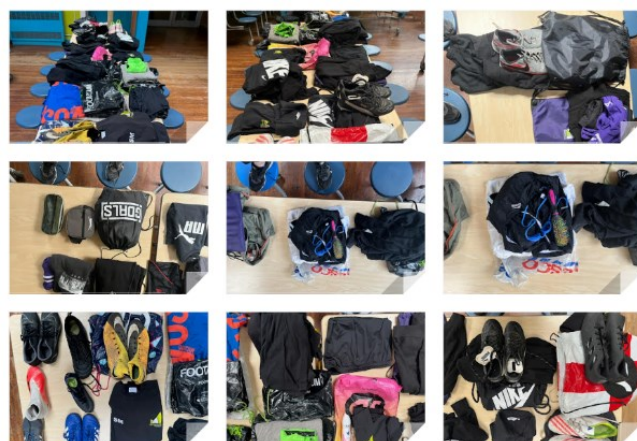
PE Lost Property

When Tom's mum and Zofia's dad announce they are having a baby and moving in together, the polar opposite children struggle to cope with the situation.

Tom is still quiet and timid, even though his dad has been gone for nearly two years now.

Zofia is the opposite. Inside her there's a raging storm that makes her want to fight the whole world until she gets what she wants.

And what she wants is for scaredy-cat Tom to get out of her life. Tom hates loud, unpredictable Zofia just as much, but he's moving into Zofia's house. Because his mum and Zofia's dad are in love... and they're having a baby.

Tom and Zofia both wish the stupid baby had never happened. But then Tom's mum gets ill, and it begins to look horribly like their wish might come true...

A story of learning to trust, trying to let go and diving into the unknown with hope in your heart.



Key Stage Four

When the electricity is switched off and life as we know it ends, Dylan and his mum must survive by reverting to old ways of living.

Dylan was six when The End came, back in 2018; when the electricity went off for good, and the 'normal' 21st century world he knew disappeared. Now he's 14 and he and his mum have survived in

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their isolated hilltop house above the village of Nebo in north-west Wales, learning new skills, and returning to old ways of living. Despite their close understanding, the relationship between mother and son changes subtly as Dylan must take on adult responsibilities. And they each have their own

secrets, which emerge as, in turn, they jot down their thoughts and memories in a found notebook - the Blue Book of Nebo.

The **29 April 2022 edition** featured Bosworth Academy students taking part in a Paralympic Festival at Loughborough University where they were interviewed by the BBC.
