very important message ensuring that students are informed and feel supported at a challenging time and I would like to publicly thank them for their contribution.





Stephen Lawrence Day

Stephen's story is both challenging and inspirational. He was a normal young person who made the most of everyday opportunities. Although his life was short, Stephen provides a positive role model of a life well lived. Stephen Lawrence was born and grew up in



south-east London. Like most young people, he juggled an active social life, school work, family commitments, and part-time employment. But he also had ambitions to use his talent for Maths, Art, and Design to become an architect, and wanted to have a positive impact on his community.

Tragically, his dream of becoming an architect was never realised. On 22 April 1993, at the age of just 18, Stephen was murdered in an unprovoked racist attack. He didn't know his killers and his killers didn't know him.

After the initial police investigation, five suspects were arrested but not convicted. A public inquiry into the handling of Stephen's case was held in 1998, leading to the publication of the

Macpherson Report, which has been called 'one of the most important moments in the modern history of criminal justice in Britain'.

It led to profound cultural changes in attitudes to racism, to the law and to police practice. It also paved the way for a greater understanding of discrimination of all forms and new equalities legislation.'

Stephen Lawrence Day is celebrated annually on

22nd April, with a variety of events happening across the country. Stephen Lawrence Day is an opportunity for everyone to come together and honour Stephen's life and legacy, stand up against discrimination in our daily lives, and work towards a more hopeful tomorrow.

Bosworth Academy chose to remember Stephen over the course of a week in a variety of different activities in school. We have been running a student led assembly all week to all year groups. This assembly was designed by our Stephen Lawrence ambassadors in school and had an important message in reminding students that we can all take our part in being anti-racist. If students witness or experience any discrimination, there are procedures in place to make sure that when they report these incidents they are dealt with efficiently. It is important that students work together in reporting these incidents so we can support any students who may be involved.

We have also had a Tutor Intervention session on Friday 28th April where we have explored Stephen's story further and actually what a hate incident is. We have then discussed in Key Stage 5 if Stephen's case has changed anything in Britain from 1993 - 2023 in regards to the police failings/ racially motivated incidents.



Finally on Friday 28th April, we wore an item of Orange which was Stephen's favourite colour. We do this to remember Stephen, remember his legacy and see that we are the change that we want to see in this word. We do this to make sure that the next 30 years are different from the last. **Mrs Moran**

Preparation For Exams

As the exam season starts it is crucial that students attend all timetabled lessons, right up until their exam, so that teachers are able to provide additional support and guidance. Students in Year 12 who have an afternoon exam may take the morning off to prepare. This does not apply if they have a morning exam and want the preceding afternoon off, as they will have the evening before for final preparation. Students requesting a morning's absence should email Lesley Brookes in the Post 16 Office to ensure that it is coded.

The same criteria apply to students in Year 13, who should continue attending timetabled lessons until the last exam for each subject.

Once the exam and course are complete, the subject teacher will notify Attendance, the register will be appropriately coded, and students will no longer be required to attend.

Research has shown that having a good breakfast can improve student performance. We know that due to a number of issues, some students are missing out on this vital meal and so from Monday, 15 May 2023, we will be providing cereal for students who may not have had the opportunity to have breakfast before their exams. This will be available in Julie Bolton's office from 8.15 am - 8.35 am.

"Being a Head of Year in Post-16 is a dream role. I am also part of the awesome Human and Social Studies team, teaching Humanities and Psychology. "I have been at Bosworth Academy since my NQT year, so around 12 years. I love working here. We

have a focus on developing the whole student through our 6Cs - Character, Collaboration, Critical thinking, Communication, Creativity and Citizenship.

"Our staff work hard to support students through their A Levels and we recognise that these qualifications are a big step up from GCSEs, so students receive direction, nurturing and encouragement, but we also invest in promoting student agency and well-being. Our Post-16 students act as positive role models for students in lower years in the school.

"Post-16 students see their fabulous tutor everyday during tutor time, where they'll participate in a PSHE programme that includes activities to promote positive mental health and time to explore future pathways. Subject staff are enthusiastic, caring and knowledgeable and offer varied support for students, such as resourcing a Google Classroom, putting on revision sessions and giving personalised feedback for students to respond to." For those currently in Year 11 Alison says that "the more you get involved and the more you embrace our culture and throw yourself into the opportunities on offer, the more you'll gain a positive experience".

"A Levels are hard work, but if you've found something you're passionate about and interested in exploring at a deeper level, we can help you succeed. Choose A Levels you think you'll enjoy," Alison advises.

Outside of school Alison enjoys singing in a choir, cuddling cats and doing Yoga, "there's great physical, social and emotional benefits from them all, I'd encourage everyone to get involved!
