This is not an Ofsted inspection, but a 'challenging' quality assurance review led by an expert Lead Reviewer and team of Headteachers and Senior Leaders from across the country.

We have a lot to be proud of following this review as we received valuable feedback on our provision including identified areas of strength to build on. As part of our commitment to transparency and involving parents in the improvement process we are sharing the feedback that we have recently received with you. This collaborative approach to improvement ensures that parents are engaged in their child's education and can support us in creating the best possible environment for learning.

Challenge Partners use judgements in three areas on a 4-point scale; Leading, Effective, Working towards or Ineffective.

Our overall judgements were: Leadership at all Levels: Leading

Quality of Provision for students & their outcomes: Leading

(This includes; students' attitudes, quality of curriculum, provision for SEND & Disadvantaged students)

Overall school effectiveness: Leading


We were proud that our 'Careers Provision' was recognised as an 'Area of Excellence'.

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Challenge Partners

Following our Quality Assurance three-day review by Challenge Partners, a national organisation that facilitates school improvement and shares leading practice, the following findings were made:

Key strengths identified;

- Bosworth Academy is a school that does not stand still.
- * The school is continually evolving their broad and ambitious curriculum. Curriculum refinement is ongoing and now making effective connections between subjects. Careful sequencing benefits pupils' learning.
- Curriculum enquiries create quality assurance giving opportunities for teachers and pupils to speak about the quality of education.
- Pupil leadership is very strong. Pupils are empowered and enabled to make a difference. Mentoring improves culture for learning.
- * Staff feel valued and looked after. Teachers believe that they are trusted and that their professionalism is respected by leaders.
- * Teachers use assessment for learning effectively to check pupils' understanding. Through questioning, teachers effectively identify pupils' misconceptions and then act swiftly to intervene and provide support.
- Lessons have clear routines from the beginning, including 'do it now tasks' which support pupils' positive engagement from the very start of sessions. Student success is celebrated in all aspects of school life.
- * There are strong relationships between staff and pupils. Pupils feel safe and well supported by teachers. Pupils are clear as to what is expected of them and this supports a calm and purposeful learning environment in classrooms and around the school.
- A high quality extra-curricular and enrichment offer supports pupils' personal development & community engagement.
- Vulnerable pupils are clear that they feel well supported to access all opportunities that the school provides. There is a wide range of adults that they can go to if they need any assistance or support.
- * There is a strong prioritisation of reading and pupils are very positive about how the school is aiding their literacy acquisition. This develops their positive attitudes

- towards reading.
- * Recognising, supporting and celebrating diversity is a key strategic intention for the school. Students feel that their religions and cultures are valued. Pupils reported more diversity represented in the curriculum.
- * Staff's detailed knowledge of pupils allows the effective deployment of Teaching Assistants for vulnerable pupils, encouraging high pupil engagement.
- * Bosworth has a comprehensive careers curriculum that is firmly embedded across the school from Year 7.
- * The school's '6 Cs' approach, a valuesbased personal development curriculum, provides pupils with the opportunity to develop their broader employment skills.
- Leaders have developed a vast experience network through their strong links to local employers.
- Destination data shows vulnerable pupils increasingly accessing level 3 courses, enhancing life opportunities. The school's levels of young people not in education, employment or training is very low.
- Leaders provide strong support and challenge in the interests of providing exceptional opportunities for every pupil.

Even better if...

- ... behaviour and culture systems were further embedded, whilst the upskilling of some staff continues, leading to even greater consistencies and expectations.
- ... there was even further consistency in the engagement of students in responding to teacher feedback on their learning.
- ... expectations were consistently high in classrooms with students feeling challenged in all lessons

We are continuing to focus on the areas identified for further improvement through professional learning and coaching sessions with our staff.

Preparation For P16 Exams

As the exam season starts it is crucial that students attend all timetabled lessons, right up until their exam, so that teachers are able to provide additional support and guidance. Students in Year 12 who have an afternoon exam may take the morning off to prepare. This does not apply if they have a morning exam and want the preceding afternoon off, as they will have the evening before for final preparation. Students requesting a morning's absence should email Lesley Brookes in the Post 16 Office to ensure that it is coded.

The same criteria apply to students in Year 13, who should continue attending timetabled lessons until the last exam for each subject.

Once the exam and course are complete, the subject teacher will notify Attendance, the register will be appropriately coded, and students will no longer be required to attend.

Research has shown that having a good breakfast can improve student performance.

We know that due to a number of issues, some students are missing out on this vital meal and so from Monday 15 May 2023, we will be providing cereal for students who may not have had the opportunity to have breakfast before their exams. Maths Puzzle of the Week

Calling all Bosworth Mathematicians!

This week's Maths puzzle is here and anyone can enter. All you need to do is to write your solution and any working on a piece of paper and place it in the labelled blue boxes outside the Maths office with your name on or email a photo to hbarrowcliffe@bosworthacademy.org.uk.

Below is the answer to last week's conundrum as well as this week's puzzle.

Last Week: Answer 100

This is not a simple puzzle. If we were to test all the possible ways in which we could put the six numbers into the grid then there would be 120

combinations to check. The first step in simplifying the puzzle is to realise that the numbers in the middle column are multiplied by 3 other numbers, whereas the corners are only

multiplied by just 2.

Therefore the largest numbers (5 and 6) must go in the middle column in order to maximise the total.

It's actually possible to check all the possibilities at this stage because with 5 and 6 in the middle column there are only 12 possible combinations left (excluding reflections).

However, we could apply a little more logic first. The remaining 4 numbers can be "paired off" in just three different ways, as shown below.

Keeping the pairs as 1,2 and 3,4 is clearly the best way of maximising our total.

Finally we just need to put the three columns we have found (12, 34 and 56) into the grid to produce the maximum total. This can be done by

keeping the largest numbers next to each to each other, as shown in the grid on the left. There are four (reflected) ways of doing this which all make the same total of 100.

This Week's Puzzle—How Many Results?

Two team's played a series of 3 football matches against each other. The teams are called Norwich City and Ipswich Town.

Ipswich Town won exactly 2 of the 3 matches played. There were 6 goals scored in total. Some examples of what could have happened are shown below:

Examples B and C do not count as a different set of results. They are just the same but in a different order.

Extension: What if there were 7 goal scored in total? Or 4 matches?

String Telephones

RS in Desford


As part of learning a Religious Studies topic on 'Was Jesus Radical?', some Year 7 students visited St Martin's in Desford last week.






adventure, if Orin wants to save his home.
