At breaks and lunches students have been excited



This year Bosworth Academy has had outstanding success with many students achieving 3 or more A* grades at A level whilst obtaining their chosen courses.

This year's results are significant as Ofqual have returned to pre-pandemic grading meaning that national results will be more comparable with pre-pandemic 2019 outcomes.

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Behaviour Expectations

We have very high expectations for our students at Bosworth Academy and these high expectations help to foster a positive culture for learning and a calm environment, the ideal prerequisite for students to be happy, safe and achieve excellent outcomes.

Our expectations can be summarised with the Bosworth Big Three:

- Be Kind
- An hour's work in an hour's lesson
- First time, every time

To support students in achieving these expectations, we have been teaching students our expectations through our behaviour curriculum. This will continue in the new year. We are keen to ensure that all students are aware of what to do at different points of the school day and students will know what to do from being taught, as we would teach any other subject. This teaching will take place in assemblies, during tutor time and will be reinforced in lessons. We would appreciate it if you would support us with this curriculum to ensure the very best experience for all of our students. All students have been taught about our Bosworth Big Three this week. Our routines are also crucial to ensure

a smooth running of the school day. **Routines**

At the start of the day:

Students are expected to walk calmly and immediately to their tutor room upon arrival at school.

At the start of lessons:

 Students should arrive on time and get the relevant equipment out for the lesson and begin work immediately so as to avoid wasting any time in the lesson. This includes having a fully charged school iPad.

During lessons:

- Work hard for the whole of the lesson, completing all work set to a high standard.
- Follow all instructions, first time, every time.
- Only talk when it is appropriate. Talk to everyone with respect.
- Phones and headphones should not be seen during lessons or when walking around corridors during the day.

At the end of lessons:

- Wait until told to pack away quietly.
- Wait to be dismissed in silence.
- When told, leave the class in a calm, quiet, orderly manner.
- Continue this calmness in corridors. Lesson changeover:
- We expect a CALM environment at the changeover of lessons and when moving around the building
- Consider others as you move around. Stay on the left.
- Always walk quietly, respect the environment, keep hands and feet to yourself. Respect other people's space.

Listen carefully to any instructions you are given, follow them first time.

- Move safely around the building, take the quickest route to your lesson.
- All phones and headphones should be away during lesson changeover.

Breaks and Lunches:

- Be kind and respectful to all staff and students.
- Use the canteen at the allocated time. Queue sensibly.
- Only eat in the canteen or picnic areas.
- Fill water bottles during this time. Students are not allowed out of lessons to do this.

Go to the toilet. Unless they have a pass, students are not allowed to leave lessons to go to the toilet. If students do need to go to the toilet during lessons, we will expect them to make up the lost learning time.

- Pick up any litter and put it in the bin.
- Move to lesson when instructed to, calmly and quietly.

We would like to take this opportunity to clarify some of our expectations around our uniform. The vast majority of our students get this right but to ensure consistency we have outlined the expectations <u>here</u>.

Finally, a reminder that students should come to school with their iPad fully charged for the day. Students who fail to bring their iPad will need to swap their phone for an iPad at the start of the day so that they can fully engage with their lessons. I've really enjoyed meeting pupils who have all been really polite and respectful. I feel very privileged to be here and part of the team," said Mrs Hartley.





Maths Puzzle of the Week


Last Time's Answer: 38


The most common mistakes in this puzzle were:





The first equation clearly tells us that the 'polygon symbol' must equal 15. However, working out how much it is worth without the square in it is not as obvious. It was 15 because there were 15 sides to the three polygons so when the square is removed we are left with 11.











Now we know what the 'polygon symbol' is worth the second equation tells us that a bunch of four bananas is worth 3.

With the bunch of bananas now known the third equation tells us a clock face pointing at 3 is worth 3. This leads to a clock face pointing at 2 being worth 2.


With all symbols deciphered the final equation becomes:

$$2 + 3 + 3 \times 11 = 38$$

Mathematics has strict rules about which order you should perform operations in. The order is often remember with the mnemonic BIDMAS. Using BIDMAS means we multiply first to get 2 + 3 + 33 and the answer is 38.

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What Parents & Carers Need to Know about



SHARING PHOTOS ONILINIE



WHAT ARE THE RISKS? Schoolisoftenatimechock-fullofmilestonesforyourchild, and you may well be eager to share their accomplishments with the world. Intoday is digital age, sharing linages of such precious moments on social media is common place, and—while that is a lovely thing to do—lit does come with some fisks attached. Our guide can help parents and cares to consider the potential dangers and make informed choices about safely sharing photos of their children online.

INVASIONS OF PRIVACY

Even with the right settings in place, absolutely nothing online is 100% private. Anyone who can view your photos could take screenshots and potentially share them elsewhere. Privacy settings are still important, though, so it's always wise to ensure your social media accounts have them set up; just bear in mind that you can't completely control what happens to anything once it's gone online.

REVEALING PERSONAL DETAILS

Small details in photos can often reveal personal information. Backgrounds can give clues to where you live, for example, while school logos on uniforms, sports kits, or bags could help someone identify which school your child attends. With interactive maps and reverse image searches commonplace online, information like this could easily be misused by an individual with malicious intentions.

MISUSE OF IMAGES

Once something's been shared online, it's almost impossible to get it deleted. Photos can show up in search engine results and be downloaded, manipulated, and shared without consent. There's the potential for someone's images to be used for advertising purposes (which in many cases, isn't illegal) or even more inappropriate reasons, such as cyber-bullying or serious forms of exploitation.

ONLINE GROOMING

Pictures that convey details about your child's interests, activities, or daily routines could arm an online predator with the kind of information they can deploy to gain a child's trust. They might use this knowledge to pretend to be the same age as the child or to have a shared hobby. Essentially, the more a predator knows about a young person, the easier it is for them to

PRESSURE TO PLEASE

When their parents or carers share notable moments and accomplishments in a child's life on social media, some children may begin to feel an expectation to always meet certain standards, to achieve things, or to behave in ways that are "worth sharing". Knowing that other people (even friends and family) can see these posts on social media might also add to the pressure they're feeling internally.

IMPACT ON DIGITAL FOOTPRINT

Every photo of a child posted online contributes to their digital footprint Young people's lives have never been so closely and publicly documented as they are now, and this permanent online presence could affect a child's future apportunities or the choices they make as they grow up – in addition to influencing how they see themselves and, consequently, their emotional wellbeina.

Advice for Parents & Carers

REVIEW SETTINGS REGULARLY

Make sure your social media's secure in terms of who can view your content or see your location (only family and trusted friends, for example). Privacy settings aren't totally foolproof, but they do make t tougher for strangers to access your pics. Reviewing your settings egularly is also a good starting to the properties of the province of the pro

CONSIDER OTHER CHILDREN

When taking a group photo, make sure you get parents' or carers' permission to share it on social media. There may be an important safeguarding reason for them not wanting their child's photo posted publicly online, or it might simply not tally with their personal beliefs or cultural background. A quick conversation in advance, just to make sure, is usually hugely appreciated.

CHECK YOUR PHOTOS

#backtoschool

Photos of your child shouldn't provide any clues to where they live or go to school: even a house number, street name, or car number plate could be a giveaway. Cover up or blur out school logos, too. If you really want to share a particular pic, you could post a watermarked or low-res version, which can help to discourage misuse as those images are less appealing to download or reproduce.

THINK AHEAD

Try to consider the longer-term implications of what you post. Would you be happy with that photo being online in 10 years' time? Would your child still be OK with the image when they're older? Once your child is mature enough, you could ask for their consent before posting: it respects their privacy, fosters trust and understanding, and helps them to start thinking about their own online life.


Book Recommendations




captors to look for their original homes, what has been unleashed on the dragon world may be far more than the revolutionary planners intended.

iPad Use

Our aim at Bosworth Academy is to plan and

deliver lessons that are exciting, interactive and encourage high levels of critical thinking as this will result in greater progress. In order for all our students to achieve, it is essential that they come to the lessons equipped for learning.



In order to facilitate an excellent learning experience, and to support students to engage with all classroom activities, students have been given an iPad: a valuable resource that can be a powerful learning tool. Students are required to bring a fully charged iPad to school. Equipment will be checked by form tutors each morning, as we are keen to ensure that students have everything they need to fully participate in lessons. Many lessons are designed around the use of technology. Without an iPad, students will be unable to fully participate in the learning and could be hindered in developing the technological skill set required for their futures in the workplace. To address this, from the new academic year, students who forget to bring an iPad to school, bring an iPad to school that is not charged or have an iPad being repaired by the IT Department, will be allowed to borrow a 'loan iPad' from the school.

In exchange for a loan iPad, students will be asked to leave their mobile phone as a security deposit. Due to the expense of providing additional iPads, we are keen to ensure that these are well looked after and returned at the end of the school day, which is why we are asking students to exchange a high value possession. Students can collect their mobile phones at the end of the day when they return their iPad.

We recognise that for some students, being without a mobile phone during the school day will be an inconvenience, but we hope that students will make choices that prioritise their learning to ensure that they can fully achieve their potential. 
