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Maths Puzzle of the Week

Last Week's Answer: \$101

We know that both the number of hats sold and the price per hat must be whole numbers.



We also know that they must multiply together to make 7777.

The whole numbers that multiply together to make 7777 are called the factors of 7777 and thankfully, there are not many of them for such a large number.

I've listed them all below in context.

Number of hats sold	Price per hat	
1	\$7777	Too few hats sold
7	\$1111	Too few hats sold
11	\$707	Too few hats sold
77	\$101	Just right
101	\$77	Too many hats sold
707	\$11	Too many hats sold
1111	\$7	Too many hats sold
7777	\$1	Too many hats sold

So there is only one possible combination and the amount of money each hat sold for must be \$101.

Put the digits 1 to 6 in order such that:

- The first digit is lower than the second
- the first 2 digits are a multiple of 2
- the first 3 digits are a multiple of 3
- the first 4 digits are a multiple of 4

Maths Olympiad for Females

The maths department celebrated more success this week in the annual Mathematical Olympiad for Girls run by UKMT. The challenge is targeted at the most able mathematicians and consists of 5 questions, answered over 2.5 hours, where the only equipment allowed is a pen, pencil, paper, ruler and a pair of compasses. This year's challenge was on Wednesday 27 September.

Well done to our further mathematics students, Sophie P, Sophia C, Shayna P, all Year 13, and Grace T from Year 12 who all completed the paper. Special shout outs must go to Sophia, who achieved a distinction, and Shayna, who achieved a merit. Congratulations to them all for completing a challenging set of guestions.

If you would like to have a go at one of the questions, here is a sample of what they faced: (a) Five identical coins are placed in the cells of a 3×3 grid so that there is at most one coin in each cell and there is an odd number of coins in each row and each column.

- (i) Show two examples of how this could be done.
- (ii) In how many ways can this be done?
- (b) The numbers 1 to 9 are arranged in the cells of a 3×3 grid so that every row and every column have an odd sum.
- (i) Show two examples of how this could be done.
- (ii) How many such arrangements are possible? **Answers**

Each row and each column can contain either one or three coins. Since there are five coins in total, two of the rows need to contain one coin each and the remaining row needs to contain three coins: the same is true for the columns. Once we have placed three coins in one of the rows and three coins in one of the columns, all five coins have been used. So we just need to count the number of ways to choose the row and the column that contain three coins. There are three choices for the row: for each of those choices, there are three choices for the column. So the total number of choices is $3 \times 3 = 9$. There are two ways to make an odd sum using three numbers: three odd, or one odd and two even. So each row and each column need to contain either one or three odd numbers. There are five odd numbers between 1 and 9 inclusive, so we can make a link to part (a): The number of ways to choose the cells that contain odd numbers is 9. For every choice of odd-numbered cells, there are five odd numbers to arrange in those five cells, and four even numbers to arrange in the remaining four cells. The number of ways to do this is $5! \times 4!$. Therefore the total number of possible arrangements of the numbers is $9 \times 5! \times 4!$. Back to Contents



What Parents & Carers Need to Know about



FIVE NIGHTS AT FREDDY'S



Five Nights at Freddy's is a series of indie point-and-click horror games whose word-of-mouth success and widespread spin-off content on YouTube have helped each of the nine instalments so far to sell almost five million copies on Steam (the PC gaming platform) alone. Set in various deserted locations at night, with creepy animatronic characters suddenly coming to life, the games are rated PEGI 12 for disturbing/violent content, mild profanity and horror themes.

FRIGHTENING THEMES

Five Nights at Freddy's (FNAF for short) doesn't feature bloodshed like many horror games – but it does build tension and use jump scares, which may be too intense for young players. The sinister animatronic characters and the sensation of being trapped and defenceless could be particularly unsettling, as could the inclusion of disturbing elements such as murder or possession by evil spirits.




AGE-INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

As a result of FNaF's popularity, a sizeable YouTube community based on fan-made content has developed around the game. While the majority of this material is still child friendly, there are a number of channels which are geared more towards mature audiences: they contain adult and disturbing themes, for example, and (in some cases) are signary profits language.

STRESSFUL SITUATIONS

Due to FNaF's suspenseful atmosphere, it can be extremely stressful for players. Constantly checking that one's surroundings are sale is a crucial part of the gameplay and could create residual stress or even obsessive-compulsive behaviours. Several media reports have suggested that some younger children have experienced severe nightmares or sleep anxiety after playing games from the series.



FNaF doesn't foreground in-game purchasing as strongly as many other well-known games, but some titles in the series do offer additional content that promises to enhance the experience. Five Nights at Freddy's: Help Wanted, for instance, is complemented by a Halloween-themed expansion pack called 'Curse of Dreadbear' (costing £8.99), which unlocks new levels and mini-games.



Many parents will be relieved to learn that Five Nights at Freddy's is a single-player game which doesn't include any online chat functionality. Conversely, however, this could also make playing FNoF quite an isolating experience especially if your child is spending a lot of time investigating the game's spooky, shadowy environments alone in their room, for example

Advice for Parents & Carers

USE PARENTAL CONTROLS

Five Nights at Freddy's doesn't have conventional parental controls. However, if you're concerned about the potential impacts of the game's themes and content, you can simply choose not to let your child play it. If they use an Android or iOS device for gaming, you can adjust Apple and Google's built-in parental controls to restrict your child's access to certain content.

TRY IT YOURSELF

Every child is different, of course, so it could be worth playing Five Nights at Freddy's yourself for a while to gauge how your young gamer might cope with the series' more frightening and disturbing aspects. If they're old enough, you could spend sometime playing it together – after all, it usually only takes between two and ten minutes to complete a level.

LIMIT SPENDING

Unlike many popular titles, Five Night's at Freddy's doesn't bombard players with tempting in-game purchase offers. It's worth noting, however, that some instalments in the series do provide the option for players to spend real-world money. With that in mind, it's important to either keep a close eye on your child's expenditure or limit their access to digital payment options.

SPOT THE SIGNS

If you're concerned that your child might be spending too much time on Five Night's at Freddy's, or you're worried that the game's scary themes are taking a toll, watch out for warning signs. Young people may start to prioritise gaming over everyday essentials like schoolwork or sleep; irritability or a lack of concentration could also indicate that their gaming sessions are going on too long.

TALK ABOUT THE RISKS

Before you allow your child to play Five Nights at Freddy's, it's wise to have a conversation about the game so that they're aware of the potential risks. Ensure that your child understands that the series is purposely designed to be tense and unsettling, and that they should stop or take a break if the intensity of the gameplay is making them feel uncomfortable or putting them on edge.


