Welcome

There have been so many wonderful things happening across Bosworth Academy this week.

On Monday we held the official opening of our new outdoor Basketball courts, official home of the Bosworth Bears teams. We were honoured to welcome the full Leicester Riders Basketball squad and their head coach Rob Paternostro. Riders are one of the top teams in the British Basketball League (BBL)

Championship, the top-level men's professional

basketball league in the UK. Invited along for the afternoon were over 100 of our own basketball players to listen to the speeches from myself, Paternostro and Dr Evans MP. Once the purple ribbon had been cut by captain Kimbal Mackenzie, our students raced onto the courts to play against the best in the game. It was a joy to see our students, from Years 7 to 13, testing their skills and carrying out drills with stars of the BBL. Paternostro explained that he'd not seen any facility as good



as ours in all of the UK and only a few outdoor venues in the States match it. Our students were urged by Dr Evans to look after the facility for future students. I shared a huge thank you to our own coach Igor Mirković for his inspirational coaching and leadership, and to our Bosworth Bears logo designers for their ingenuity.

Trial exams for our exam year students are well underway. The vast majority of students are preparing well and meeting our high expectations. Students are reminded that they must bring all equipment and hand in all electronic devices at the start. Failure to do this would result in disqualification.

On Wednesday evening we welcomed many parents, carers and students from Year 11 for our Steps to Success evening. During the event an explanation of the summer examinations was provided, top tips for revision, and expert input for parents and students from a range of subject areas. Feedback was really positive. Another evening will follow soon where trial exam grades will be handed out - like a dress rehearsal for the GCSE exam results in the summer. It's been fantastic to see our key stage 3 students involved in many leadership activities. Spooky Science Club, Environmental Society, Media Wall Art club and 6C celebrations all featured prominently this week as students got involved in a range of extra-curricular activities.

And finally, Toronto born Riders captain **Kimbal**, told me this week that he became so good at the game by continually practising his shooting skills with a low basket in his garden as a kid. It's well worth all of us remembering, **"Practice makes perfect permanent."** A message so important whether you're a top musician, athlete or one of our students revising for examinations or assessments. It's important to continually look to improve and embed those skills, so they can be performed or recalled as second nature.

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Riders Coach Hails Outdoor Courts “Best” in UK

Leicester Riders BBL team officially opened Bosworth Academy's outdoor basketball courts on Monday with Head Coach Rob Paternostro hailing the outdoor courts as the “best” he has seen in over 20 years of coaching in the UK.



Paternostro was also impressed with the basketball skills of around 100 Bosworth Academy students who played mini games with the Riders players during the event. Before shooting hoops, the two outdoor basketball courts were unveiled in a ceremony with words from Paternostro, MP for Hinckley and Bosworth Dr Luke Evans and Bosworth Academy Headteacher Simon Brown.



Leicester Riders players then joined the students in cutting the ribbon ahead of hitting the paint. One of those students who played with a Riders player was Year 13 student Elyas B who revelled in blocking a shot attempted by a professional basketballer.

“It was a great experience as a whole. Having the



team pull up to the school was a great experience to have,” said Elyas.

“The courts are exceptional, the best I’ve played on. It was surprising to see when they were first completed because it’s not something you see in England often.

“Going one-on-one with a professional Riders player was thrilling. Playing against a professional is a once in a lifetime experience, and managing to block his shot it was so much better. Overall, a great experience,” added Elyas.



The outdoor basketball courts at Bosworth Academy were developed by Bosworth basketball coach, Igor Mirković.

The coach, who started at the school with a team of five, was overwhelmed with the amount of students who now use the new courts daily. These students include the Bosworth Bears team who have won back-to-back school county championships and assisted in the relaunch of basketball at Bosworth.

Headteacher Mr Brown shared with those in attendance that the students’ creativity was

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shown in designing the Bosworth Bears logo which now adorns the centre circles of the outside courts and that the students actively encourage others to participate in playing basketball at school.



Dr Evans MP agreed that playing sports such as basketball has great benefits for mental and social well-being as well as physical health:

“These facilities are exactly what we want to see for young people to be able to aspire to, to take part in sport for their health, their mental health, but also to create careers and to have a trajectory that many people may think they cannot aspire to,” said Dr Evans MP.

The outdoor basketball courts will soon be available to the wider community to use and enjoy whilst plans are in place for professional BBL teams to use the facility as well.

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Maths Puzzle of the Week

Last Week's Answer: Put digits in order

Put the digits 1 to 6 in order such that:

4 6 2 3 5 1

- The first digit is lower than the second
- the first 2 digits are a multiple of 2
- the first 3 digits are a multiple of 3
- the first 4 digits are a multiple of 4
- the first 5 digits are a multiple of 5
- the first 6 digits are a multiple of 6

You can only use each number once

If you know a few divisibility tests this is A LOT easier than otherwise. Firstly, we know all multiples of 5 must end in a 5 or a 0. That sorts the first spot out.

— — — — 5 —

2, 4 or 6 2, 4 or 6 2, 4 or 6

Also, all multiples of even numbers must end in an even number, so the 2nd, 4th and 6 spaces must have 2, 4 and 6 in them. That leaves 1 and 3 to go near the beginning.

Must sum to a multiple of 3

— 2 — — 5 —

1 or 3 1 or 3

Furthermore, the sum of the digits of all multiples of 3 are a multiple of 3 (which applies to our first three digits). That gets us the number 2.

1 2 3 — 5 —

Must be lower than 2 Must be a multiple of 4

The first digit must be smaller than the second which leaves us just two spaces. Finally, the last two digits of any multiple of 4 must be divisible by 4. That sorts out our last two digits:

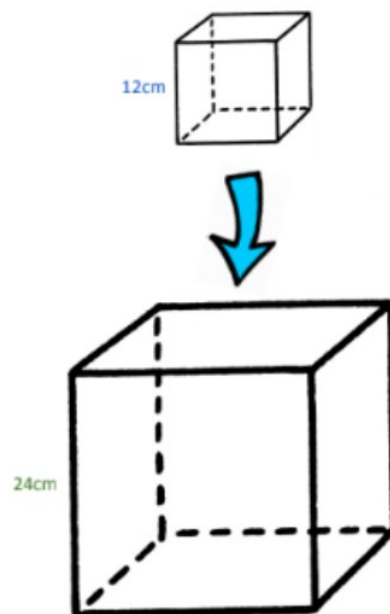

Learning will see the students identify trees, wildflowers and learn the importance of soil organisms which are compared with personal microbiomes.

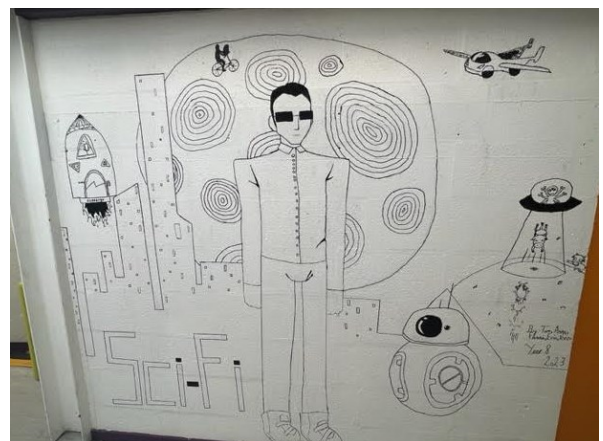
Further possibilities for discussion will be to develop a flower cutting garden and bulb planting.

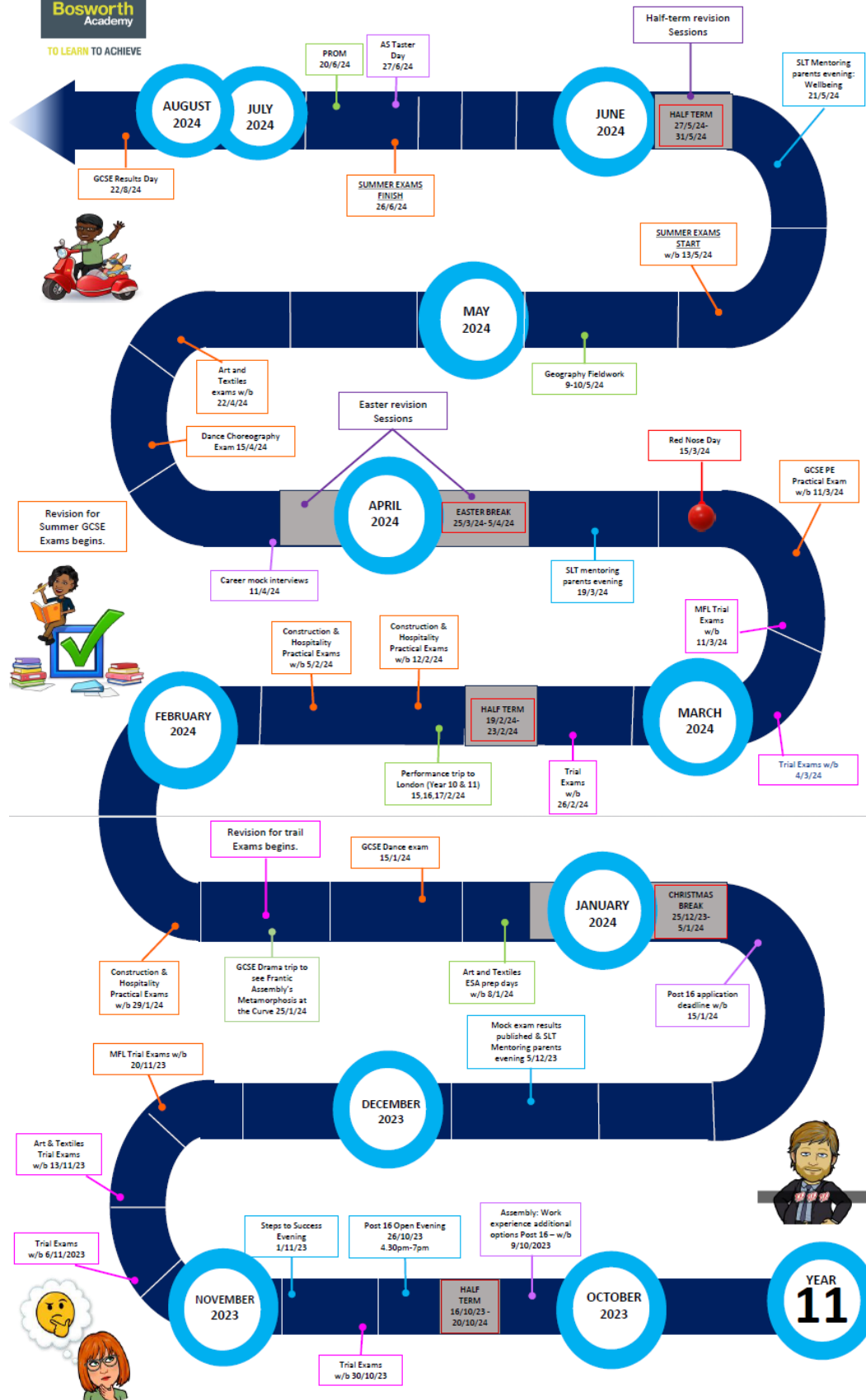

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

In October 2022, the enormously popular social media network Twitter was purchased by tech tycoon Elon Musk. That sparked a host of changes to the platform – not all which have been received positively by its fans. The alterations have continued with each passing month, many of them raising online safety concerns among the 530 million users of Twitter (now rebranded as simply X). With further adjustments reportedly in the pipeline, X has attracted more than its usual share of controversy and caution in recent times.

A BLOCK ON BLOCKING

X has announced plans to remove its blocking feature. Previously, this stopped other users from viewing your profile or sending you direct messages, while also hiding their posts from your feed. Only this latter function will now remain. The decision has been criticised by some members, who feel that blocking (in its current form) protects them from X users who promote denial and hatred.

LIMITED REPORTING FEATURES

X offers a premium membership, with some functionality (such as controlling who can view and reply to your posts) increasingly being made exclusive to those who pay the subscription fee. Several commentators have speculated that X could one day become an exclusively paid-for service, with access to accounts being revoked for anyone unwilling or unable to take out a subscription.

AGE-INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

Many of X's less age-appropriate posts can feature anything from extreme political views to pornography. While accounts marked as 18+ are restricted from non-members, it's still fairly easy to stumble across this material accidentally. X's new 'For You' page also shows content from accounts that a user doesn't already follow – meaning that almost anything could end up on a child's feed.

VERIFICATION FOR SALE

Historically, Twitter's moderators granted account verification: certifying someone as authentic by placing a blue tick next to their username. One of X's earliest changes was to place verification behind a paywall; this caused the number of celebrity impersonators to rise and left no way to distinguish, say, a legitimate influencer from a copycat fake account seeking to exploit other users.

BLUE TICK SALE

Advice for Parents & Carers

PROTECT PRIVACY

Unsavory characters may try to gain access to a young person's X account – either to view their posts and gather information on them, or to completely take control of it. To minimise risk, ensure the account has a strong password and enable the 'Protect Your Posts' feature (via the account settings), so that strangers can't view your child's posts without first being approved as a follower.

DON'T RISE TO THE BAIT

To gain more views and followers, some X users post deliberately inflammatory comments on sensitive topics such as race, sexual orientation and gender issues. Many young people could find this upsetting. Emphasise that, if your child encounters someone spreading hate on X, it's best not to give that person what they want: an argument. Ignore them, mute their account and move on.

STAY ALERT FOR IMPOSTERS

Make sure your child understands that X's blue ticks no longer guarantee the identity of anyone on the platform. While it might be exciting if a celebrity liked your child's post, it could just as easily be an imposter with malicious intentions. If your child's not 100% sure that an X user actually is who they claim to be, advise them to err on the side of caution and avoid interacting with that account.

ONLY FOLLOW TRUSTED ACCOUNTS

Using the 'Following' tab on X helps to ensure that the only content your child sees has come from accounts they've chosen to follow: this should reduce the chance of them inadvertently being exposed to harmful, violent or explicit content. Show your child how to report another user's account if, say, they're behaving inappropriately by spreading misinformation or offensive opinions.

BE READY TO TAKE ACTION

If your child suffers harassment on the platform or becomes the target of a hack, you could consider deactivating their account entirely. Recently, X's safety features have been criticised for allegedly failing to protect users' wellbeing – so if your child is being subjected to abusive messages or similar mistreatment on the platform, it might be prudent to remove them from X altogether.

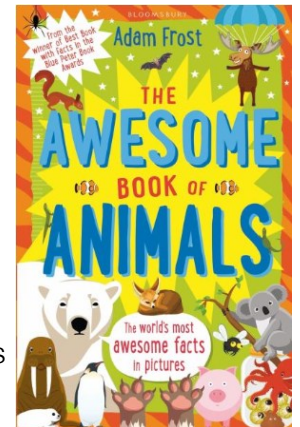

This month is National Non-Fiction Friday and our recommendations this week are non-fiction themed ranging from the natural world to history.

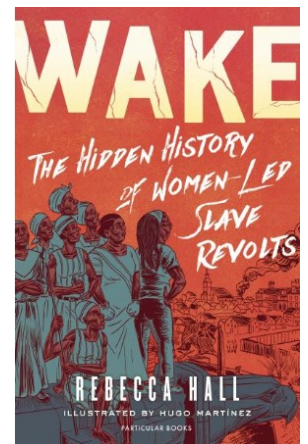
Key Stage Three

Are you as tall as an emperor penguin or a velociraptor? Did you know that a jellyfish was sent into space? Which animal swallowed a suit of armour? Fill your brain with hilarious, weird and wacky facts about the awesome animals that share our planet.



Key Stage Four

Women warriors planned and led slave revolts on slave ships during the passage across the Atlantic. They fought their enslavers throughout the Americas. And then they were erased from history. In *Wake* Rebecca Hall, a historian, a granddaughter of slaves, and a woman haunted by the legacy of slavery, tells their story. With in-depth archival research and a measured use of historical imagination, she constructs the likely pasts of women rebels who fought for freedom on slave ships bound to America, as well as the stories of women who led slave revolts in Colonial New York. Beneath both is Hall's own tale: of a life lived in the shadow of slavery and its consequences. Strikingly illustrated in black and white, *Wake* explores both a personal and a global legacy. Part graphic novel, part memoir, it is a powerful reminder that while the past is gone, we still live in its wake.
