It's been another fantastic week at Bosworth with so much going on and brilliant opportunities for our students. Our Sixth Form A-level French and Art students headed for a cultural visit to France on Monday on the Eurostar. They stayed in central Paris, visiting historical, cultural, and famous places everyone associates with Paris. It was great to see on [our X \(formerly Twitter\) page](#) Bosworth students at the Louvre, Arc de Triomphe, and gazing up at the soaring Eiffel Tower. They walked along the gorgeous Seine River, viewed the monumental Arc de Triomphe, and spent time at the white Sacre Coeur Basilica set high on a hilltop, forming part of the famous Paris skyline. Students visited the most sumptuous pad in France, the Château de Versailles, and viewed the lavish work commissioned by Louis XIV in 1678. Our sixth formers enjoyed delivering an informative presentation to French students at a French College, Carcado-Saisseval, where they told them all about our school and Leicester City. We thank our teaching staff Miss Butterfield, and Mr Mainard as well as our French Languages Assistant, Miss Guilbaud, for providing this great opportunity for our students. It was great to hear about the fantastic ice-skating experience many students enjoyed this week at the National Ice Centre, Nottingham. Our expectations for rewards trips are high yet there remain opportunities for

students to be rewarded in future end of term visits. We have a further celebration event next week, so look out for an email inviting some KS4/5 parents and carers to our fast approaching Colours Awards Evening which will celebrate great student achievements in the global competencies, the 6Cs.

On Thursday, our Year 12/13 students picked up their trial exam results. Year 11 students, accompanied by their parents and carers collected theirs at our Trial Examination Results Evening event. This experience helps to replicate for students what it may feel like in the summer when actual GCSE results are picked up. Following the collection of results, Mrs Milner, Head of Year 11, and other senior leaders shared some important messages and vital tips for what to expect on this important journey towards May. For those students who were a little disappointed with their grades, we explained that with a growth mindset, positive approach to learning, and a great study plan, anything can still be achieved. With only 15 school weeks left before the first GCSE exam it is vital that revision begins early as this helps to reduce anxiety.

And finally, as a **Parisian** might say; "**Vouloir, c'est pouvoir.**" the literal translation being: "To want to is to be able to." Which to us might mean; "**Where there's a will, there's a way.**" The perfect message to encourage our examination year students who may doubt their own abilities.

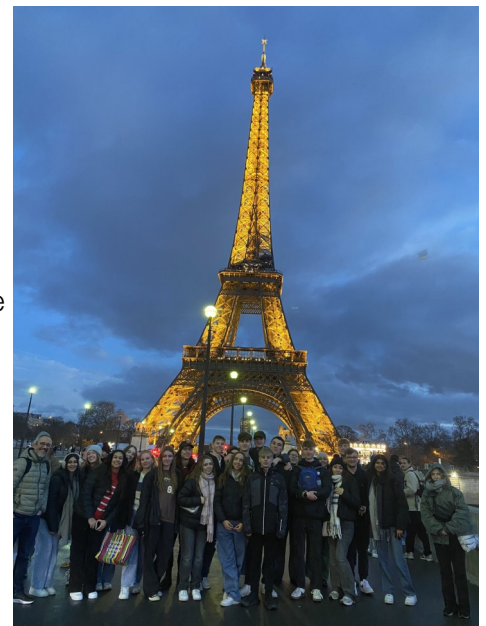

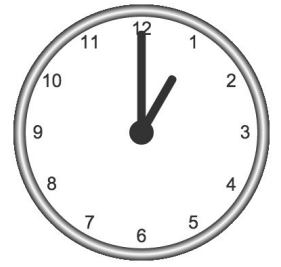

PE Leicester Forest

For Year 7 Physical Education lessons from the 11th December up to Christmas we will be running a mini unit of work on the history of the old Leicester forest.



Students will learn about some key historical events dating back to William the Conqueror in 1066 and we take the students for a cross country run out of the back of the school and to the 29 steps; a historical entrance for the people of Desford into the Leicester forest.

Here is a [video](#) that we will share with the students prior to the run.

The first lesson of the week students will complete an out and back run to discover the route. On the second lesson of the week the students will take part in a paired pursuit run where one will act as a villager scavenging in the forest for food and the other the forester who is paid to keep the villagers out. If the villager gets back to a set point before their forester partner catches them, then their family eats. If the forester catches the villager then they would be arrested and taken to jail.

The following week we run a capture the flag type activity which again is a role play of villagers entering the forest and the foresters trying to keep them out.

Maths Puzzle of the Week

Last Week's Answer: 576

Drawing the parts of this puzzle is a lot more difficult than solving it. Having said that, one way of getting to the answer is to draw the fourth shape and then simply count all the sides. This has been done below and gets us to the answer.

Shape		
Number of lines	3	12
Length of each line	81	27
Total perimeter	243	324

Shape		
Number of lines	48	192
Length of each line	9	3
Total perimeter	432	576

Perhaps a nicer way to solve the puzzle is to spot what happens to every line on the shape each time it is changed. Below you can see how each line becomes four lines in the new shape and how each line is one third of the length of the previous line.



The total length of the new lines is $\frac{4}{3}$ of the original line.

This means that the total perimeter of each shape is $\frac{4}{3}$ of the previous shape. All we need to know is the perimeter of the first shape and then we can easily work out all the perimeter of the following shapes.

This week's puzzle: What is the distance?

Christmas Town has a population of five, each with their own house. One day in Christmas Town...

- Prancer lives further south than Donner
- Donner went to see Father Christmas and then went home.
- Father Christmas lives in the centre of town.
- Everyone walks the shortest possible route for each journey.
- Rudolph lives in the most easterly house in Christmas Town
- Blitzen went to Prancer's and then they both went to Rudolph's house.
- Father Christmas stayed at home all day.
- Donner lives at the opposite end of town to Blitzen.
- Rudolph delivered a card to everyone in town and then went home.



What is the total distance everyone in Christmas Town travelled that day?

Extension: If one road in Christmas Town was closed then the answer would have been 86km. Which road is it?

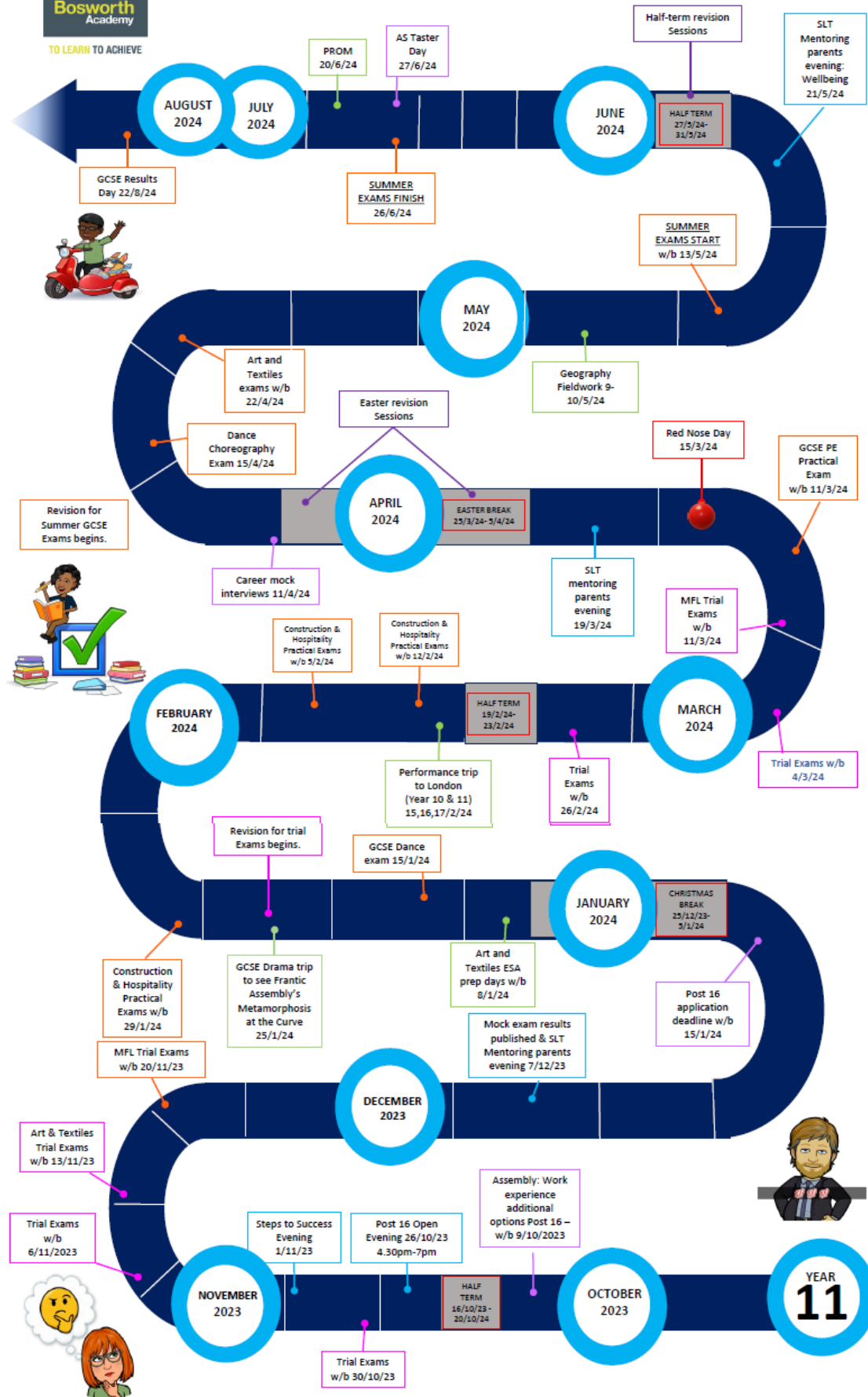

What Parents & Carers Need to Know about DISNEY+

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

The Walt Disney Company's streaming service, Disney+ combines entertainment from the famous animation studio itself with Pixar, Star and National Geographic, plus the Marvel and Star Wars franchises. With access to the latest releases, Disney classics and original series, there's plenty of content to explore. While parents may have noted that adverts have now been introduced on some versions of the service, the platform is – unsurprisingly for a Disney product – designed to be appropriate for the whole family.

LESS SUITABLE CONTENT

While Disney+ is predominantly family friendly, there are some movies and shows in its library which are aimed at an older audience: these may scare younger ones or contain themes or language that you'd rather your child wasn't exposed to. You could avoid such situations by enabling Junior Mode (see 'Adjust content settings', below) or specifying a content age rating for your child's profile.

Do*#!

BINGE WATCHING

With the option to view content on any internet-enabled device and a growing catalogue of movies, cartoons and documentaries, Disney+ can make managing screen time difficult. This could result in children binge watching content, distracting them from activities like homework or socialising. Too much screen time has also been shown to negatively impact mood, sleep patterns and weight.

PHISHING EMAILS

Be especially cautious if you receive emails or text messages purporting to be from Disney+. There have been numerous reports of online scammers impersonating Disney+ staff in an attempt to gain access to subscribers' personal information. Disney+ states it will never email or call customers asking for their payment details, their private information or their password.

ENCROACHING ADVERTS

Disney+ has introduced a new subscription package – Disney+ Standard with Ads – which plays commercials before movies and during shows (like many TV channels). There are no adverts in Junior Mode, but profiles with a content rating of 6+ years will see ads appropriate for that age category. Adults who give consent will see personalised adverts based on their location and viewing history.

ACCESSING ADULTS' PROFILES

If adults don't set a PIN for their profile, children could access it and encounter content which isn't age appropriate. In the settings, Junior Mode has a toggle titled 'Kid-Proof Exit' which requires the user to read four words (numbers, spelled out) and enter them to switch profiles. For older children who can read, though, this isn't secure enough – so using a PIN for adult profiles is recommended.

Advice for Parents & Carers

ADJUST CONTENT SETTINGS

When setting up an account, there's an option to create profiles in what's called Junior Mode. This generally covers material that's suitable for children up to age 6 and is therefore fairly limited. You can give older children a wider choice of viewing by building a standard profile, then going into the settings and choosing a content rating from one of the pre-set alternatives: 6+, 9+, 12+ or 14+.



ADD PIN PROTECTION

Disney+ enables you to effectively lock profiles behind a four-digit PIN. In particular, some of the shows on the platform's Star content hub are far more oriented to adults (including several hard-hitting dramas from US networks), so protecting parents' or older siblings' profiles with a PIN will help to prevent younger children stumbling across material which isn't intended for them.



TURN OFF AUTO-PLAY

When a cartoon, show or movie finishes, Disney+ uses algorithms to identify content with similar themes, which it thinks your child will also enjoy. This suggestion will then automatically begin to play by default. There's an option to turn off this auto-play function in the profile settings, which will encourage your child to take a break from the screen and move on to a different activity.



ENJOY AS A FAMILY

When your child watches a movie or show on Disney+ for the first time, you may want to sit with them to ensure it's suitable. You could do the same when introducing them to older films that you haven't seen for years: your perception of what's appropriate has very probably changed, and some of the language and attitudes in movies from your own childhood may seem quite shocking today.

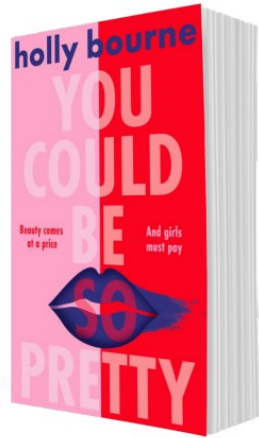
The Compass

Book Recommendations

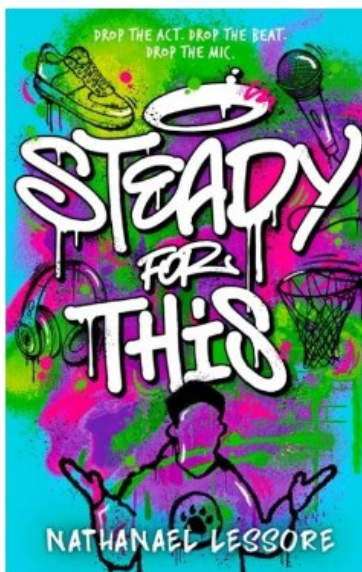
Key Stage Three
