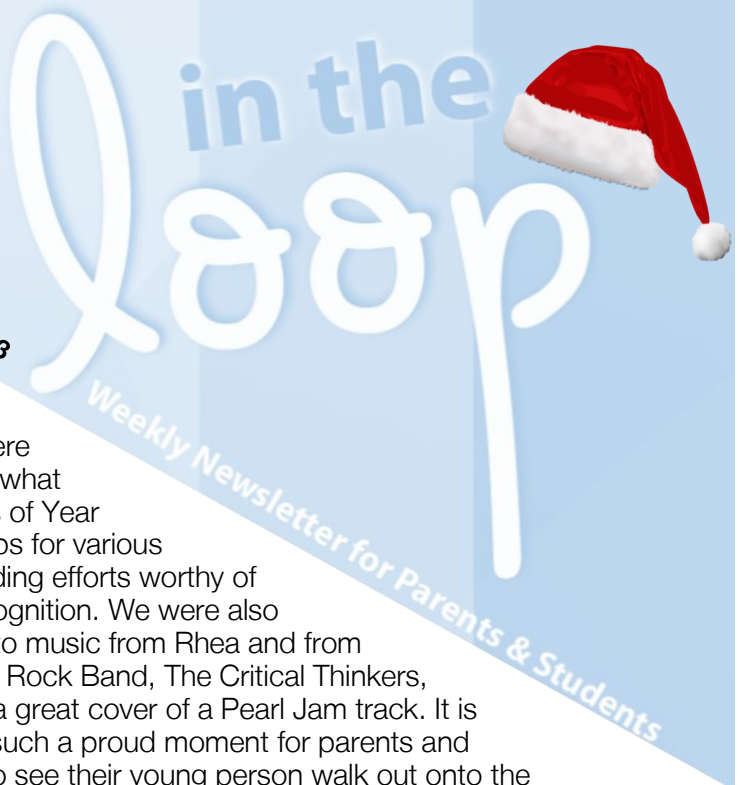


Welcome

Well done to all students this term and we look forward to celebrating student success at the next Colours Evening.



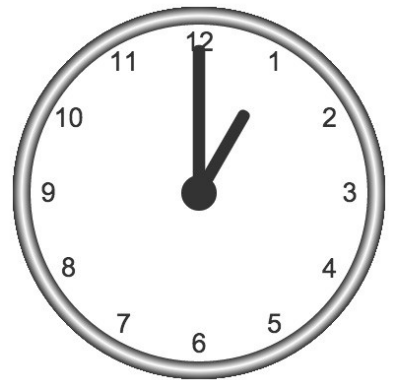
End of Term Arrangements

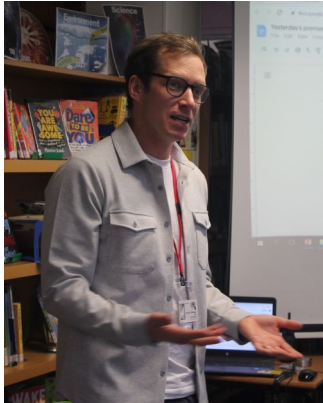


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BBC Radio Reporter Visits

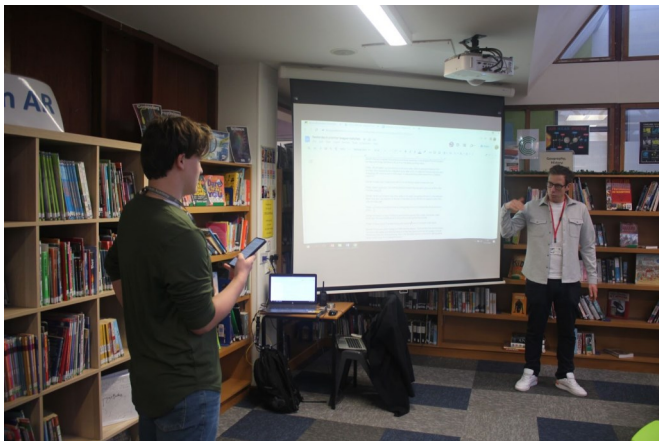


As we told you in the [November 10th edition](#) of In the Loop, Mike's fascination with radio was developed whilst he was at Bosworth and he returned to give a session on the radio industry with our GCSE and A Level Media students.



Having discussed the BBC services, which range from TV, radio and online, Mike then gave the Year 12 students a task in writing scripts for a radio two-way conversation on topical subjects.

The students' great creative flair was shown in writing scripts which were then read aloud with Mike, who was impressed with the skills shown.

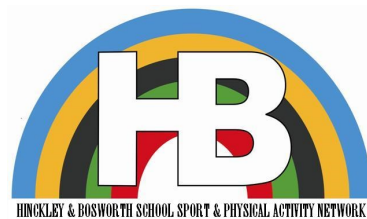

We have already seen great improvement and look forward to progressing further in the new year.

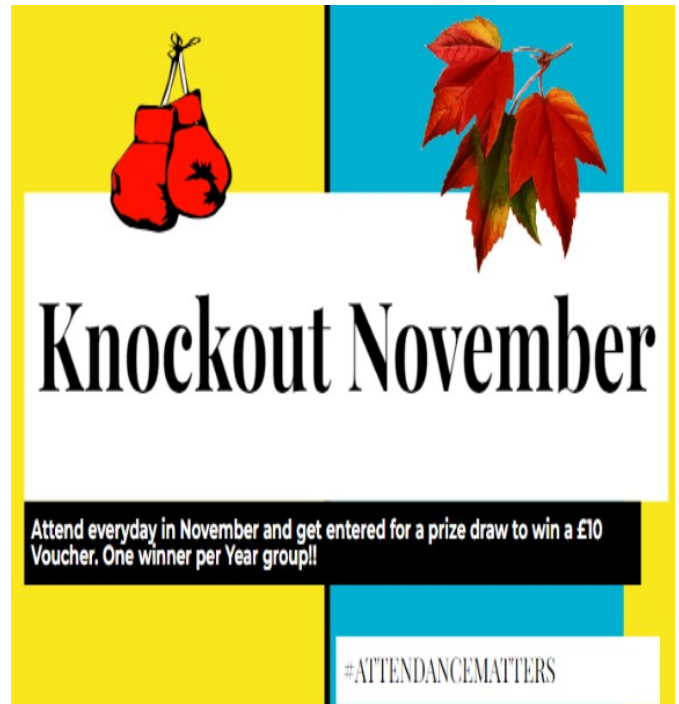

FSM Over Christmas Break

For those currently in receipt of free school meals, the voucher scheme for school holidays will continue to provide the service over the Christmas break.

Many of you will be familiar with the process; however, there are a few changes this year. Families will now receive an email from **Wonde** containing instructions to support you with accessing the vouchers. Please look out for this email.

The information shared with the company that supplies the vouchers uses the information from our Arbor system, so it is important that this information is correct.

However, there will be packed lunches available for those students entitled to free school meals, if they have ordered one. All parents have received a link to a Google Form where they can order their food. 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Maths Puzzle of the Week

Last Week's Answer: 68

The first thing to do is to figure out who lives in each house in Christmas Town. The two clues below tells us who lives in two of the houses straight away:

- Rudolph lives in the most easterly town in Christmas Town
- Father Christmas lives in the centre of town.

We need to make a deduction to figure out the remaining three houses:

Donner lives at the complete opposite end of town to Blitzen = Means that Donner and Blitzen must live in houses 1 and 3 (but we do not yet know which way round yet) and Prancer must live in house 2.

Prancer lives further south than Donner = As Prancer is in house 2, Donner must live in house 1.

Now we work out how far everyone has travelled and add them all up to get our answer. There are many routes for each person, the ones below are the shortest but there are other alternatives of the same length.

The full working out can be found in the table below:



This week's puzzle: Secret Santa Outcomes
Kayleigh, Cameron, Evie and Heather are doing a "Secret Santa".

They write their names on a piece of paper and put them into a hat. They mix the names up and take one name out each. They buy a present for the person on their piece of paper.



If anyone picks their own name then it counts as a failure and they put all the names back in the hat and start again.

Extension: What if Andy decided to join the Secret Santa?



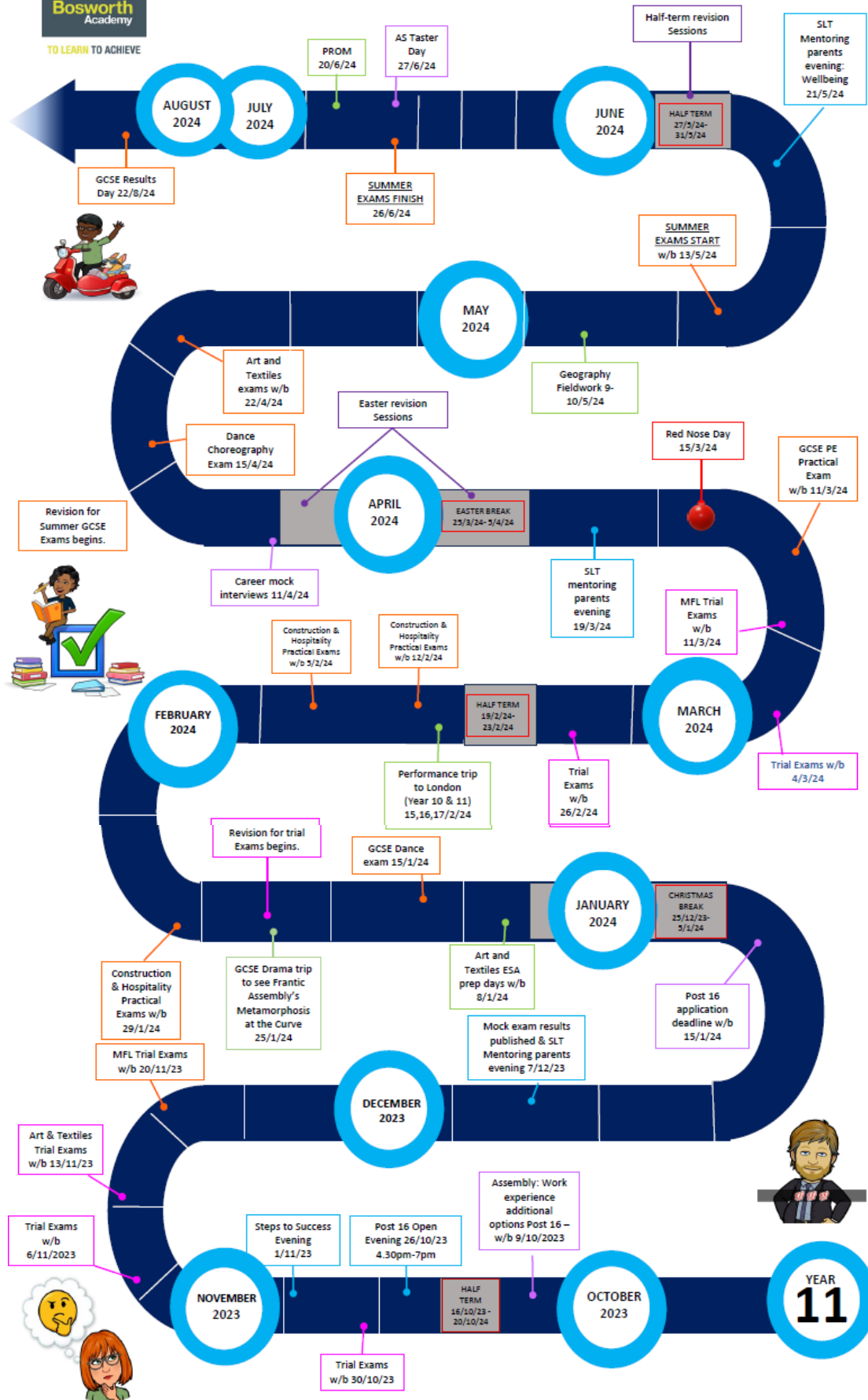

AR 100% Scores

Our Year 7 and 8 students have completed their autumn 'marking period' in terms of their reading within Accelerated Reader programme.



Each year is split into four marking periods; autumn, winter, spring and summer; where students are set a points target to reach - they do this by reading and taking AR book quizzes. Their target is determined by their reading level, so it's individual, but everyone is expected to read at least 20 minutes a day. We have had a number of students reach their target - they have all received 10 reward points and have been told about this in their library lesson. Six out



of these students, 1 in Year 7 and 5 in Year 8, have been exceptional - not only have they achieved their AR target, but they were also 100% correct every time they took a quiz, which is a brilliant achievement! They have each received a special gold 100% badge and should be very proud of themselves.

"It was extremely fun and very indulging. Gave me a lot of freedom to write what I want. I went without too much input or help. Very proud of what I've written."

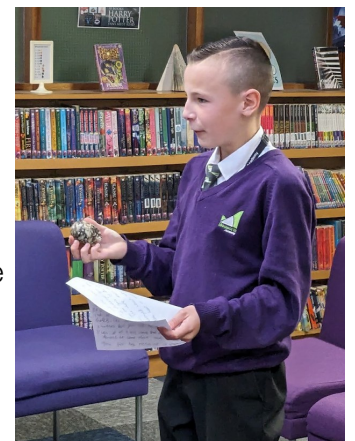

Key Stage Three



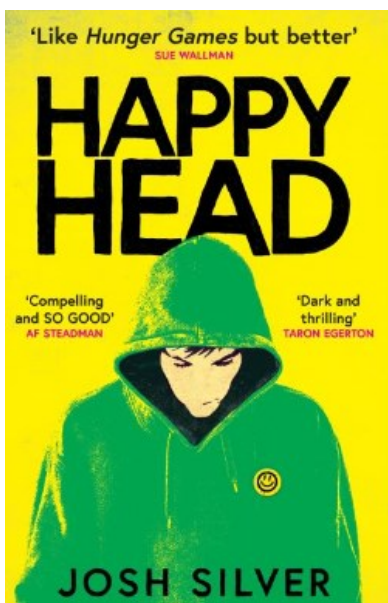
