The Sun Showbiz Editor

Another Bosworth Academy alumni who is trailblazing in her chosen field is Ellie Henman who was recently promoted to Showbiz Editor of the national daily newspaper, The Sun.

Ellie completed her A Levels in 2007 and reportedly said that "what initially sparked my fascination with journalism was my love of English at school.

"I loved writing anything - whether it be short stories, analytical work or longer, research pieces. I just loved



writing. Also as a child, I was encouraged to watch the news by my parents all the time. Watching the reporters on the screen every day made me think -I'd love to do that," Ellie added.

Ellie's passion for journalism would see her win the ITV2 reality series 'The Exclusives' in 2012 where the prize was a 12-month internship with Bauer Media, writing for magazines such as Heat, Closer and More!

In 2016 Ellie began working as a reporter on the digital showbiz desk at The Sun and three years later moved on to the paper's celebrity and showbiz section, Bizarre, before making Showbiz News Editor in 2021.

Speaking about her new role as Bizarre Editor, Ellie told News UK that "it is the greatest honour of my career to be handed the reins of Bizarre, following in the footsteps of some of Fleet Street's finest iournalists.

"We look forward as a team to continuing Bizarre's brilliant work... Nine-year-old me would be doing somersaults. Sadly, the 34-year-old me is too out of shape," Ellie added. Congratulations Ellie!









Year 13 Author

Creativity and Communication have been shown by Year 13 student, Josh E, as he has recently published his own novel.



Josh was more than happy to tell us more:
The book is called 'The Last Architect' and is about a 16-year-old Year 11 boy called Erik who is the last remaining descendant of the witches from the medieval period, but living in the present day. He has to deal with interest from the public but he tries to live a normal life as possible, but then a dangerous crime gang wants to use him for their own ends and they target his girlfriend. Things all escalate from there!

The writing process was really enjoyable. I began planning it all through Year 11 and started writing after my GCSEs were finished. I finished writing midway through Year 12, then spent another six months editing. Writing my novel was great because

it was a kind of escape for me, particularly as when I began writing I was in a bad place in terms of my mental health so it provided an outlet for all that and allowed me to escape to my own little world with my own characters etc. I also think that when you write, it gives you a new perspective on things and that you see things maybe differently than you did before.

To be honest I don't really know where my inspiration came from in terms of the main idea. It all started off as a daydream I suppose, and it all progressed from there. I remember having a clear idea of what one of the chapters would be, and I built the rest of the storyline around that. I did get some inspiration from my love of Scandinavia (part of the book is set in Iceland), and many of my characters were based (albeit loosely) on people I knew.

I went down the self-publishing route because the traditional method is extremely selective, time-consuming and can be expensive. My initial goal was just to make my book available to the public and any profit made is just a bonus! Self-publishing on Amazon is really easy because they have a step-bystep guide on how to do everything (although I had to wait until I was 18). They convert everything into the right format and do the printing for me, and then I set the price (making sure it covers the printing cost). Fortunately I have a relative who is very good at art, so they were able to design my cover for me! For other writers, I would say the main piece of advice is to be patient. Ideas come and go, and sometimes you can go weeks without being able to write a word. But this is absolutely fine and don't ever give up! Also, if you're serious about self-publishing, it's important to be diligent when it comes to grammar and formatting so make sure you invest just as much time into editing and proof-reading as you do writing. And finally the most important thing is to enjoy yourself. Writing should be fun and a way to express yourself - some people, like me, find it easier to express themselves through writing than spoken word, but it's important that you enjoy yourself during the process.

Our Year 12 Geography A-Level students participated in a three day Fieldwork residential visit last week to Hull, and the Holderness Coast in Yorkshire.





The students were able to put into practice the theory they have learnt in the classroom, apply case study material and learn a wide range of new data collection methods. The data gathered will provide the basis for their A Level independent investigation later this year. Students made innovative use of new technologies where mobile apps allowed them to log data, create GIS maps and investigate secondary sources in context.

Students were amazing in terms of demonstrating the Schools 6Cs skills and values, being complimented by members of the public, and showing passion and innovation in their subject!
