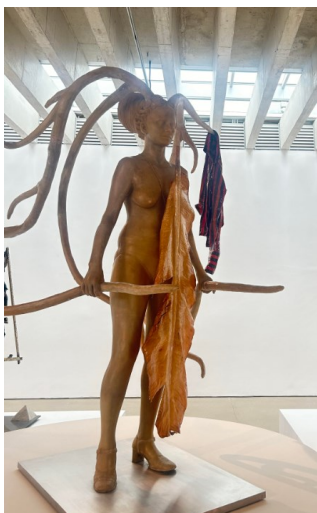


Yorkshire Sculpture Park

A quick reminder: **school learning starts at 8:40 AM** each day, so students should aim to be in school by **8:35 AM** at the latest. Punctuality is essential to avoid disruption to the day's lessons.

Additionally, accumulating **three late arrivals to lessons** will result in a **Time to Think consequence** during break time being issued. Maintaining good attendance and punctuality is key to academic success. We encourage all students to strive for 97% attendance and continue the strong momentum as we progress through the term.

40 Years of Dance

Bosworth Academy offers the opportunity for its facilities to be hired out by a range of clubs and activities. We caught up with Linda Williams, a recent recipient of the Lifetime Membership with the Royal Academy of Dance, whose dance academy has been running at Bosworth Academy for over 40 years!



How does it feel to have been teaching dance for 43 years?

It's been an incredible journey! Teaching dance for over 43 years has been both challenging and deeply rewarding. Watching students transform, not just as dancers but as individuals, is such a privilege. Dance is so much more than just movement – it builds confidence, discipline, and expression. Reflecting on all those years, I feel a deep sense of accomplishment and joy knowing I've helped nurture so many young talents.

What have been some of the most memorable highlights during your teaching career?

There have been countless highlights, but a few stand out. Seeing former students go on to perform professionally or even become teachers themselves is always a proud moment. Participating in national and international performances & competitions, and winning awards with the students, has also been exhilarating. But honestly, some of the biggest highlights are the small, personal moments – like when a student finally masters a difficult step or gains confidence after struggling. Those moments remind me why I love what I do.

Do you have an estimate of how many students you've taught over the years?

It's hard to say exactly, but I would estimate thousands of students. Some have danced with me for years, while others I've taught in workshops or lectures. Each one of them has left an impression on me, and it's amazing to think about how many lives I've touched through dance.

In your opinion, what qualities make a great dancer?

A great dancer is someone who combines technique with passion. You can teach steps, but you can't teach heart – and that's what really makes a dancer stand out. Perseverance is also key, as dance is full of challenges and setbacks. The best dancers are the ones who push through and keep refining their craft. Flexibility, strength, and musicality are crucial, but so is the ability to connect with the audience and bring emotion to every performance.

How has Bosworth Academy supported you in your role as a dance teacher?

I first started teaching dance at Bosworth Academy in the early 80s! For years it has provided a space for us to hold our classes and rehearsals, which has allowed us to work with students from all over Leicestershire. It's been part of our journey over the years, helping us grow and develop along the way.

Would you recommend Bosworth Academy as a venue for hiring out facilities, and if so, why?

Yes, I would! The academy offers a functional space for a variety of events. It has potential for hosting everything from rehearsals to performances.

UKMT Maths Challenge

On Tuesday 1st of October, 90 students in Year 12 and 13 took part in the UKMT Senior Maths Challenge. This is a competition held every year to challenge some of the country's top young mathematicians. They are set 25 challenging questions worth 4 marks for a correct answer, however any incorrect answers lose 1 mark. 47 of our students have achieved either bronze, silver or gold certificates:

Maths Puzzle of the Week

Last week's puzzle: How Much Is Left Over?

A boy has four lengths of string, each the same length.

He cut the first into pieces 4cm long and found that he had 1cm left over.

He cut the second into pieces 9cm long and found that he had 1cm left over.

He cut the third into pieces 7cm long and found that there was 1cm left over.

If he cut the fourth into pieces 11cm long, how much is left over?

The length he cuts is 1 more than a multiple of 4, 7 and 9.

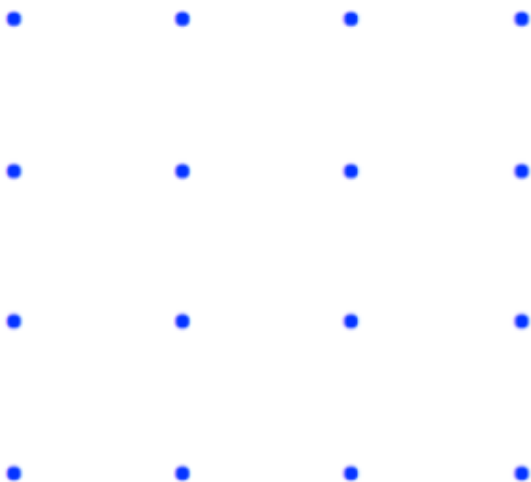
The Lowest Common Multiple of 4, 7 and 9 = $4 \times 7 \times 9 = 252$

Therefore the string is $252 + 1 = 253\text{cm}$
 $253 \div 11 = 23$

So there is none left over

10 Top Tips for Parents and Educators TEACHING CHILDREN FIRE SAFETY

Fire safety is especially important around Bonfire Night, as fireworks, bonfires and sparklers add extra risks for families and young children. Every year in the UK, thousands of accidents occur due to improper handling of fireworks and neglecting fire safety measures. This guide offers practical tips for keeping children safe when handling everything from fireworks to space heaters.

1 BONFIRE NIGHT AWARENESS

Bonfire Night is exciting, but it comes with several inherent risks. Educate children about the dangers of fireworks and open flames. Teach them that only adults should handle fireworks and that bonfires should never be approached. Keep children at a safe distance (at least five metres away) from bonfires and explain why supervision is crucial during these events.

2 SUPERVISE FIREWORK USE

Fireworks should only be handled by responsible adults who are following UK laws and guidelines. Make sure to buy fireworks that meet British Standards and adhere to all instructions that come with them. Keep children a suitable distance from any firework activity and designate an adult to supervise the event. Ensure no one goes near fireworks after they've been lit.

3 SPARKLER SAFETY

Sparklers are often captivating for little ones, but they can burn at extremely high temperatures – over 1,000 °C! Only allow children over the age of five to use sparklers, and make sure they wear gloves. Teach them to hold sparklers at arm's length and never wave them near others. Once a sparkler has burned out, extinguish it fully in a bucket of water – which you should prepare beforehand and always keep nearby.

4 ORGANISED DISPLAYS ARE SAFER

If possible, families should attend an organised fireworks display rather than holding one at home. These tend to be far safer as they're run by professionals adhering to strict safety regulations. Organised displays also provide a controlled environment where children can enjoy the event from a safe distance, reducing the risk of accidents.

5 KEEP FIREWORKS AWAY FROM THE HOME

If you are hosting your own fireworks display, set them off well away from homes, sheds or fences to avoid starting accidental fires. Choose a wide-open space with no flammable materials nearby and keep a means of putting out fires to hand in case of emergency – such as a bucket of water, a hose or a fire extinguisher. Afterwards, ensure that all fireworks are fully extinguished and never attempt to relight one if it doesn't go off.

6 BONFIRE SAFETY

If you're building a bonfire, place it well away from trees, buildings, fences or anything else flammable. Make sure it's structurally sound and not at risk of collapsing. Only burn natural materials like wood and leaves, avoiding petrol or other accelerants. Children should be kept far away from the bonfire, and it should always be supervised by adults. Be sure to fully extinguish the bonfire before you leave it.

7 "STOP, DROP AND ROLL"

Ensure that children know what to do if their clothing catches fire. Teach them the simple "stop, drop and roll" technique, which can quickly extinguish flames. Practise this with them before events like Bonfire Night, so they feel confident if the need to use it arises. It can also be helpful to keep another means of putting out these kinds of fires on standby, just in case. An extinguisher or flame-retardant blanket are both sound choices.

8 SECURE CANDLES AND OPEN FLAMES

Beyond Bonfire Night, everyday fire safety is also crucial. Candles can be a common fire hazard, especially in homes with young children. Teach children not to touch any open flames, and ensure candles are placed in sturdy holders away from combustible materials. Never leave candles, incense burners or other such items unattended, and always extinguish them fully before leaving a room or going to bed.

9 EDUCATE ABOUT FIREWORKS HAZARDS

Make sure children understand the dangers of playing with fire or fireworks, and how to handle such things responsibly. Emphasise that fireworks are not toys and can cause serious injuries when improperly used. Demonstrate the importance of treating fire with respect and the consequences of misuse, which can help temper any curiosity and any resultant dangerous behaviour.

10 FIRST AID FOR BURNS

Even if you have the best possible precautions in place, accidents can still happen. Keep a first aid kit on hand. Ensure you know how to apply basic first aid to burns, so you can teach children those techniques too. If someone suffers a burn, run it under cool water for 20–30 minutes. Never use creams or ointments, as these retain heat and can cause further damage. Instead, seek medical help if the burn is serious.
