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Movember Update

We have been amazed by your generosity at the start of this year's Movember appeal.

In one week we have raised **£1,306!** Thank you to all who have donated so far and to our #TeamBosworth fundraisers. This includes Year 12 student Thomas S who is running a total of 525 kms over the month of November and has raised £602 so far!



Thomas says that his motivation for running 525.6km is to raise awareness for men's mental health as it is "very important and I think that it isn't broadcasted as much as it should be". "Despite having 30 days to do the distance I am away on the last day of

November so only have 29 days to complete it. As well as this my other commitments and school make it very difficult to find time in the week.

"To overcome this the amount of running that I am trying to do on the weekends is dramatically higher than the week to try to stay on track.

"Movember is very important in raising awareness in mental health and suicide prevention as well as prostate cancer and testicular cancer, and donating to Movember can help save those who need help.

To help in raising money for Movember you can set yourself your own challenge and ask family and friends to donate to you, or if not you can ask them to donate to our school page. Either way every little helps in raising awareness and helping people who need it," said Thomas.

Each year, as a school, we engage in the worldwide charity event and raise awareness and money into prostate cancer, testicular cancer, mental health and suicide awareness.

Throughout the month we invite all of our school community: staff, students, parents and friends to join the #TeamBosworth Movember group and

pledge to 'Grow for Mo' or 'Move for Mo'. To grow simply grow a moustache and to move you pledge to move 60km across the month. We are asking all of the stakeholders of Bosworth Academy; staff, students, parents and friends to sign up to our #TeamBosworth Movember page (click [here](#) or scan the QR code below) and pledge to help us raise awareness and funds for this great charity.

Throughout the month you can choose the 'grow' or 'move' for Movember. To 'grow' you need to be clean shaven on the 1st November and grow a moustache

throughout the month to showcase on the 30th. When asked why - share the goals of the charity. To 'move' you pledge to move 60km across the month by walking, running, cycling, paddleboarding - choose your method.

The reason for the 60km is linked to the 60 males who die by suicide each hour globally. We also have 100 pin badges, available to purchase on Squid and collected from Main Reception.

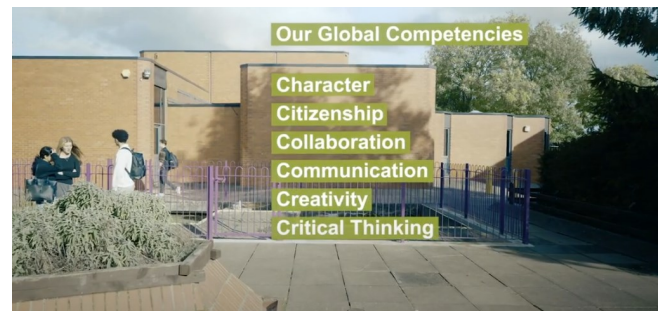
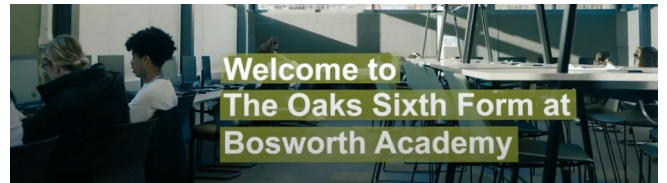

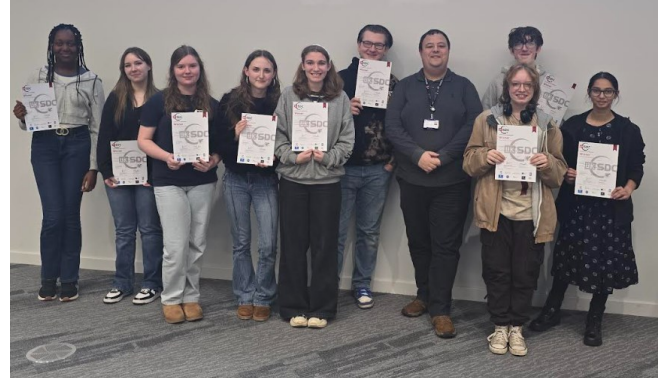


During the 12-hour day, the students designed a mining base on Mars under the imaginary company, Kepler Automation. The design process included developing a factory to produce large metal casks, devising transportation methods to distribute these casks across Mars, organising staff housing and work rotas, planning living quarters and food production for the staff, and determining the energy source for the Mars base.

Throughout the day, they worked as a team to create detailed plans, hold planning meetings, and prepare a presentation of their ideas for judging. The students presented their ideas with clarity and confidence, answering the judges' questions in-depth. With great anticipation, they awaited the final results. I am pleased to announce that Bosworth Academy won and was praised for their outstanding teamwork throughout the day.

They now advance to the national competition, held at Imperial College in London. During the two-day event, the students may be selected as final prize winners of a trip to The Kennedy Space Centre in Florida.

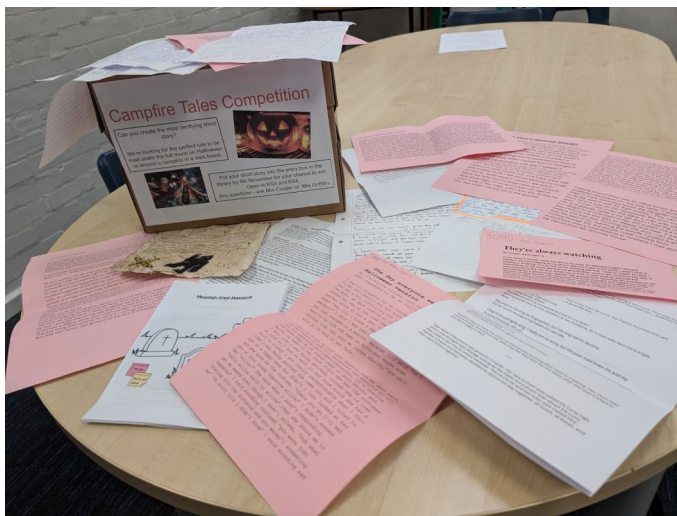

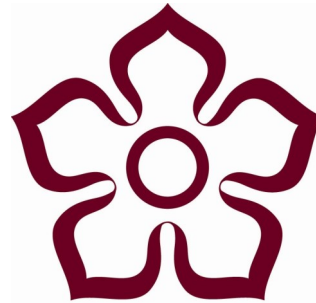

10 Top Tips for Parents and Educators ENCOURAGING CHILDREN TO CHOOSE RESPECT

Sometimes, differences between children can escalate into bullying, potentially impacting their mental health in a way that can persist into adulthood. While it's natural to disagree sometimes, teaching children the importance of respect is essential – especially in difficult situations. This guide provides strategies for encouraging considerate behaviour, even during a dispute, to foster a kinder, more inclusive environment for everyone.

1 LEAD BY EXAMPLE

As adults, we play a crucial role in modelling respectful behaviour for children: they observe and learn from our actions every day. Be mindful of the way you interact with others in front of children. Keep in mind that you should always approach others with an attitude of mutual respect, even if you disagree with them. Demonstrating this behaviour can influence young people and help them to handle their own conflicts in a healthy way.

2 AGREE TO DISAGREE

Make sure children know that it's fine to have differing opinions – and that disagreeing with someone doesn't mean you can't get along or respect each other's point of view. Help them understand that sometimes we can 'agree to disagree'. Using active listening skills when doing this can also help to build empathy and understanding of others.

3 PROMOTE ACTIVE LISTENING

Teach children about the importance of active listening: that is, making a genuine effort to listen to the other person's perspective without interrupting, before responding in a way that shows you understand their viewpoint, even (or perhaps especially) if you disagree with it. This makes people feel respected and allows for a better comprehension of their point of view, which in turn can make it easier for you to communicate your own opinions to them.

4 ENCOURAGE THE USE OF "I" STATEMENTS

If a child finds themselves in a disagreement with someone, it can be useful to encourage them to use "I" statements during the discussion. Framing their thoughts and feelings using statements like "I feel..." or "I think..." can help them avoid an accusatory tone and encourages them to take responsibility for their own emotions.

5 FOCUS ON BEHAVIOUR, NOT CHARACTER

When disagreements happen, encourage children to focus on critiquing and addressing specific actions or behaviours that caused this upset, rather than attacking the person's character. For example, "I didn't like how you interrupted me" is better than "You're so rude". This can help children avoid hurting someone's feelings, which is likely to inflame the situation.

6 STAY CALM AND TAKE BREAKS

It's perfectly normal to feel upset during a disagreement – especially if it's getting heated. Remind children that if they feel overwhelmed, they should try to take deep breaths or even go for a short break to help them stay composed. If a conversation becomes too intense, remind them it's OK to suggest continuing it later or in a different setting. This can prevent things getting out of hand, allowing cooler heads to prevail.

7 START CONVERSATIONS ABOUT RESPECT

Talk openly to children about what respect means – to you and to them. Discuss how they might show respect to each other, to friends, to strangers and even to people we might disagree with. You could use examples of considerate or inconsiderate behaviour in books, films or TV to open discussions about the importance of giving others due regard.

8 SEEK COMMON GROUND

When a disagreement has occurred between children, they may find it hard to move past it. You can support them in finding a more positive way forward by helping identify areas of agreement or common ground with the other party. This can help to build bridges between differing opinions and foster a more cooperative atmosphere, as well as preventing those involved from demonising each other.

9 AVOID MAKING THINGS PERSONAL

It's important that we make it clear to children they must avoid name-calling, swearing or derogatory remarks in a disagreement with others. Respectful language sets a positive tone and helps keep the conversation productive. Reminding children to stay calm and take breaks – as mentioned previously – can help them avoid getting too emotional and saying or doing something hurtful.

10 REFLECT AND LEARN

After a child has had a disagreement, encourage them to reflect on the experience and think about what they can learn from it. What did they handle well? How might they improve their communication skills to handle conflicts more effectively in the future? You could use role play, writing and drawing pictures, or hypothetical examples to further develop their skills in showing respect during a disagreement.

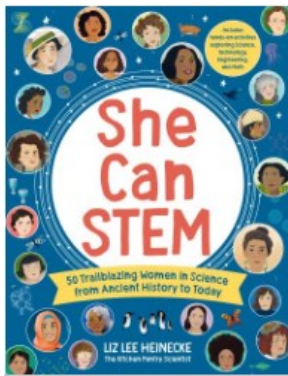
