The project goes from start to finish, beginning with a crime scene investigation and the analysis of suspect profiles. Miss Imogen shared her thoughts on the situation, "I've been accused and students are eager to pin the crime on me! I'm innocent. The truth will out, I'm no thief!" As the investigation deepens, they will continue to apply scientific learning to examine forensic evidence. As they use reasoning skills to piece together clues, they will reassess their assumptions when confronting new evidence. This project encourages them to be flexible in their thinking and to take care before jumping to conclusions. This know how will come in handy for future projects at Gesher and beyond.
