Part A: Pupil premium strategy plan Statement of intent

Our intention is that all pupils, irrespective of their background or the challenges they face, make excellent academic and personal progress. The focus of our pupil premium strategy is to support disadvantaged pupils to achieve that goal, including progress for those who are already high attainers. We will consider the challenges faced by vulnerable pupils, such as those who have a social worker and young carers. The activity we have outlined in this statement is also intended to support their needs, regardless of whether they are disadvantaged or not.

High-quality teaching is at the heart of our approach, with a focus on areas in which disadvantaged pupils require the most support. This is proven to have the greatest impact on closing the disadvantage attainment gap and at the same time will benefit the non-disadvantaged pupils in our school. Implicit in the intended outcomes detailed below, is the intention that non-disadvantaged pupils' attainment will be sustained and improved alongside progress for their disadvantaged peers.

Our approach will be responsive to common challenges and individual needs, rooted in robust diagnostic assessment, not assumptions about the impact of disadvantage. The approaches we have adopted complement each other to help pupils excel. To ensure they are effective we will:

- ensure disadvantaged pupils are challenged in the work that they're set
- act early to intervene at the point need is identified
- adopt a whole school approach in which all staff take responsibility for disadvantaged pupils' outcomes and raise expectations of what they can achieve

Our ultimate objectives are to:

- Remove barriers to learning created by poverty, family circumstance and background
- Narrow the attainment gaps between disadvantaged pupils and their non-disadvantaged counterparts both within school and nationally
- Ensure ALL pupils are able to read fluently and with good understanding to enable them to access the breadth of the curriculum
- Develop confidence in their ability to communicate effectively in a wide range of contexts
- Enable pupils to look after their social and emotional wellbeing and to develop resilience
- Access a wide range of opportunities to develop their knowledge and understanding of the world

In order to achieve our objectives and overcome identified barriers to learning we will:

- Provide all teachers with high quality CPD to ensure that pupils access effective quality first teaching
- Provide targeted intervention and support to quickly address identified gaps in learning including the use of small group work and 1:1 tuition
- Target funding to ensure that all pupils have access to trips, residentials and first hand learning experiences
- Provide opportunities for all pupils to participate in enrichment activities including sport and music
- Provide appropriate nurture support to enable pupils to access learning within and beyond the classroom.

Academic outcomes for Y6 disadvantaged pupils showed a gap in performance between our disadvantaged pupils and their non-disadvantaged peers. This gap is similar to the national picture. 38% of disadvantaged pupils achieved the expected standard in the 3 core areas of Reading, Writing and Maths, compared to 53% of all Highfield pupils, which is a gap of 15%.

This compares to 44% of disadvantaged pupils nationally, and 61% of all pupils, which is a gap of 17%.

Overall outcomes in Year 8 were stronger, with 47% of disadvantaged pupils achieving the expected standard in the 3 core areas of Reading, Writing and Maths compared to 66% of all pupils - a gap of 19%. There is no national data for Year 8.

This indicates that gaps are diminished as pupils move through the school.

Attendance

In the year 2023-24, whole school attendance was 92.7%. For disadvantaged pupils this figure was 89.9% - representing a gap of 2.8%.

Nationally, absence for all pupils was 7.2 % which is just 0.1% above attendance at HMS. Nationally, attendance for disadvantaged pupils was 88.9%, which is 1% lower than attendance for disadvantaged pupils at HMS.

Persistent absence across the school was 20%. For disadvantaged pupils this figure was 34.6% - representing a gap of 14.6%.

Nationally in 2022-23, persistent absence for disadvantaged pupils was 36.5% which is higher than at HMS (awaiting 2023-24 data). Nationally, persistent absence for all pupils was 20.7% in the year 2023-24 which is also higher than at HMS.

We will continue to engage with pupils and families to improve attendance.
