Review: last year's aims and outcomes (2021/22)

Outgoing Year 11 PP achieved a progress 8 score of -0.4 which is a significant improvement from -0.99 in 2019. Pupil Premium progress in English and Maths have increased rapidly from 2019 by 0.10 and 0.6 respectively. The progress of EBACC subjects for Pupil Premium students has improved by 0.6. The 2022 cohort received a robust remote learning system with a support package to ensure all students, but particularly PP students was implemented during the start of the cohorts Key Stage 4 curriculum. All students had access to the necessary provisions to enable them to access live teaching and remain in contact with teachers throughout partial school closures or whilst isolating.

When comparing prediction vs target, our PP students in year 10 are currently –0.7 behind their targets, compared to –0.1 for non-pp peers. In 2021/2022 the KS3 data showed we are maintaining the gap at a very low level in Year 8 and Year 9, being consistently below -0.16. Year 7 followed a similar trajectory until the gap widened slightly. In 2022/2023 Pupil Premium students in this cohort will receive further reading and maths interventions to narrow this gap.

Pupil Premium students have been supported through a robust catch-up programme in a variety of subjects across all year groups. More than 3000 hours of tutoring has been delivered with over 280 students involved, of which 75% were Pupil Premium and/or SEND. Reading has also been a significant whole school focus over the last school year with the launch of the tutor time reading programme and reading interventions of Lexonik and Lexia which Pupil Premium students are prioritised for.
