

### Coronavirus (Covid-19) Update 7 20/3/20

#### Clarification of definition of key workers

#### **Dear Parents and Carers**

Following on from update 6, we have now received details from the Government about those who are classified as "key workers" and further advice about the service schools have been asked to provide from Monday onwards. Please note that our priority will be providing a service that is focused on our younger pupils, as many secondary age pupils will be able to stay safely at home on their own.

The crucial Government advice is that "If children can stay safely at home, they should, to limit the chance of the virus spreading. That is why the government has asked parents to keep their children at home, wherever possible, and asked schools to remain open only for those children who absolutely need to attend".

"It is important to underline that schools, colleges and other educational establishments remain safe places for children. But the fewer children making the journey to school, and the fewer children in educational settings, the lower the risk that the virus can spread and infect vulnerable individuals in wider society".

"Schools are, therefore, being asked to continue to provide care for a limited number of children children who are vulnerable and children whose parents are critical to the Covid-19 response and cannot be safely cared for at home".

"Parents whose work is critical to the COVID-19 response include those who work in health and social care and in other key sectors outlined below. Many parents working in these sectors may be able to ensure their child is kept at home. And every child who can be safely cared for at home should be".

"Please, therefore, follow these key principles:

- 1. If it is at all possible for children to be at home, then they should be.
- 2. If a child needs specialist support, is vulnerable or has a parent who is a critical worker, then educational provision will be available for them.
- 3. Parents should not rely for childcare upon those who are advised to be in the stringent social distancing category such as grandparents, friends, or family members with underlying conditions.
- 4. Parents should also do everything they can to ensure children are not mixing socially in a way which can continue to spread the virus. They should observe the same social distancing principles as adults".









The key worker categories and descriptions set out by the Government are:

Health and social	This includes but is not limited to doctors, nurses, midwives, paramedics, social
care	workers, care workers, and other frontline health and social care staff including

	social care sector; those working as part of the health and social care supply chain,

Education and	This includes nursery and teaching staff, social workers and those specialist
childcare	education professionals who must remain active during the COVID-19 response to

Key public	This includes those essential to the running of the justice system, religious staff,
services	charities and workers delivering key frontline services, those responsible for the
	management of the deceased, and journalists and broadcasters who are providing
	public service broadcasting.
Local and	This only includes those administrative occupations essential to the effective
national	delivery of the COVID-19 response or delivering essential public services such as the
government	payment of benefits, including in government agencies and arms-length bodies.
Food and other	This includes those involved in food production, processing, distribution, sale and
necessary goods	delivery as well as those essential to the provision of other key goods (for example
	hygienic and veterinary medicines).
Public safety and	This includes police and support staff, Ministry of Defence civilians, contractor and
national security	armed forces personnel (those critical to the delivery of key defence and national
	security outputs and essential to the response to the COVID-19 pandemic), fire and
	rescue service employees (including support staff), National Crime Agency staff,
	those maintaining border security, prison and probation staff and other national

Transport	This includes those who will keep the air, water, road and rail passenger and freight
	transport modes operating during the COVID-19 response, including those working

Utilities,	This includes staff needed for essential financial services provision (including but not
communication	limited to workers in banks, building societies and financial market infrastructure),
and financial	the oil, gas, electricity and water sectors (including sewerage), information

	during the COVID-19 response, as well as key staff working in the civil nuclear,
	chemicals, telecommunications (including but not limited to network operations,
