Bilateral Activities	
Bilateral Coordination is the ability to use both sides of your body in a coordinated fashion. Many activities in school and throughout childhood (and life) require bilateral coordination. A child with delayed bilateral coordination development may be clumsy and also struggle with certain gross motor activities. Also, they may frequently try to use one hand for tasks that should require two hands.	 2. Alternating movements Drum or Bongos: with both hands one at a time (reciprocally); try to imitate a rhythm clapping games to use one hand then the other with a partner. Hit a balloon from one hand to the other. Clear up blocks in two lines one left and one right side working with left then right hand into a box. Sit opposite each other on the floor and roll a ball to left side then right side for the child to push back using the left then right hand. Spray a pile of crazy foam on the left and right of the child and splat it. Squirt with a spray water bottle in each hand. Screw up a piece of news paper with each hand and throw one after the other. Throw a tennis ball between the two hands e.g. left to right. Hold a slinky in both hands and pass from one to the other.
