








School Rules

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Welcome to English



What will you study?

In Year 7 you will study a range of texts including: poetry, prose, play scripts and media, as well as a variety of non-fiction texts.

Year 7 follows the literary timeline and therefore all of Year 7 begin the year studying Myths and Legends, a topic you may have studied in Primary already, and this will build on your prior knowledge and introduce you to where literature all began. From Myths and Legends you will move onto study Shakespeare looking at the story of Romeo and Juliet through a media project. Continuing through the literary timeline you will then study a Victorian novel 'Treasure Island' before moving onto war poetry and modern political fiction 'Animal Farm'. The year will end with a modern prose novel focused on American literature.

In Key Stage 3 all classes also have library lessons with Mrs Littlewood. This is once every two weeks and is an opportunity for you to visit the library, change your library book and read for pleasure. We update the books in the library regularly and make sure there is lots to choose from in here!

Key Stage 3 classes also get one P4C lesson every two weeks. P4C or Philosophy for Children is a chance for you to practise speaking and listening skills through enquiries. These are based on a stimulus where you will create a philosophical or 'big' question. These questions often tackle trickier topics such as race, identity or gender and you are then given the opportunity to discuss and formulate opinions in a safe environment.

Clubs

We have a wide range of clubs available for Year 7 in the English department which is always expanding! Some of these currently include:

- **Film Club** with Miss Gill watch and review the latest films as part of Into Film Club.
- **Environmental Club** with Miss Donnelly help to make sure our school is doing all it can to help the environment and promote the importance of looking after our planet.
- Creative Writing Club with Miss Keenan enter a wide range of creative writing competitions both in school and nationally.

Additionally, we are looking to start a **Debate Club**.

Educational Visits

What to expect from Maths at Duke's

At the start of each lesson we like to do some retrieval practice to make sure you are not forgetting any maths that you have not seen for a while. We try to make your lessons as engaging and fun as possible, this way you will hopefully remember the maths and be able to apply the skills and techniques later. Because of this, you can expect to use a range of mathematical equipment, mini whiteboards, games, treasure hunts and make use of interactive whiteboards that are in all classrooms.

We also provide you with knowledge organisers for each topic which allow you to see what you will be doing in the next few maths lessons and also remind you of key facts required for the lesson you are doing that day.

We also set additional tasks on a website called **Hegarty Maths** which are to help close any gaps in your learning but there are also lots of maths games for you to play.

Welcome to Science

In Science lessons here at Duke's you'll learn lots of new skills and ideas. You'll get to take part in lessons about the biology of living things, the chemistry of how chemicals react with one another and the physics of how things move and work.

Science

We have a number of clubs we'd like you to get involved in, and we'll tell you more about each one when you arrive!

We have:

- A STEM club where we can do experiments that help us answer life's big questions
- A robotics clubs if you love coding and building robots
- A gardening club to learn how to grow your own fruits and vegetables
- An ecology club where we look at ways to protect the environment and rear real butterflies

We spend a lot of time doing practical activities and use some great pieces of equipment that help us understand concepts a little easier.

You'll see things burn and explode, you'll grow your own plants and learn all about how to give the best electric shocks using static electricity.



Welcome to Humanities

In Humanities, students use their skills to investigate the past, think critically about the world around them and develop an understanding of the changes in our dynamic world.

During Year 7, students cover a range of units which will help them to appreciate the diversity of our planet. They will develop knowledge and skills helping them to think globally and historically.

History

In History, students investigate the Romans, Normans, medieval Newcastle, medieval medicine, medieval warfare and Richard III.

During these units, students have the opportunity to act out their own Roman Army formations, design their own castle, design a medieval guide and learn about the Black Death.

We use a range of activities in lessons including drama and news reports. They can even take part in a fake trial where they are on a jury to decide the fate of the potential murderer!



Geography



In Geography, students investigate both the human and physical aspects of geography.

They start by looking at the different ecosystems on our planet and have the opportunity to design a plant or an animal which would survive in the rainforest. They also look at life in other countries such as Kenya so they can compare and appreciate the differences in culture and environment.

The final unit of the year gives students time to consider the impact that we have on the environment; we investigate different environmental issues ranging from what happened in Chernobyl to plastics in the oceans.

Students will have the opportunity to design posters to highlight how we can be more environmentally friendly as well as discussion work on the different environmental issues facing our planet.

Extra Curricular Opportunities

Extra curricular opportunities in humanities include the History Club where students are able to develop their knowledge on topics which aren't covered in lessons.

In addition to this there is also the International Schools Club where they will have the opportunity to get involved with schools in other countries and the opportunity to meet and get involved with activities with students from those schools.

- Spirituality and Art


Why?

In Art we use a range of materials in Year 7 from paint to clay! Our department has three teachers Mrs Gatti, Ms McNally and Ms Leigh, who runs our pride society. Welcome to Design & Technology



In Design and Technology we use the design process, skills and knowledge to design and make products that meet the needs of a design brief.

We work in three main material areas to make exciting products:

Term 1 - Textiles - making an ugly doll. Making templates, using fabrics, hand sewing to create a soft toy

Term 2 - Graphics - making a pop up card for an occasion of their choice. Experimenting with pop up ideas, developing design ideas and lettering for the card, presentation skills

Term 3 - Resistant Materials - making a wooden desk tidy in the shape of a creature(pencil holder). Designing, cutting, shaping and finishing wood to create the finished product.

Extra Curricular Activities

There will be a lunchtime craft club running for KS3.



Welcome to Music

What does Music involve in Year 7?

Students in Year 7 will use a range of different instruments including keyboards, guitars, percussion, African percussion etc to produce performances. As well as this, there is a focus on using computers to create and to record music, in particular using Garageband.

Extra Curricular Opportunities

Individual Instrument Lessons form the extra curricular element for Music in Year 7. Students who had instrument tuition in Year 6 at Primary School have to continue their lessons in the same instrument, or can sign up if not). Lessons include singing, guitar, mandolin, ukulele, violin, cello, clarinet, piano, keyboard, flute, saxophone, bassoon, trumpet, cornet, trombone, baritone, tenor horn, steel pans and music theory.

Ensembles

Pupils can join ensembles including choir, steel pan group, brass ensemble, wind band, string group, guitar group, boys rock ensemble, flute ensemble, clarinet ensemble, woodwind group, keyboard group.

We also have the school production that students who are interested in musical theatre (music, dance, drama) can get involved in.

There are regular concerts and visits as well as visiting guests/performers on occasion.

Welcome to Drama



What does Drama involve in Year 7?

In Year 7, students are introduced to a wide range of drama exercises in order to develop communication and interaction skills.

Students will participate in a series of physical theatre workshops and be able to showcase their mime and movement presentations in a safe and engaging environment. Students will then have the opportunity to explore and perform a range of repertoire including texts written by Charles Dickens and William Shakespeare.

Students will utilise the skills and techniques developed in the introductory part of the year to create and perform devised group performances.



Welcome to Food

In Year 7 you are introduced to 'Healthy Living'.

Lessons are one hour over the two week timetable.

During this time you will do a mixture of theory and practical lessons, starting off with health and safety in the practical room and personal hygiene.

Over the year we will also look at weighing and measuring, different types of equipment and nutrition as well as functions of ingredients. You will also gain skills in product evaluation and how you can alter your dishes for specific customers. Your teachers will be, Mrs Shinkfield, Mrs Fitzsimmons and Mrs Walker.

Practical lessons over the year include:

- Fruit salad knife skills
- Welsh Rarebit use of the grill
- Melting Moments use of the oven
- Cowboy Beans and Sausage use of the hob
- Apple Crumble rubbing in method
- Fruit Scones rubbing in method (adding liquid)
- Pizza Whirls savoury rubbing in method
- Vegetable Stir Fry Revisit use of the hob
- Focaccia bread making skills
- Eve's Pudding creaming method

We will seek to offer all of our students a PE programme that is broad and balanced, with a strong emphasis on physical activity, skill development and health and well-being. In order to achieve these aims, we will strive to provide a learning environment where students feel valued and enjoy taking part.

We believe that regular active involvement in 'high quality' PE, sport and physical activity raises standards across the secondary curriculum and addresses key issues such as health and well-being, confidence and self-esteem.

Sporting Success

NCEA Duke's prides itself on its comprehensive and full programme of intra and inter-school sport. It is our policy to field sports teams, and we attend most inter school sporting events that are facilitated by the Ashington and Amble School Games Development Manager and other community organisations.

Welcome to PSHE

PSHE as a subject is not assessed, but at Duke's, we believe that these lessons are very important to help people prepare for changes and situations that life brings. You get one lesson a fortnight.

Most lessons are taught by Mrs Freeman, but there are a handful of other staff who teach in different year groups.

Students cover elements of key concepts and develop an understanding of how they can be linked and developed through time and changes they experience. This involves relationship and sex education, life's changes that we go through, drug awareness, tolerance, democracy and mental health to name but a few. We also like to prepare students by teaching CPR in Year 9 as well as some standalone first aid lessons.

This is all achieved through a spiral curriculum where areas are revisited and importantly built upon to make connection relevant to age and situations. An example of this is the relationship and sex education where Year 7 start with puberty, worries and support and each year we move on and develop further through conception, contraception, body image, abusive relationships, negotiation skills, consent and parenting.

Lessons allow opportunities for discussion and listening to others views. Sometimes people can get emotional and people often feel comfortable enough to share some of their own experiences if they want to, or voice their opinion.

Welcome to Learning Support

In Learning support you will always find someone who will try their best to help you in any way that they can.

It is Mrs Collin the SENDCo's role to support you if you struggle with learning for any reason. This might include you having a learning passport or receiving some additional support in lessons.

Nurture and Intervention

As well as a team of highly skilled learning support assistants who work in lessons and with small groups at tutor time you will find nurture and intervention.

Nurture Club runs at break and lunch times, this is a great way to meet new people and make friends while playing lots of games and developing life skills. Nurture also leads on fundraising and we often have trips out and visitors in linked to our fundraising efforts.

Mrs Henderson and Mrs Oakley would love to see you and talk to you about Nurture Club, or any ideas you might have for fundraising including who to fundraise for.

Intervention is open early in the morning so you can come and relax before the school day starts, it is also open at break and lunch time when there is usually a film on.

In Learning Support you will also find Dottie, our pet gecko, who loves to have visitors and meet new people!
