
#### JULY 2023

#### Y10 Work Experience Trip

A small group of year 10 students took part in an Army supercamp over 3 days as part of their work experience. For the first part of Monday, students visited Harrogate Army Foundation College which involved a tour of the site, an introduction to drill marching, an explanation of all of the kit soldiers use as a part of their training, as well as personal training which involved an obstacle course to test speed and balance, and crab football. On Monday afternoon, students moved to Catterick Army Base where they ate in the mess hall amongst regular soldiers, got to see an operational army base, were issued their kit to wear and the items they would need for fieldcraft the following day; they also had the opportunity to sleep in an ar-



On Tuesday morning students woke up and packed their kit ready to move to Albemarle Barracks for the remainder of the experience. Firstly they were introduced to Battle PT, Team building exercises and a STEM activity which involved collaboratively building a device to transport an ammunition container. Then students moved into the field where they were shown how to cook ration pack meals for themselves. Students were then shown how to construct their own sleeping space in the woods using a basher, rope and sticks which they would be sleeping under that night. Tuesday was rounded off with some lessons on first aid, reconnaissance manoeuvres, a stalking exercise through the woods and a mini reconnaissance mission.

After a night sleeping in their shelters, students were surprised with an attack simulation which required them to respond to the sound of gunfire, investigate the situation and then conduct an emergency medical evacuation as a team, transporting the wounded soldier to a safe helicopter extraction site. The students threw themselves into the supercamp and thoroughly enjoyed the experience. This term has seen the start of a new enrichment club with Mrs Harvey - **KS3 Karaoke Club**! 10 boys from years 7 and 8 signed up and have been an absolute revelation! Mrs Harvey is very proud of them all and has enjoyed the performances (although she is a bit gutted that the boys are so enthusiastic she never actually gets a turn to sing!) To celebrate **National Creativity Day** on the 30th of May, students at Duke's completed a 30 circles challenge. Students were each asked to turn 30 circles into as many things as they could think of. The most creative pieces of work were shortlisted by the Art department and our twinned school in Germany, Rontgen-Gymnasium will be selecting the winner. #### Challenge under the Sea!

A team of six year 9 boys and girls represented Duke's at the Global Underwater Hub Challenge which took place at the Port of Blyth on 9<sup>th</sup> May. Their task was to design, build and programme a robot that would navigate the sea-floor and collect litter on its way. Students had to bring together a range of skills from engineering and technology to create a functioning robot that responded to different light levels to chart its path. They also needed to employ their creative and collaboration skills to design a marketing brief, TV advert storyboard and presentation to the judging panel. They didn't win the regional competition, but they did create a successful robot and delivered a confident presentation, so well done to the team!



#### STEMFest is out of this world

Ever wondered what STEM (science, technology, engineering and maths) industries there are in the North East? What careers could you have, only a short journey from home? 30 year 7 and 8 students spent the day finding out at **STEMFest 2023**. Companies from across the region, many of whom are based only a few miles from Duke's, delivered hands-on activities in the areas of space, manufacturing, environment and cyber-security, in a jammedpacked event at the Eagles Vertu Motors Arena in Newcastle on 6<sup>th</sup> July. The students had a busy day trying their hand at programming challenges, wind farm efficiencies, helicopter design and much more, plus a real brain-buster of a cyber-escape room with codes to crack and hackers to intercept! They were not left unrewarded for their efforts though, as there were plenty of freebies to collect along the way!

## What is the Summer Reading Challenge?

Every year, thousands of families all over the country take part in the UK's biggest reading event for children in libraries, the Summer Reading Challenge, run by the charity <u>The Reading Agency</u>. There is a different theme each year. This year's theme is 'Ready Set Read,' and the aim of the challenge is to get children to read six books of their choice from their local library during the summer holidays.

### Enrolling your child

The Summer Reading Challenge is aimed at children aged four to twelve. It is run in every public library in Northumberland, and it is completely free. **Saturday 8 July** is the official launch date, so you can go to your local library and sign up on that day or any time up to **Saturday 26 August**. All children must be finished by **Saturday 9 September.** On joining, your child will be given fun materials to get them started - a poster and stickers. Children's reading can 'dip' during the long summer holidays, but the Summer Reading Challenge helps children to keep up their reading skills and confidence.

### How does my child complete the challenge?

- To complete the challenge children, need to visit the library at least 3 times over the summer holidays and read 6 books.
- Collect stickers along the way some are even scratch and sniff
- Complete the Challenge, after reading six books and feel proud as they are presented with a special Certificate to celebrate their achievement.
- Have lots of fun and read some amazing books.
