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Revise



Mind Maps are a really important revision tool as they help you to identify and make links between key information.

They also help you to remember the information through the use of colour and pattern.



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Revise



- To create a mind map take a blank piece of paper - the larger the better
- Use one piece of paper for each section / topic you are revising
- Give the mind map a bold title
- Add key information / facts / names / dates. Use different colours for these
- Make links between the information by using arrows



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Revise




Mind maps work best if they are attractive, **bold** and **colourful** as this makes the information easier to remember.

Put them on a wall and look at them regularly.


Try to recreate the mind maps from memory. Check what you have missed and add to the copies.




Revise > Mind Maps




1. Identify Knowledge



2. Identify Sub Topics



3. Branch Off



4. Use Images & Colour



5. Put It Somewhere Visible

Avoid using too much information: mind maps are designed to summarise key information and connect areas of a topic/subject. If you overcrowd the page, you lose the point of the mind map and will find it harder to visualise the information when trying to recall it.
