I am a Year 12 Sixth Form student at Duke's who studies Sport and Media Studies. I really want to get involved in sports journalism in the future so I thought choosing these options were the best for me. You shouldn't feel worried if you're choosing an A-Level course you haven't studied previously at GCSE level. I didn't study Sport for my GCSEs and still feel confident when turning up to lessons, as well as understanding the information teachers are giving.

Sixth Form begins in the morning at 8:30 am when tutor starts. In tutor you learn what is happening throughout the week as well as Uni-Frog tasks and small PHSE lessons. After tutor you could either have another lesson straight away or a free, which means that you can use the common room for how you wish - you can revise, take notes on previous lessons or use the facilities the common room has to offer such as; darts boards, a pool table, a vending machine and sweet machines. Then whenever you finish your lessons for the day, you are allowed to go home. I really like the timetables in sixth form because on most days, I have more free time to prioritise tasks and can leave when I've finished my work.

There are a lot of different courses that Dukes Sixth Form have to offer as well as a new course called a T-Level, the equivalent to three A-Levels. This course specialises in childcare and friends of mine study the childcare course.

A statement from a Duke's Sixth Form Student includes; "I love Sixth Form because it gives me a lot of freedom and I enjoy my lessons, while doing the childcare course I feel so much more new responsibility!"

The childcare course involves spending 1 full day every week visiting childcare provisions and working with the children as part of the course due to needing a certain amount of hours on placement to pass.



LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES

Duke's Sixth Form also offers work experience opportunities. This involves going to a place of work that seems interesting to you or something you are wanting to do in the future. You stay with the employer for a week and take on the different roles they have to offer. For example, if you were interested in working in a primary school then you could go ahead and contact the head teacher of a school of your choice and get the opportunity to work in the school-based setting for a week, learning and understanding the various different roles within the profession. My work experience has been with NCEA Trust learning about the role of Marketing; including copywriting, photography, video editing, writing press releases and graphic design.

When I was in year 11, I wanted to go to Newcastle Sixth Form College but upon going to open evenings in our sixth form, it changed my mind for the better. Being in Dukes Sixth Form is much better in my opinion, because you are surrounded by people you are familiar with, you know the majority of the staff and don't have to worry about making new friends.

There are opportunities to leave school whenever you need and shops are very local too! I really believe that choosing to go to Sixth Form was a great choice as it feels very freeing and less like your in a secondary school setting. I think overall sixth form is a great choice if you still want to have the structure of school lessons but crave a bit more responsibility.

Duke's Secondary 3 Steps to Effective Examination







- 1. Get the **Revision Environment** right.
- 2. Create a **Revision Timetable**, prioritise your weaker subjects.
- 3. Read and Organise your notes.
- 4. **Fill in any gaps** in your notes and check your understanding.
- 1. Condense Your Notes- make them manageable.
- 2. Create **Flash Cards** to learn information from class notes or **Revision Guides**.
- 3. Create **Mind Maps** to learn topics from memory.
- 4. Try to copy down **Flash Cards** and **Mind Maps** from memory.
- 5. Use the **List It** technique and Mnemonics to help you remember information.
 - 1. Use **Exam Papers** to test your knowledge.
 - 2. Use **Mark Schemes** to mark exam papers and identify gaps in your knowledge.
 - 3. Use **Other Memory Tests** to test knowledge and understanding:-
 - Brain Dump
 - Teach someone
 - Get someone to ask you Questions
 - Make links between Keywords

Year 9 students should now be thinking about what their possible next options are for year 10 regarding their GCSEs. This includes choosing two subjects they are interested in or two subjects that match their aspirations. We will offer guidance to ensure they have the best chance at gaining as many relevant qualifications as possible - as well as the opportunity to choose EBacc, which is made up of subjects considered essential to many degrees including English, Maths, Science, History or Geography and French.

Students will be doing eight GCSEs starting with English language, English literature, Mathematics and either dual or triple science. If choosing dual science, students should pick one option from each of the three blocks but if choosing to do triple science then students should pick one option from block two and three ONLY. Students can't take the same subject more than once and a reserve choice must be selected in the case where courses become oversubscribed.

This year we are introducing 14-16 Engineering Skills Academy, which will be ran side by side with Northumberland College. Students will spend three days in Dukes receiving English, Maths and Science lessons and two days in college working towards an engineering qualification, gaining valuable work experience with employer based learning in the engineering sector and industry masterclasses. However, students will need to be achieving a grade 5 in English, Maths and Science at GCSE level in order to be eligible for this course.

Remember to choose subjects that you're interested in, talk to your teachers and seek their advice and DO NOT pick a subject just because you like the teacher or because your friends are taking the same course. If you require any advice don't hesitate to ask questions!

08 DUKE'S SCIENCE GOES WILD



Students participated in the RAF 'Blast off to RIAT' workshop on Thursday 20th February, where they designed and built their own space lander! The whole-day event involved team work, creativity, resilience and engineering skills, and showcased how the RAF has a wide range of job opportunities in traditional Earth-based flying, and in cutting edge space exploration! Two teams will be going on to develop their designs, with the chance of winning tickets to this year's Royal International Air Tattoo, this summer.

Y7 & 8 have also been reviewing the six shortlisted science books, to decide which is their favourite for the coveted 'Book of Year' prize, awarded by the Royal Society. We have submitted our decision, and are now awaiting the prize ceremony to find out who the 700 schools and library groups across the country jointly chose as the winner.

YR 9

Students have been participating in Girls and Boys GetSET programmes, which develops understanding of engineering roles with one of our local employers, Baker Hughes. This showcases the opportunities available through the global company, through practical, hands-on activities. Students have had to design and build a prototype pipeline inspection gadget (PIG) and test it in a model pipeline. We have also visited their factory in Walker to see how pipelines which carry oil and gas are manufactured and tested.

YR 10

Year 10 students on the STEM Like Us programme are receiving one-to-one mentoring so they can develop their career aspirations, learn more about how to achieve their goals, and develop a pathway to success. Along the way, there are challenges and competitions to participate in, and the highest achieving students will win a prize at the end of the year. Last year's cohort's winners will be attending a celebratory event at the House of Lords, London, in the summer.
