Key knowledge

Chronology – Birth and death dates of each person and what else was happening in the world at that time

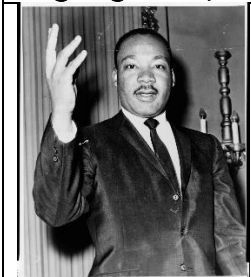
Location – Where was the person born and where were they live / work

Sources of Evidence – How do we know: videos, diaries, audio, biographies, encyclopedia

Beliefs – Civil rights, equality

Lives of the rich and poor – including prejudice and injustice

Legacy – equal rights, scientific discoveries, achievements
