Headteacher's Message

Dear Parents and Carers,

Happy new school year!

What a personal pleasure it is for me to be back in school with your lovely children and the fantastic staff we have here. I am delighted to say that I am back to work normally after the joy of two hospital stays and pneumonia.

The summer break is, for teaching staff, usually a time for reflection and rejuvenation as well as tiring in its own way as a parent myself. The holidays, plus that reluctant time off (!), has certainly made me feel even more gratitude for the fantastic job I have and focused my thinking in continuing to improve this wonderful school.

The year ahead looks very exciting as we consolidate what we do well and improve to be the very best we can be for your children. We always have at the heart of our provision a focus on the 'whole child', with exciting plans afoot for courageous advocacy (forging a better world), pastoral activities and building resilience and courage in tough times. Curriculum-wise, we are focusing on academic rigour and providing real depth and challenge for all. Lessons here *should* be difficult, getting to that 'stretch zone' where learning happens most deeply. From the children's point of view, hopefully they will come home talking about neatness and presentation and taking pride in their writing, which will be a big 'push' over the next year.

We are not just focused on written presentation though: we are focusing on the presentation of the school site too! Hopefully over the coming weeks and months, you will notice changes from our new library, our evolving Early Years area (the contractors are rather behind schedule at the moment though...!) and other improvements across our fantastic outdoor learning provision.

Faith remains central to what we do. Our Christian welcome is unconditional, for all faiths and none, as we guide children to love themselves, love each other, and love the world, knowing that they are special, this school is special, but there is also a special wider world: that we are part of something greater than just ourselves.

Hopefully, my excitement for the year ahead is at least slightly infectious (!). It is a wonderful time to be part of the Warkworth CofE Primary community. On that note, to those of you who are new to the school, may I welcome you here; and to those of you who are in their ump-teenth year as you work through sending the whole family here, welcome back, and I hope you know the school is in very safe hands.

Our vision and values are at the heart of all we do and I felt the first newsletter back was a great opportunity to share why we do what we do with our families and what makes our school unique compared to others across the region and country!

We are immensely proud of our history as a village school whilst recognising that we now serve a wider, more varied community across central Northumberland.

Our vision and mission are inspired by St. Paul, who guided early Christians through a challenging world. He taught vulnerable individuals to love everyone, even those who did not love him back. We **strive together as one**, working as one whole school to better ourselves and the world through **acts of love and good works**.

Our values are **Love**, **Peace** and **Courage**, the most important of which is love. Everything we do is built around this vision, but particularly our curriculum – at its core is that we teach rigorous lessons with high expectations within a loving, nurturing environment. We believe that it is part of our social and Christian mission that all children are exposed to a broad, balanced and challenging body of deep knowledge.



Love is our guiding value, at the core of every interaction and our school rules. We have just three school rules, although we appreciate that they are not always easy to follow!

Love at our school is unconditional, embracing all, regardless of their background or faith. We aspire for everyone to express this love throughout their lives. The rainbow heart represents all people.

St Paul taught early Christians that they must show **Peace** to all, symbolised by the dove of the Holy Spirit on our school badge, whilst also finding peace within ourselves.

In tough times, we need **Courage**, inspired by St. Paul's resilience even in prison (hence the picture above!). We need courage to drive us to show love and peace, no matter the challenges we face.

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PE, Swimming and Water Safety

As you may already be aware, Mrs Frater has, amongst her myriad of other roles, the joy of leading PE. This makes sense given that her idea of a holiday is simply doing marathon-length runs in a different climate and that the Great North Run this coming weekend is more like a warm up for her other running commitments. She has a passion for PE and the power of sport which the children here will benefit from enormously.

Mrs Frater and I met shortly before I went off sick to review PE and agreed that, for the year ahead, we would look to provide something a little different to the primary school norm. Namely, Key Stage 1 children will begin swimming lessons to embed this fantastic life skill as early as possible, and children across Key Stage 2 will have a range of water safety activities (like kayaking), taking advantage of the opportunities in the area.

We are also looking at expanding the competitive sports offer and promoting the power of physical exercise to help body, mind and spirit.

If this interests you, please leave your details with Mrs Gibson. The PTFA would be open to anyone linked to the school, not just parents and main carers!





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


Warkworth Show

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The Local Community



Last night, I attended my first Warkworth Parish Council meeting as a guest. This is part of my efforts to rebuild as many local links as possible that over the years may have faded. I am very grateful to CIIr Ann Burke for inviting me and it was lovely to share our vision for the school with local councillors. There are plans to engage with the village more over the coming months and years.

I feel that building links with the village is actually even *more* important now that the majority of our families do not live in Warkworth. This is because, no matter where our families come from across Northumberland, we can be rooted within a community and share a common history.

However, we also want to build links beyond the village. If there is an organisation that the school can work with in the area, no matter the size, please do get in touch. I'm particularly interested in community groups in Amble as so many of our families live in the town.



Road Safety



As discussed in previous communications before I was off, road safety was a priority due to some serious incidents in the past. I do my best, meetings permitting, to come out once a day or have another member of staff do so, both to meet and greet and also to ensure that children and families are safe.

From our brief experiences this week, things appear safer but, especially when the cold days restart and families may resent walking through the wind, ice and snow (!), may I please respectfully request the following:

- Please do not park or wait on the yellow zig zag at any time (between 8am and 5pm).
 Waiting on these lines (even if your child takes 5 seconds to leave the car!) is against the law. This is for the safety of our school community (for instance, if we had to request an ambulance).
- Please park considerately with respect to our local community. This especially includes not blocking driveways.
- Please do not park near to the junction on Guilden Road leading into West Close & Lynsader Court. This is causing undue congestion and safety issues.

At the Parish Council meeting, I spoke to Cllr Jeff Watson, Northumberland County Council councillor for the area. Whilst no zebra crossing is planned, sadly, there is potential for pencil-type bollards. I will keep in contact with local representatives about this matter.





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Flu Jabs and MMR

The flu vaccination programme will commence in Autumn term for almost all children in school (Reception and up). The provisionally confirmed date is 24/10/23.

In order for your child to received the flu vaccination in school you will need to register at <u>this website</u> and use school code NB122301.

In addition, the Department for Education has asked all schools to remind families about the importance of MMR jabs:

The Department for Education urges schools to stress the importance of MMR vaccination, as measles is highly contagious and can lead to severe health issues, including hospitalization and even death. MMR vaccine, administered at 1 year and 3 years 4 months, prevents measles outbreaks, particularly in schools. Early years settings' support is appreciated in promoting vaccination. Parents should ensure their children's vaccines are up to date, and MMR vaccines can be obtained through their GP at any age.

Operation Encompass

For your information, the school is part of Operation Encompass. This is to support families experiencing domestic abuse. A notification is shared with the school to the Designated Safeguarding Leads if police attend a domestic incident where children are related to the adult parties present.
