Parents I have spoken to have been very positive about being able to come and it being at the end of the day for their work and personal schedules, so we will continue this. It will be held at 2:30pm, with children dismissed from church.

Parents' Evening

It is Parents' Evening on Tuesday 12th March and Wednesday 13th March. Booking slots will be made available on Arbor early next week.

We will be hosting Parents' Evening in the hall this time, with families invited to wait inside classrooms where you will have more space. I will also have my own table, no booking slot required, on the Wednesday night if you would like to catch me about anything at all. (I sadly have an immovable meeting on the Tuesday night.) However, the Chair of Governors, Prof. Hobrough, will be in attendance on the Tuesday evening.

Families with children who have SEND and who attended just before half-term do not need to attend, although you are welcome to if you there are further things to discuss.

Lunchtimes

As you are likely aware from previous communications, we have evolved our lunchtime provision considerably, from clubs to reducing the number of children on the yard at any one time. Alongside this, we have been focusing on further improving our dinner manners, from serving others first when pouring our cups of water to knife and fork usage. The children have responded very positively! We will continue to be on the lookout for this over the next half-term!



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Fundraising

On Friday 15th March, it is Comic Relief Red Nose Day. Children are invited to wear red and of course the famous red noses! We will be thinking about what the day means both through Worship as well as in classes, considering the history of the day and why it was set up, as well as the work the charity continues to do.

However, we are acutely aware of the cost of living crisis that is affecting families up and down the country as well as closer to home. Having thought long and hard about it, we have chosen to not request donations directly from families on the day - instead, families are warmly invited to <u>make their own</u> <u>donations</u> through the official website, as well as signposting to <u>Amble Food Bank</u> for a charity that works specifically in our local area.

We are currently looking closely at our school's Courageous Advocacy offer - specifically, how we as a school community help to better people's lives both in our local area as well as globally. Children will be, in conjunction with the School Council, considering which causes they feel are most important to them and thinking through ways to make meaningful impact, be that through raising funds, writing letters, campaigning, or making awareness.





Educational Visit Costs

Just as we are aware of how many families across our community from all walks of life are struggling in these trying times, we are mindful about the costs of visits. We do our utmost to reduce costs and insulate families from paying as far as possible.

For instance, our local coach company ceased trading just before Christmas (we received two days' notice!). This meant seeking coach transport elsewhere for visits already paid for, often for higher prices given the short notice. We chose to take those costs from the school budget.

We are utilising our Sports Premium to pay for some incredible watersports activities as well as a fully funded residential for our leaving Year 6s. We pay for swimming lessons and ask for contributions to help with the high transport costs - for our Key Stage 1 children, this goes above and beyond the National Curriculum as part of our wider sporting offer. We will be requesting help from the local history society for transport costs for future history trips and we continue to use Pupil Premium funding to help eligible families.

Our requests for parent support are voluntary for all trips other than residentials, but please note that, without such support from so many families, these trips would not be possible. Whilst remaining as neutral as possible, schools are increasingly having to do more with less money and our school is no exception with a range of considerable financial challenges.

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Cambridge University Visit & Careers

Years 5&6 thoroughly enjoyed their visitor from King's College, University of Cambridge, on the final day of term. After the visit from Oxford before Christmas, they are turning into higher education experts - our visitor remarked that they could name more university subjects than when she does talks for Year 12s!

The purpose of these visits is not just to raise aspirations and talk about famed institutions but also to encourage children to think more about their future. As discussed in some previous newsletters, we want children to be thinking more about careers earlier, from the academic to the vocational.

Families in Years 3, 4 and 5 have recently received a short survey about future residentials - the deadline for return is Monday 4th March!












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National Science Week


The theme for this year is 'time', from considering seasonal changes to thinking deeply about what time actually *is*, alongside the role of time in experiments.




Easter Crafts on 20th March

At our school, we believe passionately in the importance of reading - not just because it helps make our children better academically and ready for future challenges in future schooling and life generally, but because reading is such a deep pleasure that all children deserve to have access to.

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Playground Leaders

We will be launching Playground Leaders over the coming term. This is about enabling our oldest children to develop their leadership skills, as well as their capabilities to manage conflict (!) and to give increasing ownership and independence ahead of their move beyond our school.

The Year 5s are receiving training from Northumberland County Council around peer mentoring - understanding what it means to be a mentor and about the responsibilities around helping younger children.

As part of this, with the Year 6s, they will be helping to organise games outside, modelling best practice, encouraging children to take part in physical exercise and putting their PE knowledge into action.

This is part of our wider Personal Development offer that we are honing extensively as we move from great to hopefully even better. We want children across school to improve their resilience, their emotional well-being and their independence. We are looking forward to seeing the results.

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Safeguarding Survey

Thank you so much to the roughly half of families who completed the safeguarding questionnaire last month!

Results were very positive across the board. Almost every single parent felt the school kept their child safe, that their children were happy, felt they could talk to both classroom staff and senior leaders, and that children are well looked after both in terms of mental health support as well as more broadly. Some questions were the same as the Ofsted survey last May and it was great to see that questions around behaviour and bullying were up from the already high point last year. These positive results have been shared with staff and the full details of all responses shared with the Chair of Governors, Prof. Hobrough, and the CEO, Mr Hardie.

Of course though, surveys also give things that need actioned or further explanation. I particularly appreciate the families that took the time to detail and contextualise their answers so we could investigate and take appropriate action with issues. Please find a short summary below of some of this.

You said	We did
One question about the tone of Collective Worship.	Collective Worship is for children of all faiths and none and we take great pride in uniting both the universal message as well as the Christian. However, this comment was shared with all staff, both those who lead Worship and those who take part from their seats, to recap the inclusive nature of Worship as well as to welcome challenge and suggestions about Worship themes. If any families want to discuss Worship themes, please do not hesitate to get in touch with me directly.
A small number of parents queried school meal varieties and healthiness.	We reviewed the school menu choices with the catering team. The school meets the DfE requirements and the provision is audited by the academy trust catering team. There is an excellent, mixed selection of balanced meals every day, However, I spent some additional time observing children eat and I do think some work may need to be done with ensuring children exercise their choice to avoid repetitiveness! Some further investigation via pupil voice will be completed this year.
Three parents asked about what was happening with mental health support across school.	Children's mental health remains as high on the agenda now as it was in previous years. In addition to our social care student working with many children, we also continue to explore ideas around mindfulness, being grounded, and looking after our mental health (for staff as well as children!), from everyday interactions to planned sessions within classes and Worship, as well as our core value of 'Peace'. Thrive practice continues to be at the heart of what we do. We have worked hard to train staff up to work with children across the whole school in more specific 1:1 and group sessions for those with specific needs. However, we need to improve publicising our actions to the wider community and the survey results have resulted in putting children's mental health as a 'standing item' in our weekly whole-staff briefing.
Around 20% struggled finding key policies	The safeguarding section of this newsletter (and future ones!) now has hyperlinks to key policies that may be of note which should hopefully make this easier to find. Mrs Gibson has also recently increased the amount of safeguarding resources given to families via Class Dojo.
Four responses questioned behaviour	Whilst our children's behaviour remains excellent, after reviewing parent comments with staff, there was agreement that we could push to be even better, especially in transition points and outside. We have recently had a big 'push' on what our school rules mean in practice which seem to be paying dividends already. This is high on all staff's agendas.



Safeguarding
