Working together to benefit our children

Although we have moved on from the direct impact of the Covid pandemic, this school year has continued to throw up new challenges. These have ranged from the cost of living crisis which has impacted on all of us, to the effects of industrial action. All of this on top of the long term impacts of austerity which have made life even more challenging for many in our communities.

It also feels at times there is an unrelenting expectation for schools to deal with problems we have a society, such as the impact of social media, and step in to make up for cut backs in other services. Throw in the impact of high stakes accountability and inspection, along with the increasing challenge in recruiting and retaining staff, then the level of challenge is huge.

This isn't of course unique to education and there is high challenge in other sectors, but despite all of this I remain optimistic about the future of the young people in our schools. Why?

Although there are many ways in which OFSTED could and should be reformed, having four of our schools inspected this year had highlighted what our staff do incredibly well every day and the strength of working together as a family of schools.

In each OFSTED inspection report, there are five categories where a judgement is made, depending on the age range of the school. Castle has six as it is all through school. This means that over the four inspections we've received judgements in twenty one categories. All but one of these judgements has been "Good" which is a fantastic achievement and should provide reassurance to our parents and carers. A single judgement of "Requires Improvement" was received in one category at Duke's, but is a significant improvement on the previous inspection. Both we and the OFSTED inspection team are confident that Duke's we be judged "Good" in every aspect by the next inspection.

OFSTED reports are very short and contain only a fraction of the feedback which we receive from the inspectors during each inspection. We have a great deal of additional information which tells us how well our schools are doing and importantly also informs our annual school improvement planning. The collaboration between our schools, sharing ideas, training, resources, etc. makes us stronger as a family of schools rather than single schools in a way that benefits our children.

The inspection feedback tells us that our children feel safe and happy in our schools and where this isn't the case, staff act swiftly to put things right. It has been great to see that the tireless work of our staff and their positive impact on the children has been recognised. It's also very pleasing to have the best feedback we've ever received from our parents and carers and in the pupil surveys.

As I've said before, we don't always get it right, but when we get something wrong we try to put things right as quickly as possible and learn from it. Strangely, I think that our shared experiences during the Covid pandemic have brought our schools and families closer together and this can only be a good thing for our children.

Finally, it is a joy to see our children working so hard to do well and having genuine pride in their progress and achievements. Despite the ongoing challenges I have no doubt that their desire to do well will enable them to 'let their lights shine' and this is why I still consider it a great privilege to lead our trust. I wish all of our pupils, staff and families a happy and restful summer break.





The end of term and the summer holidays for pupils and for many staff stretch out ahead of us. What are the memories of summer holidays of your youth? Although there are a few highlights that stick in my memory, there was also an awful lot of "nowt". Me and my brothers lolling around on the sofa or the lawn and saying we were fed up and rolling our eyes. Everything seems so frantic these days. What should I be doing next? How long have I got left to do that? What else is on the list? What am I behind on? It can squeeze out time for God, for loved ones and for ourselves. We may not notice the beauty and wonder of the world and the people around us.

Sometimes we think absolutely everything is vital and urgent but look at the birds and the flowers they don't fret yet they are created and flourish, loved into existence by God.

God is with us and cares for us wherever we are just like the birds of the air and flowers of the field.

Almighty God bless us with the time and space to stop and stare this summer, May you bring peace and contentment into our busy lives. In Jesus' name. Amen.


Alan Hardie, NCEAT's CEO, said:












A small group of year 10 students took part in an Army supercamp over 3 days as part of their work experience. For the first part of Monday, students visited Harrogate Army Foundation College which involved a tour of the site, an introduction to drill marching, an explanation of all of the kit soldiers use as a part of their training, as well as personal training which involved an obstacle course to test speed and balance, and crab football. On Monday afternoon, students moved to Catterick Army Base where they ate in the mess hall amongst regular soldiers, got to see an operational army base, were issued their kit to wear and the items they would need for fieldcraft the following day; they also had the opportunity to sleep in an

On Tuesday morning students woke up and packed their kit ready to move to Albemarle Barracks for the remainder of the experience. Firstly they were introduced to Battle PT, Team building exercises and a STEM activity which involved collaboratively building a device to transport an ammunition container. Then students moved into the field where they were shown how to cook ration pack meals for themselves. Students were then shown how to construct their own sleeping space in the woods using a basher, rope and sticks which they would be sleeping under that night. Tuesday was rounded off with some lessons on first aid, reconnaissance manoeuvres, a stalking exercise through the woods and a mini reconnaissance mission.

After a night sleeping in their shelters, students were surprised with an attack simulation which required them to respond to the sound of gunfire, investigate the situation and then conduct an emergency medical evacuation as a team, transporting the wounded soldier to a safe helicopter extraction site. The students threw themselves into the supercamp and thoroughly enjoyed the experience.







Last week Duke's had their opening night for Little Shop of Horrors and it was an enormous success.

They had a small but significant cast made up of mainly Year 11s who have worked tirelessly during exam season and they performed brilliantly.

The students love it when staff are in the audience and we were pleased to see how blown away everyone was with the talent on stage.








Thank you to all the parent/carers who visited Duke's on 11 July for 'Take your Parent/Carer to school day'.


