However, it is important that children are supported to explore the online world safely. We understand that conversations about online safety can sometimes feel daunting. To help with this, the NSPCC has worked with experts to create **Techosaurus**, a child friendly platform designed especially for younger children who are beginning to use technology and the internet. **Techosaurus** keeps conversations about online safety positive and accessible, helping children to develop healthy online habits from an early age while building essential knowledge and skills. Parent and Carer Survey 2026

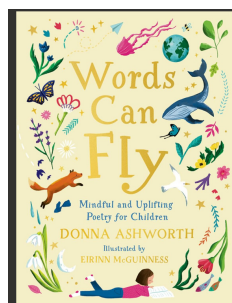

Warmer Weather Reminder Here's hoping...



As the weather becomes warmer, please ensure children come to school prepared with a sun hat and a refillable water bottle, clearly labelled with their name. We recommend that sun cream is applied at home before school. If sun cream needs to be reapplied during the school day, children must be able to apply this themselves. Any sun cream brought into school must be clearly named, and parents are asked to check ingredients and labels carefully, particularly for nut-based products such as almond oil, as we are a nut-free school.
