

Introduction

As part of a new primary National Curriculum, taking effect from September 2014, learning French has become a requirement for children within KS2. St Augustine's has taught French informally for several years, through school clubs, displays around school and activities within classes.

Aims

We aim to:

- develop children's experience of language acquisition and encouraging curiosity about languages.
- develop their understanding of what they hear and read, and have an ability to express themselves in speech and writing.
- extend their knowledge of how language works and explore differences between French and English.
- strengthen their sense of identity through learning about culture in Francophone countries and comparing it with their own culture.

Teaching and Learning Overview

Teaching is in line with the recommendations of the National Curriculum, with modifications in place which allow for the individual and differentiated needs of the children. It takes full account of the different experiences, strengths and interests of the children whilst also complying with the requirements and guidance on inclusion

The national curriculum for languages aims to ensure that all pupils:

- understand and respond to spoken and written language from a variety of authentic sources.
- speak with increasing confidence, fluency and spontaneity, finding ways of communicating what they want to say, including through discussion and asking questions, and continually improving the accuracy of their pronunciation and intonation
- can write at varying length, for different purposes and audiences, using the variety of grammatical structures that they have learnt
- discover and develop an appreciation of a range of writing in the language studied.

Organisation

French is taught in a whole-class setting using a newly Purchased (Spring 2 2021) KAPOW Scheme of Learning. French is taught weekly and teachers use the target language regularly throughout the week to embed learning.

French Curriculum overview

Kapow Primary offers full coverage of the KS2 Languages curriculum. We have categorised our content into five strands, with one overarching strand:

Resources:

We currently use the KAPOW Scheme of Learning for French. Historically, St. Augustine's have used the Lightbulb Languages Scheme and in addition to this we have "La Jolie Ronde" and 2 Simple French. We have a small selection of French dictionaries and reference books and stories.

Assessment and Record Keeping

Informal assessment of progress will be made by the teacher during lessons through questioning and oral feedback. French KPI's have been introduced to record pupil progress and achievement. In addition to this, pupils do self-assessment and regular reflections in their French books.

Monitoring and evaluation

Montioring of French is through learning walks, pupil meeting and monitoring of exercise books.
