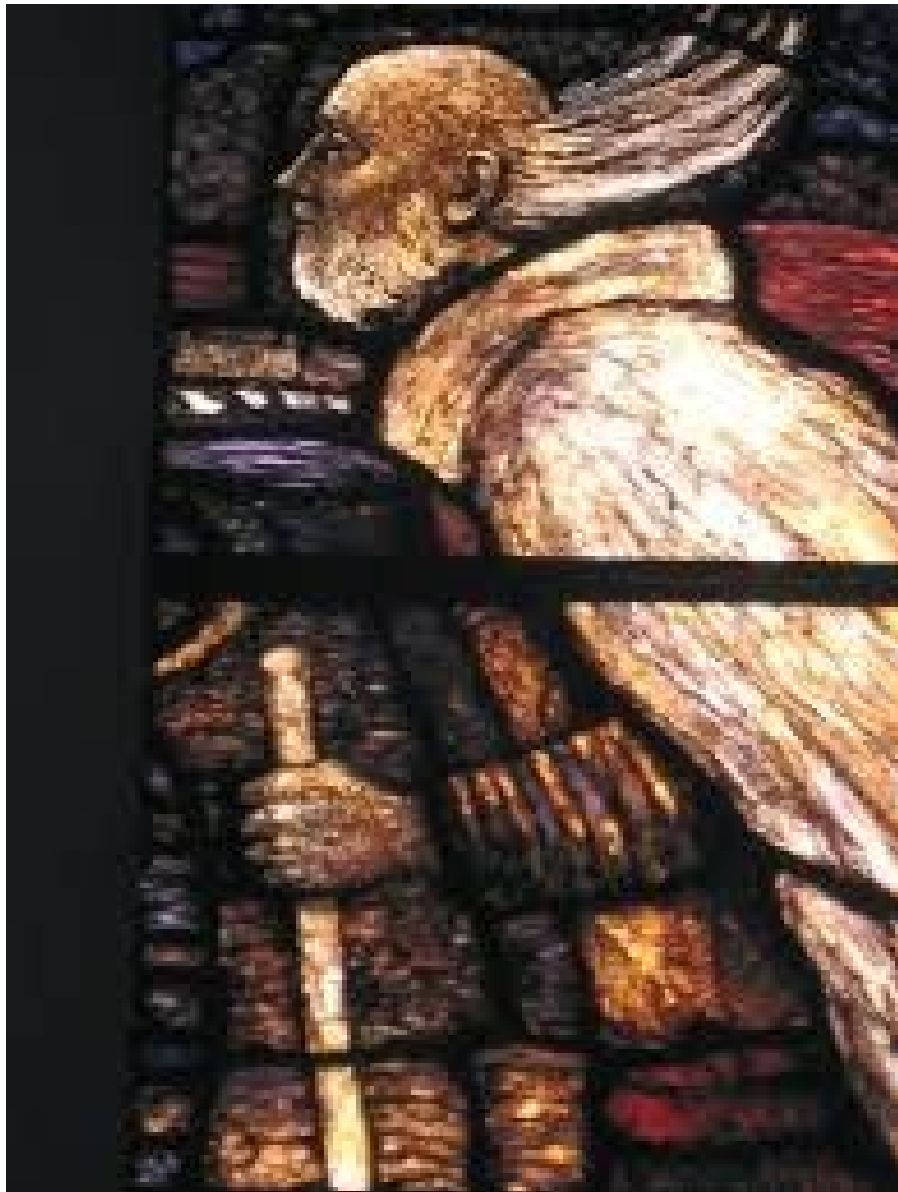
Forming lives ready to face the future

Reading the Gospel from this Sunday's Mass

A reading from the Gospel according to Matthew 25:1-13

Jesus told this parable to his disciples: 'The kingdom of heaven will be like this: Ten bridesmaids took their lamps and went to meet the bridegroom. Five of them were foolish and five were sensible: the foolish ones did take their lamps, but they brought no oil, whereas the sensible ones took flasks of oil as well as their lamps. The bridegroom was late, and they all grew drowsy and fell asleep. But at midnight there was a cry, "The bridegroom is here! Go out and meet him." At this, all those bridesmaids woke up and trimmed their lamps, and the foolish ones said to the sensible ones, "Give us some of your oil: our lamps are going out." But they replied, "There may not be enough for us and for you; you had better go to those who sell it and buy some for yourselves." They had gone off to buy it when the bridegroom arrived. Those who were ready went in with him to the wedding hall and the door was closed. The other bridesmaids arrived later. "Lord, Lord," they said "open the door for us." But he replied, "I tell you solemnly, I do not know you." So stay awake, because you do not know either the day or the hour.'

Reflection

The customs surrounding marriage were much different in Jesus' time. However, wedding feasts, meeting bridegrooms, and lamp oil were all commonplace to the disciples. Jesus used ordinary objects and customs in his stories. This parable is unique to the Gospel of Matthew and emphasises the necessity of being prepared.

Discussion Points

- What was the difference between the wise virgins and the foolish virgins?
- What happened to the five foolish virgins?
- In the parable who fell asleep?
- How do you think the foolish virgins felt when they realised they would not have enough oil?
- Describe a situation today where someone could miss out because they were not prepared properly?
- What do you think this parable means?
- Why do you think Jesus told this parable to his disciples?
- How can this parable be applied today?

Activities

Playdough peace prayers

You will need: playdough in different colours

Have little balls of playdough in different colours. Talk about conflict and how sometimes when people disagree it can lead to people getting hurt. Take two of the balls of playdough in different colours and as the children roll them together to make a new ball that might be a different colour as they mix pray that people can come together and find peaceful ways to sort out their differences.

Make your own poppy

You will need: Anything you can use to make a poppy.

As it's Remembrance Sunday why not take some time to make a poppy. You could do this by drawing, painting a paper plate to look like a poppy or make them from the bottom of plastic bottles and paint them. You could use wool or tissue paper to make a collage poppy. (Remember to sand paper the cut edge of the bottle before you paint it.) These can then be displayed to show our remembrance of those who gave their lives in conflicts.



What can you do for others?

Mark the two minutes silence at 11am on Sunday morning.
Send the poppies you make to others.
