## **General considerations**

- There should be a definite educational reason and justification for keeping animals in schools or bringing animals into a school. They should be 'used' and not just for 'decoration'.
- Keeping an animal requires time and commitment. It must be clear who is to look after the animals and who would deputise in their absence
- Pupils must be given training in how to handle animals and must always be closely supervised.
- Animal housing (Crate) must be easy to clean, secure and chosen to meet the needs of the animal.
- All equipment must be kept clean.
- If the animal is ill, alternative arrangement would be made for his care and he would not be allowed back into school until fully recovered.
- School should be aware of any medical issues in school whereby a pupil or member of staff may have sensitivities or potentially suffer allergic reactions. Precautions will need to be put in place to limit contact with these individuals.
