Personal, Social & Emotional Development

Can start to show resilience when trying new activities.

Can explain rules and the difference between right and wrong.

Can explain how they feel and can think about and react appropriately to the feelings of others.

Can think about choices and consequences.

Can draw information from a single map.

Can begin to discuss different ways to celebrate special times.

Can describe what they see, hear and feel in their immediate environment.

Can talk about in detail the people in our society and their roles.

Early Writing

Can spell words by segmenting the sounds.

Can understand the structure and features of a sentence.

Can write recognisable letters.

Can develop body strength and co-ordination.

Can use correct letter formation.

Begins to show accuracy and care when drawing.

Can express ideas and feelings.

Can plan, develop and create whilst explaining their reasons and designs.

Early Reading

Can talk about the new vocabulary that they have identified in new stories.

Can innovate part of a story in their own words.

Can read books with confidence and can answer questions about the story.

Can use new vocabulary confidently and in context.

Can confidently identify the features of a sentence.

Can read words consistent with their phonic knowledge.

Can use accurate prosody when reading aloud.

To confidently sing familiar songs and rhymes.

To use musical instruments in time with an adult.

Early Maths

Can confidently count objects, actions and sounds beyond 10.

Can compare numbers 1-10 using language such as one more and one less.

Can discuss the differences in amounts (mistakes) and number correspondence.

Can represent the cardinal numbers up to five using objects or fingers by counting out accurately.

Knows some number symbols and their cardinal value.

Can begin to name common 2D and 3D shapes.

Can name some properties of common 2D and 3D shapes.

Begins to talk about non-standard units of measure.

Can recognise patterns and can use this information to recreate patterns in different contexts.

To represent their own ideas through manipulating objects in different contexts.

Can use prepositions to tell you where something is in relation to something else.

Can explore composition of numbers to 10.

Can recall number bonds 0-5

Reception Reading Books

Please ensure that all books and reading records are sent back to school on a THURSDAY ready to be changed and sent back out again on a Friday. It is important that we have all of the books back on a Thursday as the next group will take those same reading books home the next day.
