## MARKING ASH WEDNESDAY TOGETHER IN FAITH

In the middle of a busy week at St Patrick's, we paused to observe Ash Wednesday together as a faith community.

Ash Wednesday marked the beginning of our journey through Lent, Holy Week and Easter.

The day was about leaving baggage behind and braving the unknown, carrying nothing but the mark of God's beloved.

During our liturgies we recognised that we are not perfect. We spoke of the things that stop us from becoming closer to God – hatred, arrogance, gossip, greed, indifference and despair.

Students made their Lenten promises and received their ashes after listening to our scripture reading, taken from the Gospel of St Matthew. It reminded us to pray, fast and give alms in secret, expecting nothing in return but the love of God.

Jesus said to his disciples: *"Take care not to perform righteous deeds in order*

*that people may see them; otherwise, you will have no recompense from your heavenly Father.*

*"When you give alms, do not blow a trumpet before you, as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and in the streets to win the praise of others. Amen, I say to you, they have received their reward."*

Pope Francis has asked us to reconsider the heart of this message this Lenten season. He says fasting must never become superficial.

*"No matter how much time you spend fasting, no matter how much you sleep on a hard floor, if you do no good to others, you do nothing great,"* he says.

As we begin our Lenten journey we make this prayer:

*Father, our source of life, you know our weakness. May we reach out with joy to grasp your hand and to walk more readily in your ways.*

*We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.*
