The whole school was decorated with shamrock plants to symbolise St Patrick's analogy of the Holy Trinity. This reminds us that as a community, we're united in our belief in three persons in one God – the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit.

At the start of the day, teachers delivered a lesson that aimed to teach pupils about the life and significance of St Patrick.

One of the highlights of the day was our St Patrick's Day Mass.

All Year 9 pupils took part in a minipilgrimage to St Patrick's church, where Father Pat O'Neill celebrated Mass with pupils from our Catholic primary schools, St Patrick's, Christ the King and St Thérèse of Lisieux.

At break time there was a sale of shamrock-shaped cookies, with funds raised going to local charities.

Irish music was played in the reception area and the dining hall during lunch, when Irish food was served, and quiz sheets were placed in stands in the dining hall for pupils to enjoy learning more about St Patrick.

Pupils were also greeted with a video that was created the previous day of some of our pupils Irish dancing around the school building.

We thank the whole community for being involved in creating moments of wonder that lift the hearts and minds of all.

Social media shoutouts highlight special achievement




We have been using our social media platforms to give shoutouts to pupils who have been hitting the heights outside of school.
