Seven of our pupils and two staff joined the NPCAT party that took part in the Diocese of Middlesbrough Pilgrimage to Lourdes at the end of May.

The adventure began with an early morning start as an excited group of slightly sleepy young people gathered at Teesside Airport at 4am ahead of their flight.

The week in Lourdes was simply phenomenal. Our young people were so compassionate and caring towards the people they were helping.

Every day we tturned up for duty at the Elisio Hotel, where the supported pilgrims were staying, and the pupils greeted them with a smile as they paired up before taking them to the services and other activities.

There was lots of humour and laughter with the supported pilgrims, which made the week enjoyable for all.

No job was too much trouble for our young people, who were happy to do whatever was asked of them, whether that was pushing wheelchairs, carrying banners or taking part in the services. Our pupils went on what was not just a physical journey to Lourdes, but also a spiritual journey for each of them as individuals.

They had the opportunity to spend time in prayer in a way they don't normally, and they valued this experience deeply.

They talked about being able to be more "fully ourselves" during the week as they spent time in reflection, as well as getting to know each other and the supported pilgrims.
