Remembrance

Our act of remembrance is always a beautiful occasion in school and is one of the highlights of the year for me. Our whole community comes together along with Years 5 and 6 from St Benedict's to remember those who have died in war.

This service is led by the cadets, who represent the army, navy and air force in our school community. This year we had Sergeant Chris Playforth from Redcar Army Cadets who helped to prepare the cadets for the service. Danny in Year 11 took the parade on the day and with great respect and dignity led the other cadets through the service. Father Phil Cunnah, our parish priest was the celebrant and assisted by the cadets who read the readings and prayers took us on our journey of remembrance.

We laid our wreaths for the fallen at the foot of the cross. This was

done by a representative from each service.

As we stood together, over 800 of us gathered together to remember the fallen in silence for two minutes. We thank our cadets who made us very proud of the way they led the service and are a reminder of the commitment of those who have served in the forces throughout the decades.


The Year 7 B football team came 4th from 10 in their
