Vocabulary, Grammar and Punctuation Loop Game for KS2

How to Play

The game has **32** cards. It is ideal for a whole class game.

Give each child a card. If you have spares, keep them yourself or share them out amongst the more confident children in the group. For differentiation, cards with an orange edge are based on LKS2 terminology, cards with a blue edge are based on UKS2 terminology.

Choose any child to start. This child should read the right-hand side of their card (the definition) out loud. Whoever has the answer that matches this definition reads it out. This second child then reads their definition, and the next child with the correct answer reads that out loud.

Repeat until all cards have been read and the game arrives back at the child who started it off.
