BLACK HISTORY MONTH

Rokeby has a long established relationship with the City law firm <u>Pinsent Masons</u>. In recent years we have worked collaboratively on a number of projects to promote career opportunities in the city to our students.

Last week, Mr Galoria and six Year 10 students took part in a 'fireside chat' with Lord Hastings, former Global Head of Corporate

Citizenship for KPMG international and Head of Public Affairs at the BBC. Students joined a live stream discussion between Lord Hastings and a senior partner at the law firm to discuss Black Lives Matter (BLM) and the responsibility large corporate firms have in ensuring equality of opportunity. The event was organised and hosted by Pinsent Masons as part of their Equalities & Diversity Month programme.

Mohamed (10O), who took part in the event says: "The stream was full of people watching from around



the world. It was inspiring and informative to watch. The speakers talked about BLM and how big business can impact our future. We also learnt a few things about Lord Hastings, such as he used to be a Sociology and Religious Studies teacher at a secondary school in west London and that he is now Deputy Head of UNICEF. He also spoke about watching and being inspired by Martin Luther King's

powerful speech as a child ('I have a dream').

The discussion also covered BLM, George Floyd's death, white privilege and emerging markets such as Nigeria, which in 10 years time is predicted to be a fully-grown economy, with a vast population and a lot of technology. Finally they talked about driving equity into business and that it is the responsibility of business leaders to do something and not sit back and leave things to the politicians".


