### **DIVERSITY MONTH AT ROKEBY**

As we emerge from lockdown and welcome students back in to school, our first edition of the Rokeby Recorder this term is a celebration of some of the fantastic work completed during Diversity & Equality Month. Every department across school engaged students in curriculum activities that aimed to promote discussion and engagement with issues relating to diversity and inclusion and the importance of combatting discrimination, in all its forms, within society.

Our art and writing competition, sponsored by Pinsent Masons, resulted in over 100 wonderful submissions; here is a snap shot of just a few of them. Other activities across school included discussions around forced marriage using *Romeo & Juliet*; age and society through *An Inspector Calls* (English); learning Labi Siffre's *So Strong* in music; decolonising languages through representation of non European French and Spanish-speaking communities across the world; LGBTQ+ issues in the sports; equality and religion, human relationships and social justice in RE. All students also took part in Diversity Month assemblies and a P4C enquiry on exploring identity online.



We live in a 'world house' in which we have to live together—black and white, easterner and westerner, Catholic and Protestant. Muslim and Hindu.





#### **HOLOCAUST MEMORIAL EVENT**

A group of Year 9 students attended a virtual holocaust memorial event. The theme was be the light in the darkness. The event encouraged us to reflect on the depths that humanity can sink to but not to forget the way in which individuals have resisted the dark and stood up to injustice. It was a reminder that in a divided world full of denial and misinformation, one must remain vigilant and informed about the hatred present today. There were moving testimonies given by holocaust survivors and some amazing performances from primary school pupils in Newham, including music and poetry.

Stefano Diarra (9B) said, "This event was a beautiful experience; I enjoyed the performance of the young musicians at the beginning and hearing the testimony of two survivors was really emotional."







Key Stage 3 students took part in workshops with Tender, a charity that uses theatre and the arts to engage young people in violence prevention workshops to enable them to recognise and avoid domestic abuse and sexual violence.

The focus of the workshops was on understanding the difference between healthy and unhealthy relationships.



#### FRENCH PARTNERSHIP

Through the British Embassy, Rokeby is paired with College Garcia Lorca in Paris and the two schools have been working together on a project aimed at inspiring French students ahead of the Paris Olympics in 2024.

Students have participated in three virtual exchanges with our counterparts in France, during which they spoke only in French. They took part in a meet and greet and shared an introductory video they had prepared about themselves and their hobbies. They also met with French athletic champion, Solene Ndama, ahead of her upcoming Tokyo 2021 and Paris 2024 competitions. During our last exchange, students gave three presentations, again all in French, and spoke about London 2012 and the subsequent transformation of our area following the games.

The boys really rose to the challenge - speaking French and doing it virtually! A really big thank you as well to Mr Ansah-Awuah, who taught his Year 9 class a break dance routine especially for the project, which we shared during one of our meetings. Break dancing will feature as a new sport in the Paris 2024 Olympics!



#### INTERNATIONAL SCHOOL

Our partnership with College Garcia Lorca builds on our existing international links with Stone Bridge High School in the **USA**, Aburi Girls School in **Ghana**, Le Campigny school in Normandy, **France** and Veal Kasach in **Cambodia**.

We also have a very good working relationship with **Exeter University's** Modern Languages department which has resulted in reciprocal workshops on multilingualism and the involvement of university lecturers in presentations for school language events.

Our international work is recognised by the British Council who awarded Rokeby with <u>International School Status</u>.
