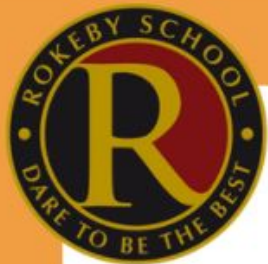




LANGUAGES!

Languages in Year 10 & 11:



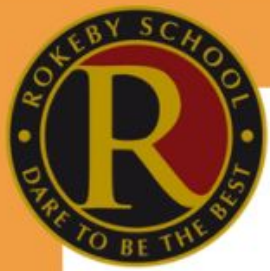
French - if you currently study French, this will be your Language GCSE

How are languages assessed?

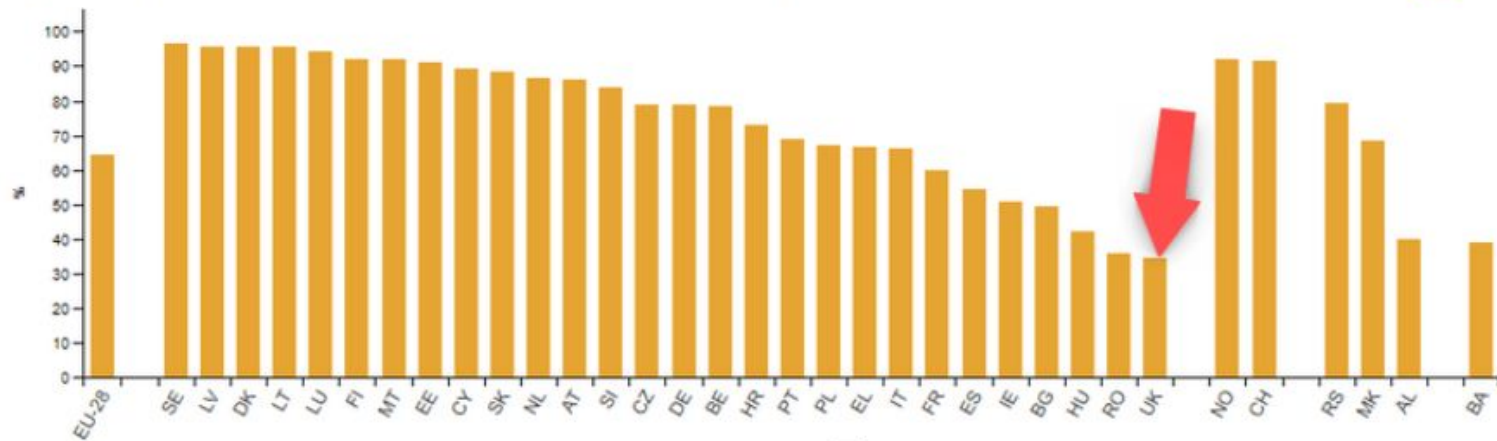
All languages have four exams:

- 25% Speaking
- 25% Reading
- 25% Listening
- 25% Writing




Only **34.6%** of people in the U.K.
speak more than one language
