









Jamie O (left) worked with his uncle who is a driveway specialist, the picture shows a few of the projects Jamie helped to complete.

User Experience Designer


Salary: £25,000 - £50,000

Have you ever felt frustrated when using a website or app because it just doesn't seem to work how you want it to? Chances are it's in need of a good UX Designer!

UX Designers focus on the interaction between human users and the app, website or other product, to provide a seamless user experience, whilst also ensuring that the product meets the needs of the business.

As well as your computing skills, you need to be good at paying attention to detail, and be persistent and thorough. You'll need good research and analytical thinking skills and maths knowledge, and be able to work in a team.

A college course such as A-level Computer Science or a T-level in Digital Production, Design and Development could help you get a trainee position in a company when you leave college, or you could go on to do a higher or degree apprenticeship. Or perhaps you would prefer to study full-time for a relevant degree at university.



LINKING CAREERS WITH SUBJECTS

Languages

This month we are looking at how Language skills link with careers!

Everyone knows that Interpreters, Translators and Language Teachers need to be fluent in a second language. However, learning a language gives you skills appreciated by any number of employers. Companies who trade or offer services internationally, or who deal with customers and suppliers who do not speak English, value employees with language skills.

Charities, museums, libraries, tourism and transport, as well as the engineering, finance, media and security sectors, are amongst the huge range of potential employers of people with language skills.

Even just a little knowledge of another language and culture goes a long way. Meeting and greeting clients in their own language, for example, will help make them feel welcome, helping the business relationship along.

Learning a foreign language develops your oral and written communication skills, in your native language as well as your second one. It will also enhance your creative thinking and problem-solving skills and improve your memory! Not only that, but several studies have shown that being able to speak a foreign language can increase your income by between 10% and 20% compared to that of someone in a similar role who only speaks their mother tongue!

Allow me to introduce myself: I am Ms. Williams, the Careers Adviser at Shevington High. Your child will have at least two career guidance interviews with me during their time here. Currently it is the turn of Year 11, as these students have some important decisions to make regarding their next steps after leaving high school.

The post-16 landscape can seem overwhelmingly complex! Should I go to college? If so, what subjects and qualifications should I take? Would an apprenticeship suit me better? What do I need to do to have the career I want? These are the sorts of questions Year 11s are probably asking themselves, and you too as parents and carers! Their guidance interview aims to assist the young person in developing self-awareness and in supporting them to assess realistic options when making decisions about their future education, training and careers.
